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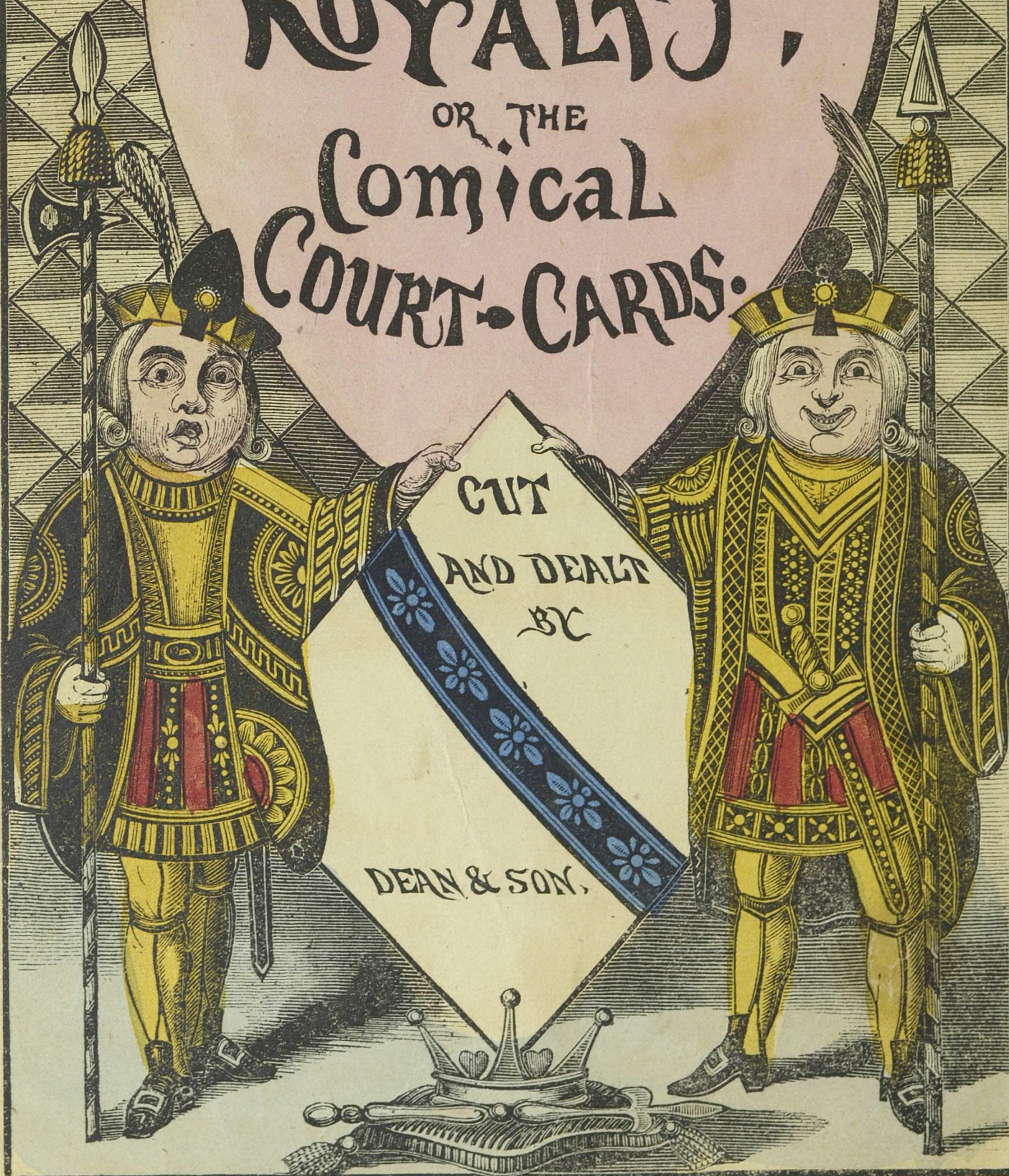

