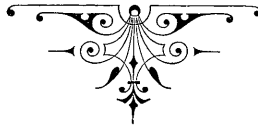

CHIEF CONSTABLE'S OFFICE,

Toronto, January 18th, 1889.

To His Honor Judge Macdougall, Chairman Board of Police Commissioners:

SIR,—I have the honor to present this my Report upon the Police Department for the year 1888, together with the usual statistical information in tabular form, also returns of the Ambulance and Patrol Signal Services during the period they have been in operation.

In accordance with the recommendations made in my Annual Report for 1887, the strength of the force was augmented in the Spring by thirty men; of these, seventeen were required in connection with the ambulance and patrol waggons, leaving thirteen men available to patrol the streets. The recent census not only amply confirms the necessity of this step, but makes it apparent that Toronto has fewer police than the size of the City and its population would seem to demand, if the relative proportion found to obtain in other places may be any guide to what is required here. I learn that in some of the larger cities in the United States and England the number of police per thousand of the population varies from about two upward, while in Toronto the proportion is close upon 1.4. I hold the opinion that three men per two thousand inhabitants would not more than suffice to meet the demands of the public in general for police protection throughout this widely scattered City.

Some few citizens deeming the regular police inadequate, have tried the experiment of engaging the services of men employed by a private company. These men are clothed to closely resemble the City police, and, by many, are supposed to belong to the regular force. The objections to this state of affairs are obvious, and could be removed by the Department undertaking to supply police for special service on payment, and by guaranteeing the same supervision and system as governs the ordinary constable on beat.

DETECTIVE DEPARTMENT:

The Detective Department has rendered particularly valuable service during the year just ended, both in the detection and prevention of crime. Conspicuous among the arrests effected were the following, viz.: Two fugitive bank officials from the United States, with nearly \$25,000 in cash on their persons; two men for passing a considerable quantity of counterfeit money, whose apprehension led to the breaking up of a gang that for years had been eluding the agents of the United States Secret Service as well as the Dominion Government officers, the principals were convicted and received heavy sentences; Ed. Rice, wanted since 1883 for robbing a safe, was convicted and got four years; G. Carson, a bank sneak, with a continental reputation, and a companion named Boswell, were sent to the penitentiary for seven and four years respectively; J. Casey, a noted pick pocket, whose arrest resulted in the restoration of \$300 stolen from a citizen; Horace Hovan and Walter Sheridan, adroit thieves of a most dangerous class, who,

	on being liberated and sent out of the City, went to Denver, where they were caught in the act of attempting to rob a bank; R. I. G. Barnett, charged with obtaining large sums of money by fraudulent means from the Central Bank and others. His arrest was effected in England by a detective officer of Scotland Yard. The prisoner is awaiting trial.
Local crime	Local criminals have been kept well in hand and dealt with in such a way as to make them feel the full effect of the Vagrant Act, the provisions of which are defective in some respects and require amendment.
Property recovered	Out of a total amounting to \$94,457.48, representing the value of the lost and stolen property recovered by the police, \$42,767.29 is credited to the Detective Department, an admittedly good proportion for so limited a staff.
References to Insp. Stark, his report	Inspector Stark reports at length on the work performed under his immediate supervision, and the interesting details there given are well worthy of careful perusal. It is most satisfactory to note that the City has been unusually free from undetected crime of a serious nature. This result, I hold, is due to the astuteness and unflagging energy of the detective staff, aided by the intelligent direction of the Inspector, who, in the short term he has been in charge of the Department, has developed a special aptitude for detective work, confirming the opinion I expressed of him and his men in my last Report.
Petty thieving and advice to householders	Petty thieving appears to have been facilitated by citizens leaving their houses untenanted when out of town, and by omitting to secure their doors and windows while absent at church, theatre, etc. I would advise more care and attention in these respects, and would request householders to notify the police on all occasions when they intend to leave their premises vacant for any length of time.
Divisional detectives	I am pleased to report that the services of the acting detectives assigned to divisions have been found useful and of special advantage in their respective districts, largely on account of their local knowledge.
Increase to detective staff	Owing to the increasing number of investigations arising from enquiries received from outside sources, including other countries, apart from the natural growth of City work, I would recommend the addition of one man to the regular detective staff, and the appointment of another to do duty as an acting detective in No. 1 Division.
STAFF-INSPECTOR'S DEPARTMENT.	
Duties expand	The duties devolving upon this department continue to expand, partly owing to a systematic concentration of the work that strictly belong thereto, and partly from a more widespread knowledge that such an office now exists where advice and assistance can be given in cases of domestic difficulty that heretofore could only receive scant attention.
Important cases	Among the more notable cases that have been attended to by this department were the prosecutions under the Abbott or Bucket Shop Act, the suppression of a local lottery scheme, the proceedings taken in a fatal case of abortion, and the measures adopted to prevent gaming and the illicit sale of liquor in some so-called clubs.

