A CHAPTER ON THE CITY OF TORONTO.

Toronto, metropolis of the Province of Upper Canada, is a City demanding more regard from the travelling stranger, and justifying a higher degree of satisfaction in its inhabitants than may be accorded to its magnitude, or to the years of its age. It is too young to have many traditions or much venerable history, yet it has some. It might be looked to as central subject of a long history were a writer to diverge into the annals of the Province, of which it has occasionally been the Scat of Government. As the place of residence of the Lieutenant-Governors of Upper Canada, they being subordinate to the Governors-General who resided at Quebec, it became the Scat of Legislation, of the Courts of Justice, of Education, and the centre of Western Commerce.

In 1793, besides the old French fort built in 1686, it contained no other human habitation than the rude wigwams of the migratory Indians, and then not many of these. In 1795, it had twelve habitations of log, plank, and canvas residences of its earliest white settlers and the Upper Province Government; the population was about 2,000, when assailed by the Americans in 1813. In 1817, the disaster of war and other causes had reduced the number to 1,200. In 1826 it had risen to 1,677; by Howison's estimate in 1824, it was 3,000. In 1830, 2,860. In 1832, the higher ratio of increase then commencing gave 4,000, or thereabouts. In 1842, the number was, In 1845, 19,706. In 1850, 25,166. In the next six years the population had risen, it has been said, to about 50,000; but as no official census certifies this, the statement may be incorrect. The removal of the Government and Legislature from Toronto to Quebec in 1858, and of commercial panic and general depression of industry, concurrent with deficient harvests in 1857, 1858, and partially deficient in 1859, reduced the population in those years. It increased somewhat in 1860, and when the census was taken in January, 1861, the official return was 45,166. By natural increasement and immigration; by the British military garrison; and by American augmentations temporarily resident, it may be estimated for January 1865, as close upon 50,000.

This beautiful city extends between east and west over two miles, bounded on the south by the Bay, a spacious inlet from Lake Ontario, and stretching northerly about a mile and a half, including open spaces at the extremities, terminating with Yorkville, on the undulating heights, and more westerly, limited by the Queen's Park where stand the University and Observatory, with handsome private

residences, among the picturesque woods, at an elevation from one hundred to two hundred feet above the level of the Lake. Taking the site of the Observatory as the geographical position of Toronto, the city occupies a spot of the globe on the north-west angle of Lake Ontario, in 43° 39′ 4″ North Latitude, and 79° 21′ 5″ West Longitude; or 5 hours, 17 minutes, 20 seconds of time slower than the clock at Greenwich Observatory, six miles from Charing Cross, London, England. Toronto is distant from Niagara Falls, by direct line across the lake and the mouth of Niagara river, 50 miles; from Collingwood at the north terminus of the Northern Railroad, on Georgian Bay, Lake Huron, 93 miles; from Hamilton, 45; London, 114; Kingston, 165; Ottawa, 233; Montreal, 323; Quebec, 503; New York, 500; Boston, 593; Portland, at the Atlantic terminus of the Grand Trunk Railway ——, and Halifax, Nova Scotia, about —— miles.

The beach at Toronto, which nearly encloses the Bay from Lake Ontario, is a barrier of gravel and sand. It has accumulated by the wedging of ice into an angle of the shore, where the water freezes, being there comparatively shallow. Against that ice, through long ages, Lake Ontario, too deep to freeze, has surged up in the tempests of winter, depositing a wail of shingle transferred from its own bottom. Another beach formed in like manner, encloses Burlington Bay at the western extremity of the lake, five miles from the city of Hamilton.

Bouchette, in his work on the Survey of Canada, published in 1832, describes the harbour and site of Toronto as he saw the locality in 1793, thus :- "I still distinctly recollect the untamed aspect which the country exhibited when I first entered the beautiful basin which then became the scene of my early hydrographical operations. Dense and trackless forests lined the margin of the lake, and reflected their inverted images in its glassy surface. The wandering savage had constructed his ephemeral habitation beneath their luxuriant foliage,—the group then consisting of two families of Mississagas; and the bay and neighbouring marshes were the hitherto uninvaded haunts of immense coveys of wild fowls; indeed they were so abundant as in some measure to annoy us during the night. In the Spring following, Lieutenant-Governor Simcoe removed to the site of the new capital, attended by the regiment of Queen's Rangers, and commenced at once the realizations of his favourite project. His Excellency inhabited, during the summer and through the winter a canvas house which he imported directly for the occasion; but frail as was its substance, it was rendered exceedingly comfortable, and soon became as distinguished for the social and urbane hospitality of its venerated and gracious host, as for the peculiarity of its structure.

From 1793 till 1854 the Seat of Government was in Canada an unsettled question; the people of Newark in the first-named year, were troubled with the subject; they being in possession desired the Government to remain where it was. Governor Simcoe decided that

it should be at York, yet only temporarily until the West should be settled and London built. Lord Dorchester the Governor-General thought Kingston the proper place. In 1795, the retirement of Liautenant-Governor Simcoe from Upper Canada led the inhabitanta Newark to hope that the projected removal of the Seat of Government would not be carried out.