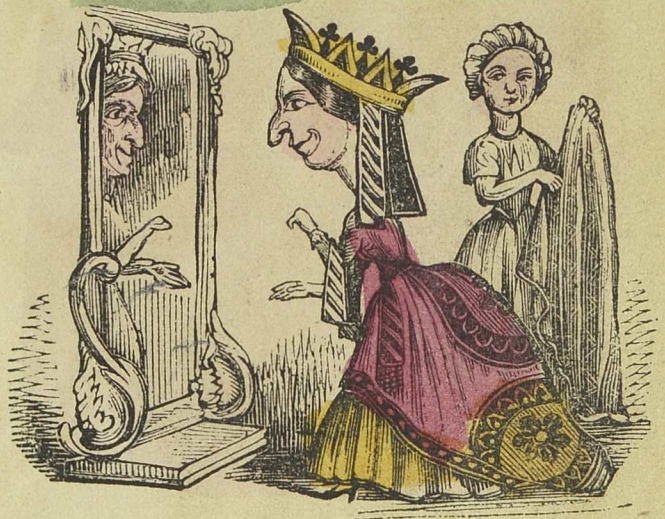


THE King of

he.

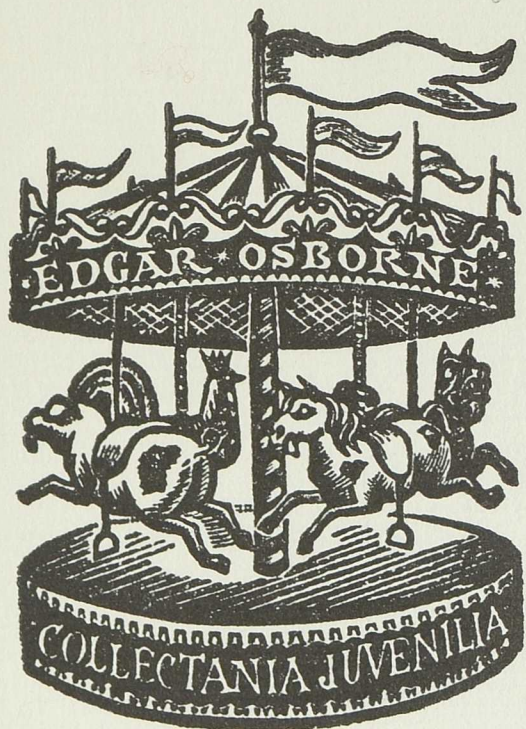
And when he had done,

queen care an ace.

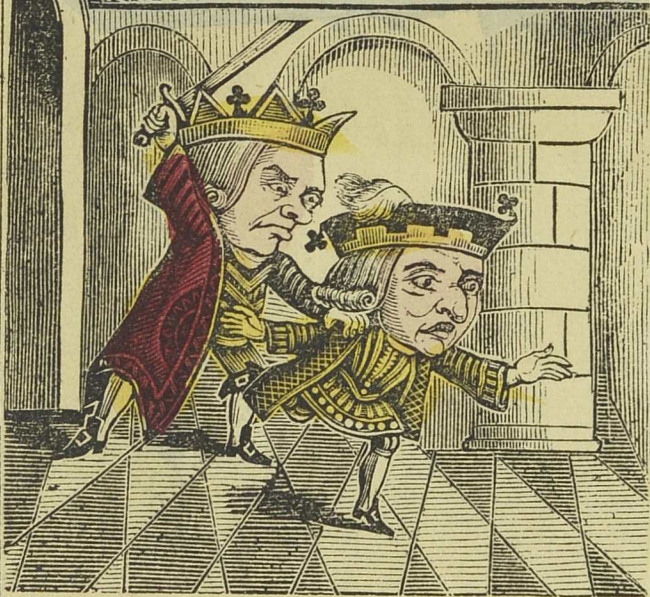
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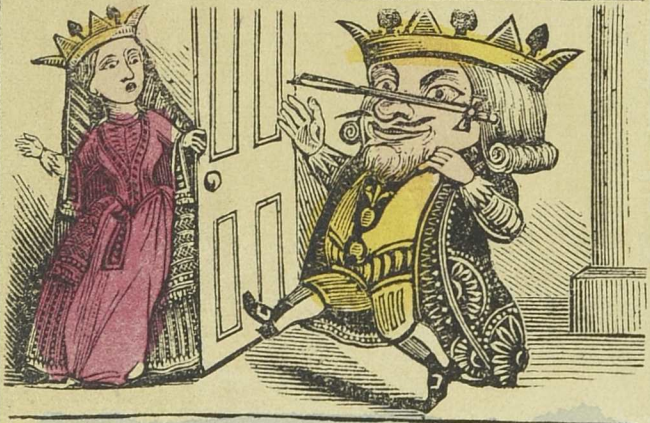
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The Knave of Clubs

say.