The success attendant upon the prosecutions against whisky dives, and the frequent visitations of the divisional police have conduced to a diminution in the unlicensed liquor traffic. In this respect, let me here say that amendments to the law which would permit summary arrest by the police, and remove the right of appeal from the Police Magistrate's decision would strengthen the hands of the authorities in dealing with parties who persistently will continue to carry on a trade prohibited by Statute.

The officer detailed to work in connection with the Humane Society has been actively engaged, and it is believed that his efforts have materially tended to ameliorate the condition of the animals in whose interest he devotes his time.

The Staff-Inspector and his assistants merit my commendation for discharging their duties in a manner creditable to the department, and his Report, which accompanys this, conveys a good general idea of the work performed. The fines imposed for offences prosecuted by this officer aggregated \$5,437 during the year.

THE PATROL SIGNAL AND WAGON SERVICE.

These services have been in operation for seven months and have been found to fulfil the expectations formed of their utility. As the advantages of the system have been heretofore described I will not repeat them, but suggest that it be extended by the addition of 15 boxes in localities where it has been ascertained they are necessary. I would also recommend that under certain restrictions keys be entrusted to responsible citizens for use on a sudden emergency.

Banks and other public buildings could also be provided with special boxes if they so desired at their own expense, and I think they would find the fact of being in direct and instant communication with the police an extra safeguard.

My thanks are due to Mr. Blackall, the agent of the Gamewell Co., who erected the system, for the valuable assistance he afforded to the operators in acquiring the technical knowledge necessary to work it with advantage, and to the operators, credit is due for the intelligence they have displayed in operating and directing the services dependent on the system.

AMBULANCE SERVICE.

Since June 1st last the Ambulance Service has been under the control and direction of the Police Department, and has been provided with two completely equipped imported ambulances, containing the most modern appliances for the relief of the patients requiring them. One was presented by Mr. J. Ross Robertson, and the other by the Manufacturers' Accident Assurance Co. Both ambulances are kept at Head Quarters ready night and day for any calls that may be sent in for them, and it is quite optional with the parties using them whether payment is made for the service rendered.

Upon reading the detailed statement of the work performed, I am sure you will agree with me that the city is to be congratulated upon the possession of such admirable appliances that public spirited generosity has provided.

MOUNTED SQUAD.

The horses used by the mounted men are now comfortably stabled at Head Quarters, and the change I regard as beneficial in all respects. Their services continue to be found most useful, and in escorting large processions, impounding stray cattle, and in many other ways they are almost indispensable. To the care and attention bestowed by the officer in charge, P. S. Golding, is largely due the general immunity from sickness.

STATIONS.

Improvements

The alterations to Head Quarters and No. 1 Station begun in 1887, were completed early in the year, and it is with much satisfaction that I report in the ventilation and sanitation a marked improvement. The enlargement of the accommodation, both in the offices for the transaction of public business and the confinement of prisoners, have filled a most pressing and long-felt want. I consider it, however, very advisable that the premises occupied by the caretaker should be vacated, as it has been found undesirable to have the present apartments tenanted at all.

I would recommend that during the current year the necessary steps be taken to prepare accommodation at No. 2 Station for a patrol wagon that in the near future should be located in this important division.