The name Toronto was superseded by that of York about 1794, and by Act of Parliament it displaced York in 1834. It is found in Canadian French documents as early as 1686, and if it be of Indian origin its antiquity extends beyond memory. Ouentorouk is given as one of the native names which, says the Rev. Dr. Scadding, may have been gradually rubbed down in passing from trader to trader to Toronto. Two favourite interpretations have been, "trees rising out of the water," and the "place of meeting." Others have suggested the word "Toronto" to be a perpetuation of the French engineer who constructed the fort in the years 1750-52, but the fort and French habitations within were named Rouille in compliment to the Colonial Minister of France who authorized its construction.

The French settlers in Canada, were in constant turmoil with the English Colonists of Massachusetts, Connecticut, New York, and the other settlements on the Atlantic seaboard. The English and Dutch New Yorkers were unceasing in their efforts to divert the fur trade from the channel of the St. Lawrence. Their emissaries everywhere tampered with the native tribes even in the undisputed territories of the French. In the reports of grievances of that kind the name of Toronto frequently recurs in 1686 and after, but varies into Tarento, Taranto, and Torronto. The New York Colonists had treated with the Iroquois Indians for leave to erect a beaver trap at Choueguen, now named Oswego, and used their permission to erect a stone fort. From that place they traded by selling goods to the Indians for furs at rates greatly below the French prices at Montreal. It was to counteract the Englishmen at Oswego that fort Rouille, otherwise fort Toronto, was built. Other suggestions about the name make tracings of it to the French words—"au tour de ronde d'eau." Supposing that these may have been caught up and repeated by the Indians, "as Yankee has arisen from an Indian effort to say Anglais." In this matter incidentally touched, the learned Dr. Scadding who makes the remark, is mistaken. Yankee is a Scandinavian word introduced into Britain a thousand years ago, or more, and carried to the New England Colonies with the earliest settlers who were in greater part from the east of England as the names of their cities imply. The writer of this notice was familiar with the word "Yankee" on the south-east shores of Scotland in childhood; where many names of places and words and colloquial phrases remain from the old Northmen, testifying that they and their language had taken root there. Dr. Scadding once thought the name Toronto belonged to the "Tobacco tribe" of Indians—the Tionontates, who stretched in direction of Ontario from the West, but has given up that idea. Another suggestion is based on the Indian words Kania-toronto-quat, which on the opposite side of the lake in Munro County, State of New York, have been contracted to Irondequoit, which are said to signify an opening into a lake. But whatever the origin of the name, it appears to have been first applied to a collection of Indian wigwams on the shore of Lake Simcoe. The hunters and fur traders passed by way of that lake from the Lake Huron region, and through the series of smaller lakes and streams connecting south-easterly with the Ottawa river, and what is now the river Trent, which latter falls into Lake Ontario; and by early explorers those smaller waters were termed the Onentoronk lakes, afterwards the Toronto lakes.

The public buildings of Toronto which first attract the eyes of strangers are the Churches with tall tapering spires. The umbrageous avenues leading to the Park carry the visitor to the University and Observatory. Trinity College, Upper Canada College, Knox College, Model School, the Parliament Buildings, Lunatic Asylum. the New Prison, St. James' Cemetery, and Necropolis, attract notice; and the General Hospital for its widely beneficent utility demands admiration; St. Lawrence Hall is massive without, commodious within; the City Hall, near it, serves the Corporation with a place of assembly and City offices; St. James' Cathedral, the towers still unfinished, St. Michael's, Zion, Knox's Churches; the Music Hall. Masonic Hall, and Post Office, Mechanics' Institute, and further to the West, Osgoode Hall, the structure in which the higher Courts of law, and the practising lawyers assemble; these and many more. together with banking houses; manufactories; merchants' warehouses; spacious hotels; long extended lines of wharves, with piers abutting into the bay, and the bustle of commerce from sailing and steam vessels, and the several railways,-all stand out grandly contrasted with the Indian wigwams of 1793; or with the village character which attached to Toronto for a space of forty years. After it had become the Capital of Upper Canada, the backward condition of Toronto during the first forty years of this century, was due not alone to its youthfulness or want of resources; but to the ambition of its earlier inhabitants to make their families the first in lineage of a grand land-owning aristocracy. To secure that future greatness they took wild lands into possession which they did not clear and cultivate; consequently roads were not made, so that populous rural districts might sustain a thriving city. To this day many valuable water privileges are sealed up from public use in various parts of Canada, their proprietors enslaved by ambitious or sordid considerations. The thinness of population in Canada, compared with the Western and North-Western States of the Union is due to the fact that working settlers obtain land on easy terms in those States, and have credit for implements, sustenance, and seed grain from the local government; the price to be paid by instalments; whereas in

Canada a contrary system is pursued. Most of the speculators in land hold it, to have it hired from them by tenant-farmers, in hope that they may in time have a large rent-roll, and meanwhile those tenants to clear the land and build the barns. Or, they hold uncultured land awaiting the settlement of small proprietors near it, who by their industry will give value to the estates of speculators who are ambitious and greedy without industry. It was the wide prevalence of such practices, together with the assumption of exclusive political functions and offices in the families possessing the largest domains of wilderness, that led to the insurrection of 1837. The Government has been popularized since then. The Executive is responsible to the people; but no liberal system of inducing a large immigration to seek Canada for a home in preference to the Western States has been yet adopted in practice. The development of rail-ways tends to correct this mistaken policy.