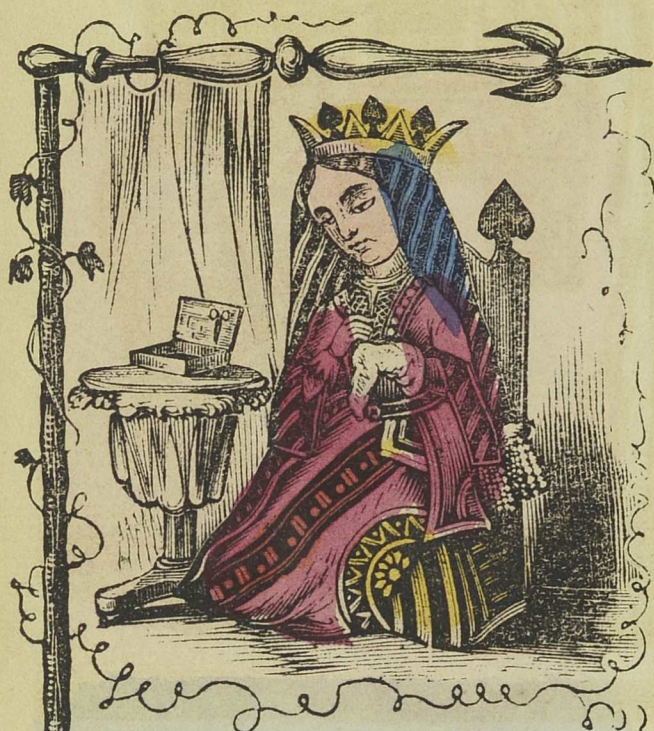


He liked a pipe, he liked a

good of mankind."