No. 3 Station has been improved by a new system of plumbing, and enlarged by a commodious dormitory, as well as by the addition of a roomy and well ventilated stable and wagon house, making the accommodation ample for present requirements.

Through the courtesy of the Fire Department, temporary provision has been made for the wagon and horse attached to No. 4 Station, but it will be necessary to make permanent arrangements as soon as a favorable opportunity presents itself.

No. 5.—I have no suggestions to make respecting this station, which meets the requirements of the division for the present time.

No. 6.—In regard to this station it will become a matter for consideration whether the site selected for a new building should not be changed if Parkdale intends to come into the City, as, in that event, the proposed location would probably be found to lie too far south for the north-western section, which is growing rapidly.

GENERAL REMARKS.

Strikes

The year 1888 has been uneventful so far as matters relating to the police in general have been concerned, nothing having occurred to call for special mention. The disputes between the cigar makers and plumbers and their employees, though protracted, were conducted in a peaceful manner, and police intervention was rendered almost unnecessary.

Vehicular traffic on the main thoroughfares is now of such volume as to require systematic regulation. The By-laws relating to this subject seem to have been framed on the old Statutes of Upper Canada, and are too vague for the City of to-day. A large portion of the traffic that finds its way through the most crowded parts of King, Yonge and Queen Streets consists of coal carts, lumber waggons, drays, lorries, express vans, etc., that have little or no concern there and could just as readily use the less frequented streets and so relieve the congested parts. Another feature worthy of consideration is the fact that very young children are, in many instances, entrusted to drive; they are incompetent to control their horses, and are ignorant as well of the "rules of the road," which, indeed, many of their elders entirely ignore.

The street car tracks are an important factor in the consideration of this subject which merits more than a passing notice.

A new arrangement for the Van Service was entered into with the contractors by which it is optional on both sides to withdraw on six months notice. It may therefore become necessary to provide for this work being done exclusively by the police.

The increasing traffic between the City and the Island will probably require the services of a special squad to do duty as harbour police during the summer season.

A Police Matron having been appointed on probation and attached to No. 1 Station, females arrested throughout the City are concentrated there as much as possible to share the benefit of her services.

I understand boots with rubber soles have been tried with good results in England. It might, perhaps, be well to test their utility here by supplying some of the men on night duty in summer time with them.

Bicycles have come into such general use and favour it has occurred to me that the advantages they possess might be turned to account by utilizing them for the patrol sergeants when visiting the men on beat at night after a late hour, say 11 p.m., in the less frequented districts. I am not aware that they have been tried by any police force.

I cannot close this somewhat lengthy Report without stating how readily I acknowledge the important services tendered by the officers in charge of divisions, upon whom falls not only a full share of responsibility, but a large measure of executive control. They have exerted themselves to do justice to the arduous positions they occupy, and in my opinion they have succeeded. The subordinate officers in their respective spheres have given me every reason to be satisfied, while the men in general have sustained the reputation of the Force.

In giving a wide publicity to the intentions of the police at Exhibition times, which kept the city so free from outside crooks, and in other ways the Press have materially aided the Department.

Expenditure

The expenditure for 1888, under the control of the Police Commissioners, fell short of the sum estimated by over \$2,000

The Chairman of the Police Commissioners :

SIR,—I have the honor to submit for your consideration my Report for the year 1888. I am happy to be able to state that the Force has lost none of its members by death during the past year. The health of the men has been unusually good, due, I think, in a great measure to the improved sanitary state of the Stations, though a larger proportion of men are sick in No. 2 division than in any other. This I attribute to the unsanitary state of that portion of the city which they patrol as compared with the rest of the city, the Station itself being everything that could be desired. I have had but very few really serious cases of sickness during the past year, and only one serious case of injury. As in former years, derangements of the digestive organs have been the most frequent cause of disability. There have been a far larger proportion of mounted men on the sick list than any other department of the Force. Twenty-nine men were disabled through injuries received while in the execution of their duties.