EDUCATIONAL INSTITUTIONS—LITERARY SOCIETIES.

TORONTO being the fountain head of the Canada School System. now as widely useful and as perfect as any in the world, a sketch of the Educational Institutions of the city may give the reader pleasing ideas of Provincial progress. In 1789, Governor General Lord Dorchester (the Colonel Carleton who fought with Wolfe at Quebec, in 1759), instructed the Surveyor General to set apart two lots in each township for the endowment of schools. The subject engaged the attention of the Imperial and Colonial Governments in 1796, but nothing was done until 1798, when lands were set apart by the Crown for the support of a University and Grammar Schools. In 1807, the Parliament of Upper Canada passed its first enactment relating to education, by establishing Grammar Schools in each district of the Province, the country not being then arranged in counties as now. In 1816, provision was made for opening Common Schools by an annual grant of £6,000, and by authorizing the inhabitants of any town, village or township to make arrangements for Common Schools therein, and to choose three fit and discreet persons as their Trustees, to examine into the moral character and acity of any person willing to become a Teacher, and appoint , if approved; also to select text-books, subject to a Local Board Education. In 1820, this annual grant was lessened to £2,500. 824, provision was first made for "books and tracts designed to wird moral and religious instruction." During the years of politistrife which followed, little was accomplished except the appointand of a Parliamentary Commission, in 1836, to enquire into the em of education in other countries. The result was a valuable ort and draft of a bill; but the insurrectionary crisis of 1837 vented legislative action to give it effect. In 1841, on the Union

of the Provinces under Lord Sydenham's Government, a system of Common Schools was definitely established and endowed with ample funds. But the measure intended to apply to the United Province was found imperfect, and accordingly a separate law for each section of Canada was passed in 1843. Several modifications of the School Acts have been since effected, the most important of which was the institution of Separate Schools for Roman Catholics in Upper Canada.

THE NORMAL AND MODEL SCHOOLS.

In 1836, Mrs. Jamieson, a writer favourably known in British literature, resided for a time in Toronto, and urged on the Canadian public the establishment of Common Schools; and, as auxiliary to these, a Normal School for the training of Teachers. In a book afterwards published, that lady animadverted severely on the apathy of Canadian public men in relation to that subject. Mr. Hodgins. in one of his useful Reports just quoted from, remarks that the subject of a Normal School, as necessary to the completion of a National system of education, engaged public attention in 1836; but nothing was accomplished until after the appointment, in 1844, of the Rev. Egerton Ryerson as Chief Superintendent of education. A bill which he drafted became law in May, 1846, and in July of that year the Board of Education (subsequently termed Council of Public Instruction) was appointed for the purpose of establishing the Normal and Model Schools and selecting text-books for the schools of the Province. The Old Government House was opened as the school on the 1st of November, 1847. On the removal of the Seat of Government from Montreal to Toronto, in 1849, measures were taken for the immediate erection of buildings for the Institution. The Legislature, in 1850, appropriated £15,000 for the purchase of a site and erection of buildings, and an additional £10,000 in 1852. The corner-stone of the new buildings was laid by the Governor General, the Earl of Elgin, 2nd of July, 1851, and the premises were formally opened on the 24th of November, 1852.

The Institution, of which a pictorial view is given on another page, consists of a Normal School and two Model Schools—the former the school of instruction by lecture, the latter the school of instruction by practice. The students in the former are young persons whose ages vary from 16 to 30, or over; while the pupils in the latter are children of ages between 5 and 16 years. In the Normal School the teachers in training are instructed in the principles of education, and the b st methods of communicating knowledge to the youth placed under their care; they are taught how to teach; and in the Model Schools they are taught to give practical effect to those instructions under the direction of teachers previously trained in the Normal School. The Model Schools are designed by the system of instruction pursued, and by general arrangement, to be the model of all the Public Schools of the Province.

The building is situated on the centre of an open square measuring seven and a half acres, on elevated ground, distant from the Bay about three quarters of a mile.

MUSEUM.—In connection with the Model School is an Educational Museum, containing specimens of school apparatus and furniture, a collection of Italian, Dutch and Flemish oil paintings, and statuary, casts, and busts. This Museum is freely open to the public.

Public School Libraries.—Their head-quarters Depository is in the Normal School buildings. Each School and Municipal Corporation desirous of establishing Free Public Libraries is aided by the Educational Department granting one hundred per cent. on local appropriations, and by supplying books from the Depository. At the end of 1863 the Libraries, in that way established, numbered 576, with over 1,200 sub-divisions, and containing 205,122 volumes.