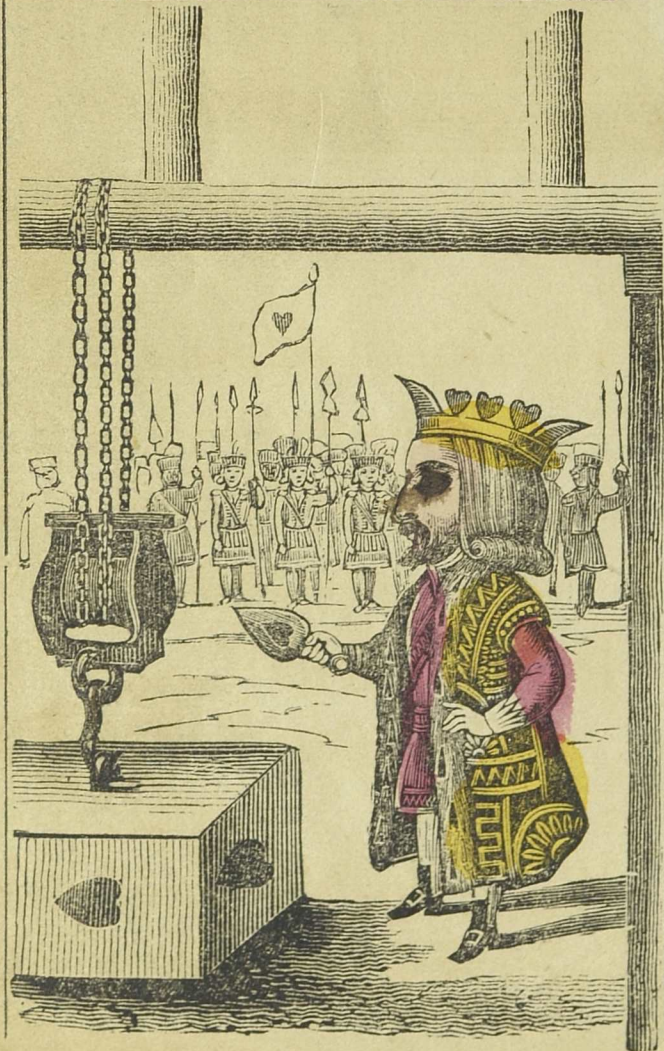
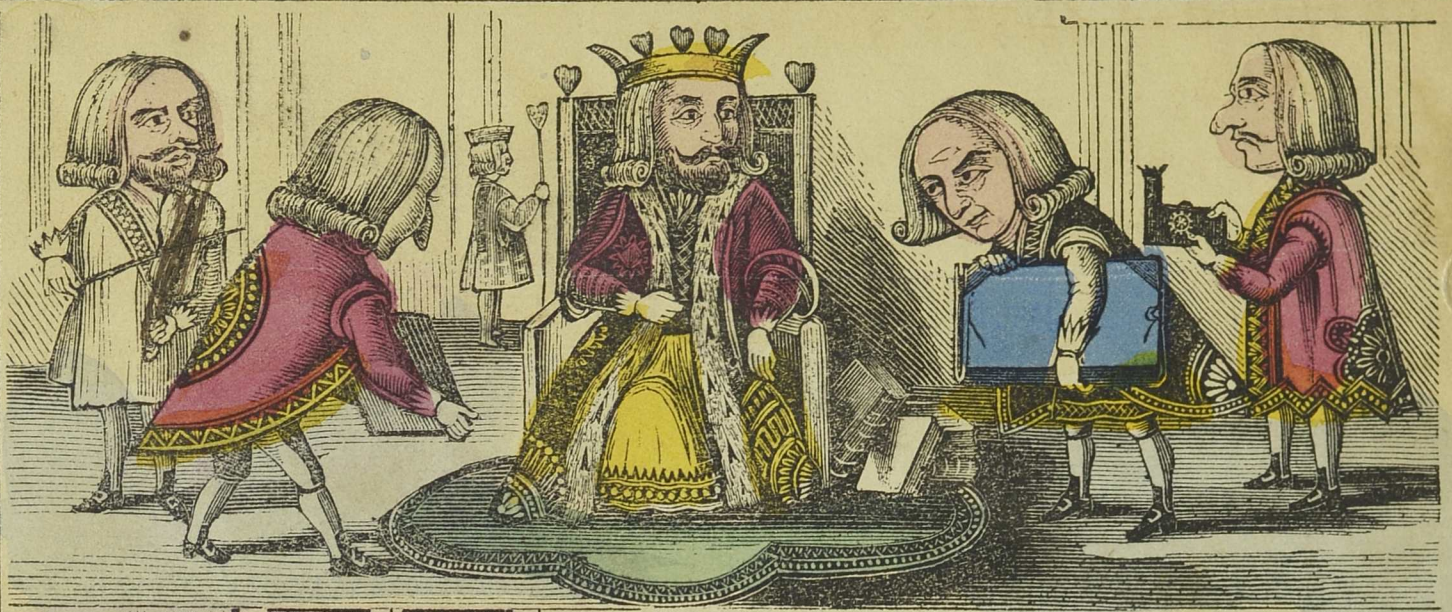
The Queen of Diamonds

play, I ween.



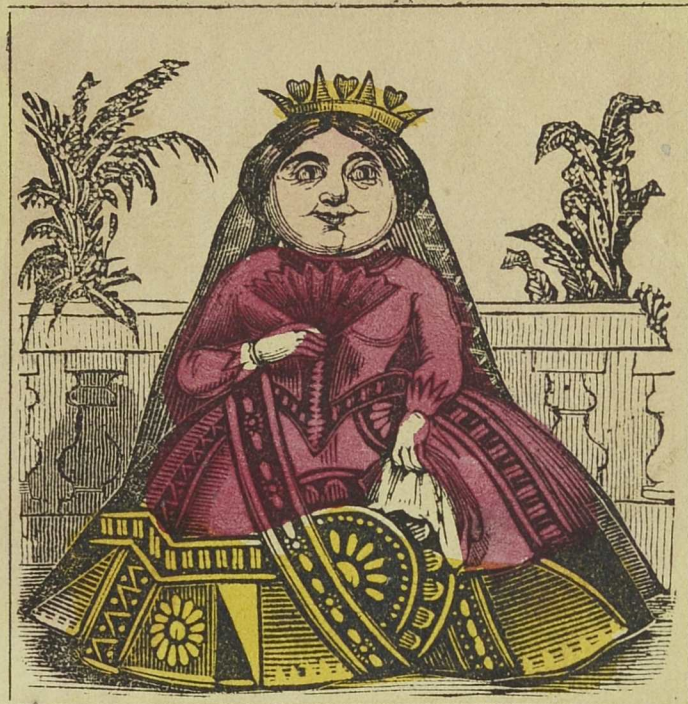
The King of Hearts