The whole number of Educational Institutions reported open in Upper Canada in 1863 was 4,588; the pupils attending them numbered 375,333; the sum of \$1,803,493 was expended in their support.

Grammar Schools.—These act as a connecting link between the Common Schools and the University, and are designed to give instruction in the branches of a practical English and commercial education, including the elements of Mechanics and Natural Philosophy; and also in the Greek and Latin languages, and in Mathematics, so far as to prepare students for University College, or any College affiliated to the University of Toronto.

THE UNIVERSITY OF TORONTO.

The University of Toronto was established by Royal Charter, dated. 15th March, 1827, and was styled "King's College" on 3rd January, 1828. It was endowed by Patent, with a grant of lands which, at the request of the Parliament of Upper Canada, had been set apart by the Crown for that purpose in 1798. In 1843, the arrangements having been completed for opening the University, the formal inaugurations of the Institution and first admission of students took place on the 8th of June of that year, and its first Convocation on the 14th of December, 1844. In 1849 the Parliament of Canada, in compliance with the Imperial recommendation "to consider in what manner the University could be best constituted for the benefit of the whole Society," abolished such restrictions as made agreement with the Thirty-Nine Articles of the Church of England compulsory on professors and the holders of scholarships, changed the name from "King's College," and enlarged the powers of Convocation under the title of the University of Toronto. In 1853, Parliament, by an Act, separated the functions of the University from those assigned to it as a College.

The University buildings occupy a charming situation within the woodland limits of the Queen's Park. The Architect was Frederick William Cumberland, Esq., now Managing Director of the Northern

Railway, and Lieutenant-Colonel Commanding the 10th Royal Volunteer Battalion of Infantry. Colonel Cumberland was also Architect of the Normal and Model Schools, of St. James' English Cathedral, and of Osgoode Hall, prominent structures in the city, besides various public buildings situated in different parts of the Province.

UNIVERSITY COLLEGE.

On the first establishment of the Provincial University, the functions of instruction, and of examining for honors and degrees, were continued under the Act of 1849. With a view of adapting the University to a system of affiliated Colleges, the functions were separated, and University College as a distinct Collegiate Institution.

UPPER CANADA COLLEGE.

This Institution was established in the year 1829, by Sir John Colborne, then Lieutenant-Governor of Upper Canada. It was intended for general education, to prepare the way for, and ultimately assist in filling the Provincial University, then only projected. It was built from designs by Mr. J. Chewett, and open for tuition on the 4th of January, 1830. About 2,600 pupils have been entered on its books, a goodly proportion of whom have filled, or fill the most distinguished offices in the Province. Until the city acquired wider and grander proportions, this College, or Royal Grammar School, standing opposite the Government buildings (now infantry barracks) on King Street, was long a chief ornament at the west end; the grounds in which i stands measure nine acres. The buildings consist of a series of brick structures; that in the centre is the College proper, with its boarding hall adjacent, and residences of the Masters on either side; the cost was \$80,000. This College is amply endowed. Its Officers consist of a Principal and twelve Masters. The average number of students is about one hundred and fifty.

UNIVERSITY OF TRINITY COLLEGE.

This Institution owes its existence chiefly to the persevering efforts of the Right Reverend Dr. Strachan, Lord Bishop of Toronto, to repair what he, and Episcopalians in general, believed to have been an act of grievous damage and deep offence to the English Episcopalian Church in Upper Canada, by the secularization of the endowments of King's College, and their transfer to the University of Toronto. The memorandum of a conversation held by the Bishop of Toronto with the late Sir Robert Peel, in England, in 1850, conveys the outlines and spirit of this Episcopalian grievance. Peel was not then Prime Minister—having retired from office in 1846. This memorandum possesses the two-fold interest of being an item in Canadian Ecclesiastical history, and a record of the latest business transacted on earth by the great English statesman:—

"On Monday the 10th of June, 1850, I called at the time appointed. Sir Robert was, at first, distant and reserved : but nevertheless, courteous and encouraging. He heard my statement of the many struggles and final destruction of King's College, and the establishment of a College in its stead, from which religion is virtually excluded, with the most patient attention. 'It seems a strange and outrageous proceeding, so far as I can understand it; but I shall require to study the matter, and make myself acquainted with all the details that I may be fully satisfied in my own mind before I can think of interfering. Indeed. I have so little influence that I fear my interference can be of little use. I suppose,' he said, 'that the new Institution of Toronto University is something like the London College, or the Irish Colleges.' Pardon me, I replied, the London College preys upon no other interest, and is supported from private sources; it unhappily drops religion, but it goes not so far as to exclude it by legal enactment as the Toronto University does.' 'That certainly makes a difference,' he observed. 'It differs also from the Irish Colleges in thisthat the Irish Colleges are supported by the government, and their establishment did not interfere with or injure any other Institution. But the College or University of Toronto is founded on the ruins of King's College, whose Royal Charter it has repealed under the pretence of amending it, and whose endowment of eleven thousand pounds per annum, though secured by a patent from the Crown, and guaranteed by the pledge of three Kings, it has seized and appropriated to itself.' 'Then, if I understand it,' said Sir Robert, 'the Government would have made a parallel case had they seized upon Trinity College, Dublin, and not only destroyed its religious character but endowed with its property all the new Colleges.' answered, would have been a case exactly parallel. "If so,' continued Sir Robert, 'it would seem a case of singular injustice and oppression, and what could never have taken place in England: but I must be more fully satisfied on this point.' He then required me to send a copy of the Statute, and such other papers as I thought might elucidate the subject."

The hypothetical case of Trinity College, Dublin, and the Irish Colleges, as put by Sir Robert Peel and pronounced by the Bishop of Toronto as exactly parallel with the University of Toronto and King's College, seems to diverge considerably from a parallel; but the pursuit of the similitude and the difference, lies beyond the writer's present function. The object of the Bishop in England was to obtain a Royal Charter for a new College. "At another interview," says the Bishop, "I informed Sir Rohert Peel that the Duke of Wellington was favorable to our Church University, and was about to transfer to it some valuable property which his Grace possessed in Canada, to found Scholarships. Sir Robert expressed great pleasure at this communication, and when I took leave, he accompanied me to the door

and shook hands, and parted with great kindness." In a few days after, when the Bishop was about going to see Sir Robert, the fatal accident occurred in St. James' Park—the fall of the horse on which the statesman took his leisurely exercise; the accident terminated fatally, and the British empire mourned. Sufficient funds were provided by voluntary gifts of money and lands in the Province, to build and endow the new Institution. It stands at a short distance apart from the west end of King Street. The engraving on the next page presents a view of the front of the structure and of the grounds.

KNOX'S COLLEGE.

This Institution was founded in 1844, by the "Free Church of Scotland," owing to the disruption which occurred in the previous year in the Scottish Established Church. The union which has been recently effected between the United Presbyterians and the Free—the two going under the name of "Canada Presbyterian Church"—has resulted in large benefits to Knox's College, and to the religious community so widely spread in Canada, whose Ministers are there educated.

ST. MICHAEL'S COLLEGE.

This College was opened in 1852, by the Fathers of the Order of St. Basil, under the auspices of the Roman Catholic Church, and was incorporated by Act of Parliament in 1854. The corporation consists of the Roman Catholic Bishop of Toronto and the Superior and Professors of the College, and may hold property to the value of £1000 currency, per annum.

TORONTO SCHOOL OF MEDICINE.

This School was established in 1843, incorporated in 1851, and in 1853 was affiliated to the University of Toronto.

THE MEDICAL BOARD.—Established 1819; examines candidates and issues licenses to the degree of Doctor of Medicine.

LAW SOCIETY.

The Law Society of Upper Canada was established by Act of Parliament in 1797, to enable the Practitioners of the Law to become a society "for the purpose of securing to this country, and the profession, a learned and honourable body, to assist their fellow-subjects as occasion may require, and to support and maintain the Constitution of the Province."

PROVINCIAL LAND SURVEYORS.

Upper and Lower Canada have each a Board of Examiners, composed of the Commissioner of Crown Lands and eight other persons appointed by the Governor. The Board for Upper Canada meets at Toronto, and the other at Quebec, on the first Monday of January, April, July, and October of each year.

MECHANICS' INSTITUTE.

This Society was established in 1830, and incorporated in 1847, "for the purpose of forming a Library and Reading Room, and of organizing a system of instruction by means of lectures and classes." The lectures have been attractive and instructive. Its reading-room is well supplied with Canadian, English and American periodicals. The library is well filled and well arranged. The present writer can only remark on it as a stranger; but as such, he has found the attendants ready to oblige and always courteous.

THE CANADIAN INSTITUTE.

This originated among members of the Engineering and Surveying professions, in 1849, as a strictly professional society. In 1851, it became more general in character; and on 4th of November of that year a Royal Charter was obtained, defining the objects of the Institute to be—the promotion of the Physical Sciences; the encouragement and advancement of the Industrial Arts and Manufactures; the formation of a Provincial Museum, and the acquisition and dissemination of knowledge connected with the Surveying, Engineering, and Architectural professions. In 1855, it was amalgamated with the Toronto Athenæum. The members conduct and publish a periodical, The Canadian Journal, which in utility, stands in the first order of anything in the Province.

Other literary and educational institutes are the "University Association," "University College Literary and Scientific Society," "Trinity College Literary Institute," "Knox's College Missionary Society," "Medico-Chirurgical and Ethicol Society," "Toronto Literary Association," "Osgood Club." This association was instituted in the Fall of 1848, for the promotion of the study of law. It is limited to members of the Law Society of Upper Canada, and its debates and essays are on questions connected with the laws of England and of Canada. There is also the "Toronto Horticultural Society," its charming gardens and club meetings, to advance the science and practice of floriculture, and a love of the lovliest natural products. Likewise with kindred objects, "The Central Agricultural and Horticultural Club," in connection with the "Board of Agriculture." The utility of this association is without a limit. The grand annual Provincial Fairs and Industrial Exhibitions are its outward demonstrations, but its less prominent influences ramify every day of the year through all the arteries of industry.

THE YOUNG MEN'S ST. PATRICK'S ASSOCIATION

was established in 1855, for the following objects:—"To present to the young Irishmen of Toronto opportunities and incentives to intellectual improvement; to multiply their sources of information; to establish a library, reading from, and debating club; to provide for the delivery of public and private lectures; to procure pecuniary means for benevolent and intellectual purposes; to promote a friendly intercourse between them; and, finally to create, excite, and maintain a warm love for their native land, and a worthy zeal for the honour and character of their race."

YOUNG CANADA DEBATING CLUB, AND BRITISH CANADA DEBATING SOCIETY

are institutions which mark and assist the progress of intellectual development,—the first was organized in 1853, the last in 1856.

THE ONTARIO LITERARY SOCIETY

adds to the subjects entertained by the others, that of Temperance. Many excellent lectures and literary entertainments are given in one or other of the public halls of Toronto by this society, most frequently in the St. Lawrence Hall.

Besides these, nearly every religious congregation has its educational and literary institution; its social anniversaries, and occasionally its summer excursions.

LITERATURE.

In periodical literature, monthly magazines have not been commercially successful.

THE CANADIAN JOURNAL, already noticed, is scientific, and an organ of the Natural History of the Province. It is sustained by a Society.

THE ANGLO AMERICAN MAGAZINE issued for some years by Mr. Thomas Maclear; and the British American Magazine published more recently by Messrs. Rollo & Adams to the extent of two volumes only, deserved a more generous patronage than they received.

The newspapers are less numerous in 1865 than in 1850. The Globe and the Leader are daily journals, which have each a wide and popular circulation. The enterprise of their rival proprietors in collecting general news and special reports by telegraph and otherwise, is always creditable; and in the Summer and Fall of 1864, was remarkable; equal, indeed, to the most successful efforts of English and American journalists. The editorial articles are frequently brilliant, nearly always argumentative and logical. Their blemishes consist at times of an absence of courtesy to opponents, of a tendency to write down and defame the moral reputation of the city and Province, when the rival writers are engaged on some political or electioneering controversy.

TORONTO IN THE WAR OF 1812-'14.

The capture of Toronto by invaders from the United States in 1813. should give it prominence in local history, it having been then the Seat of Government, although a very small town. But local historians seem to have felt the subject too delicate, or painful, or dangerous for a full, free and detailed narrative. Most of what they have published is distempered by efforts to explain why the defence of the town was not successful, serious blame being charged on General Sheaffe, the English commander. The defence was unsuccessful, because impracticable. The matter might rest in obscurity, and any notice of the military and political position of Toronto be omitted from this chapter if there were no possibility, no imminent danger of the city becoming a victim to a ruder assault than that of 27th April, 1813. In view of that imminent danger, the present writer reverts to causes and circumstances of the War of 1812, after which some remarks will be made applicable to the present time. A passage from Bouchette's work of 1832 will show that he, when Surveyor General of the Province, took credit to himself for discernment in warning the authorities at Quebec, that Toronto, as then defended, might be easily captured.

This Capital of Canada West would be more scientifically, valorously defended in 1865 were it now assailed, than it was in 1813; but its assault would also involve a very different array of the arms and appliances of demoniacal naval war. To avoid the provocation of such dire calamities, seems a virtue lying within the limits of common prudence. To avoid their invocation—to cease from the insane defiances of our national neighbour, seems a moral and political duty which any well-balanced intellect, honest patriot, or loyal subject of the Queen, might comprehend. To involve the Province in war, or be accessory in bringing on the event, is a crime in the face of heaven—a murderous treason against this peaceful community.

Bouchette says:—"In the space of five or six years, after 1793-'4, York became a respectable place, and rapidly increased to its present importance. It now (1832) contains a population of 4,000 souls. The pressure of the late war has been considerably felt here, as it was captured by the American army on the 27th of April, 1813. They held it only a few days; but in that time the Government House and all the public buildings and stores were burned, after removing so much of their contents as could be conveniently carried off. The defenceless situation of York, the mode of its capture, and the destruction of the large ship then on the stocks, were but too prophetically demonstrated, in my report to head-quarters, in Lower Canada, on my return from a responsible mission to the Capital of the Upper Province in the early part of April. Indeed the communication of the result of my reconnoitering operations, and the intelligence of the

successful invasion of York, and the firing of the new ship by the enemy, were received almost simultaneously."

An American writer has lately described the relations of political parties in the United States in 1811 and 1812.—Harper's Monthly, May, 1863:—

"The Democratic party, from its birth during Washington's first Administration, had been bitterly hostile to England and friendly towards France. The Federal party, its opponents, on the contrary, was bitterly hostile to France, and desirous of maintaining a good understanding with England. These opposing opinions and feelings were exhibited by strongly-defined party lines in the autumn of 1811. The Democrats, led in Congress by Henry Clay, of Kentucky, John C. Calhoun, of South Carolina, and others, and composing a large majority in the present slave-holding States, were known as the War party. The Federalists, led in Congress by the then mature Josiah Quincy, of Massachusetts, Emott, of New York, and others, having a majority in New England, were the Peace party. The President (Madison) and a majority of his Cabinet, though Democrats, were opposed to war: and the only man among Madison's constitutional advisers who possessed any practical knowledge of military affairs was James Monroe, the Secretary of State. The War party in Congress were the stronger; and during the session of 1811-'12, it was determined that a declaration of hostilities against Great Britain should be made at an early day. That declaration was promulgated late in June, 1812." This writer, in a preceding paragraph, used these phrases as justifying the war. —" For several years the insolence and agression of ever insolent and aggressive England, had made it clear to every sagacious mind that war between the two nations was inevitable."

The inexcusable offensiveness of these phrases, and their untruthfulness, are below the dignity of history. In like manner, as the inexcusable offensiveness of some British and Canadian journalists towards the great nation, our near neighbour, now distracted by civil war, is beneath the dignity of neutral spectators, to say nothing of truth, of prudence, of policy. The more openly expressed cause of war in 1812 was the "British Orders in Council."

In 1806, Napoleon Bonaparte, after the battle of Jena, had brought the kingdom of Prussia under his military dominion, promulgated certain edicts known as the "Berlin Decrees," forbidding all nations, on pain of Napoleon's displeasure, to hold commercial intercourse with Great Britain. Britain was then at war, single-handed against Napoleon and his conquered allies, defending the liberty and independence of nations from subjection to one man's will. Had Britain fallen, America would have been invaded next. So, the Federalists of the North and East feared and believed. Hence, they sympathized with England. They loved liberty for its own sake, and believed

Britain to be its champion before the world. The Democrats, influenced by fugitive traitors from British soil, in union with the slave powers of the South, sided with France, with Napoleon, with despotism.

To counteract the Berlin Decrees, Great Britain issued the Orders in Council, dated January 7, 1807. They began thus:—"Whereas, the French Government has issued certain decrees which, in violation of the usages of war, purport to prohibit the commerce of all nat ons with his Majesty's dominions; and also to prevent such nations from trading with any other country in any articles the growth or manufacture of his Majestv's dominions; and, whereas, the said Government has also taken upon itself to declare all his Majesty's dominions to be in a state of blockade at a time when the fleets of France and her allies are themselves confined within their own ports, by the superior valor and discipline of the British navy." Then followed the Orders in Council forbidding other nations to trade with France. No nation suffered so much from the Orders as England herself. They laid the foundation of the American manufactures which ever afterward grew in rivalry to those of Britain and Ireland. They would have been revoked in conformity to British public opinion, although America had made no motion against them. Committees of Parliament had condemned them; and it was known in America that they would be revoked. They were in fact revoked before the American declaration of war, and that event was not believed as likely to happen until it had astonished Britain by its occurrence.

Numerous passages, such as the following, might now be quoted from leading American statesmen of that time. In Congress, when secretly debating whether to declare war, Mr. Sheffey, of Virginia, said:—"I know gentlemen will stare at me, when I contend that they are going to war against Great Britain while she is struggling for the liberties of the world. But that has great weight on my mind. She is the only power that has stemmed the torrent of universal despotism. The man has little experience of the human heart who believes that there will remain any security for us, after the maritime dominion, as well as the dominion of the land should be concentrated in the hands of the great Napoleon. These consequences have always been the same. When they have subdued the world they sit down and shed tears because they can find no other world to conquer. One victory over Great Britain would be our defeat."

Mr. Randolph said:—"With chiefs of banditti, negro or mulatto, we can treat or trade. Name, however, but England, and all our antipathies are up against her. Against whom? Against those whose blood runs in our veins; in common with whom we can claim Shakspeare and Newton and Chatham for our countrymen; whose form of government is the freest on earth—our own only excepted; from whom every valuable principle of our own institutions has been borrowed: representation, jury trial, voting the supplies, writs of habeas co: pus,

our civil and criminal jurisprudence—against our fellow Protestants identified in blood, in language, in religion with ourselves."

At a Convention of thirty-three Counties and City Corporations of the State of New York, held in the Capitol at the City of Albany, on the 17th and 18th days of September, 1812, resolutions were passed from which the following passages are extracted:-"Resolved, that without insisting on the injustice of the present war, taking solely into account the time and circumstances of its declaration, the condition of the country and state of the public mind, we are constrained to consider and feel it our duty to pronounce it a most rash, unwise, and inexpedient measure—the adoption of which ought forever to deprive its authors of the esteem and confidence of an enlightened people: because, as the injuries we have sustained from France are at least equal in amount to those we have sustained from England, and have been attended with circumstances of still greater insult and aggravation-if war were necessary to vindicate the honor of the countryconsistency and impartiality required that both nations should have been included in the declaration. Because, if it were deemed expedient to exercise our right of selecting our adversary, prudence and common sense dictated the choice of an enemy, from whose hostility we have nothing to dread. A war with France would equally have satisfied our insulted honor, and at the same time, instead of annihilating, would have revived and extended our commerce. Even the evils of such a contest would have been mitigated by the sublime consolation that by our contributing to arrest the progress of despotism in Europe, we were essentially serving the great interests of freedom and humanity throughout the world.

"Because; before a war was declared, it was perfectly well ascertained that a vast majority in the middle and Northern States, by whom the burden and expenses of the contest must be borne almost exclusively, were strongly opposed to the measure. And because, we see no rational prospect of obtaining, by force of arms, the objects for which our rulers say we are contending."

The Orders in Council having been revoked, the Convention of New York State proceeded on that fact to say:—

"And whereas, the revocation of the British Orders in Council has removed the great and ostensible cause of the present war, and prepared the way for an immediate accommodation of all existing differences, inasmuch as by the admission of the present Secretary of State, satisfactory and honorable arrangements might easily be made by which the abuses resulting from the impressment of our seamen, might in future be effectually prevented."

The Americans planned to invade Canada at three points; by way of Detroit in the West; at Niagara in the centre; and by the St. Lawrence, in the East. "The project,' says the hostile writer before cited, "was freely discussed in official circles at Washington four or

five months before war was declared, and preparations were made for its execution." Lieutenant-Governor Brock, then at Toronto, on hearing of the American declaration of war, at once demanded from the Upper Canada Parliament an Act to suspend habeas corpus and to establish martial law. It was demurred to as unnecessary. But the exigency of circumstances soon after armed the Executive with that military despotism, which Brock desired, and which is indispensable in any country when involved in war. The American army advanced through the wilderness of Ohio, footsore, hungry, clamorous, undisciplined, their clothes torn in the bush by a march of three weeks from their rendezvous to Detroit, over a space of ground where railways would now carry an army of far greater proportions in six hours. Five millions of inhabitants, industriously employed, now occupy the country westward of Lake Erie, and bordering on the upper lakes. which was, in 1812, the hunting grounds of the savage, railroads lead to Chicago, with nearly two thousand cars available for transports: five lines of railway lead to Detroit, at present interchanging peaceful traffic with the railroads of Canada. Toledo, Cleveland, Buffalo, Rochester, and all the lake cities of the States, stand fortified by railroad connection with the American interior, where only villages of log cabins or dense forests and far-spreading wastes were seen in 1812. Steam navigation has come into being since then; and electric telegraphs. Where a few feeble schooners, in the guise of war ships, waited for fair winds, or were tossed in the tempest of the great lakes, before attacking some ill-defended village, as Toronto then was, on the opposite Canada shore, steam rams of war would operate now long-armed demons, shooting missiles of destruction from distances where defenders the most valiant of heart and strong in the arm could not touch them in return. Is it good that Canada should hide its head in a bush, that it may see none of those changed circumstances?

The first campaign of the Americans in 1812 was in no way creditable to their previous pretensions. In April, 1813, General Dearborn and Commodore Chauncy, commanding the military and naval forces, proceeded to carry their plans of invasion into practice. The first movement was against York—the "Little Muddy York" then—the gay, the good, the beautiful Queen City of Toronto now. By the American account, "Dearborn embarked about seventeen hundred men on Chauncy's fleet, at Sackett's Harbour, on the 22nd of April, and on the 25th the expedition sailed for York. After a tempestury soyage they appeared off the doomed town and prepared to land. Dearborn was suffering from ill-health. He placed Brigadier-General Zebulon Pike in active command of the land troops, and remained on board the flag-ship."

The traditions and records of Toronto relate that on the evening of the 26th of April, 1813, information was received that many vessels had been seen to the eastward. Very early next morning they were

descried while tacking towards land, westward of the harbour. On the evening of the 25th some of the families of the higher officials and mercantile aristocracy had been enjoying a re-union at the Garrison: the sociality was to be continued on the evening of the 26th, at the house of one of the city matrons. This lady had all preparations made, and the other ladies had assembled. No gentlemen came except one, after a long time of suspense. He informed them that though there seemed no immediate danger, the Commandant of the Garrison, Major-General Sheaffe, had ordered the King's troops and Provincial Militia under arms: and that the men being on military duty, the women had better go home. And so they went - each mother to her children, and daughter to her mother or other friends. to gather up and secure their valuables. On the morning of the 27th. when the troops and militia, and other male citizens, and Indian allies, went forth to oppose the landing of the enemy, at a point near the mouth of the small river Humber, three miles westward, the women and children assembled to endure that indescribable misery which only the tender-hearted, the timid, or the bold-spirited woman can feel—the latter debarred by her sex and usages of society from fighting in the field of carnage and death. Oh! the agony of such a time as that. the women of Toronto heard what, until too late, they never believed they would hear-the great guns and small guns, and bugles and Indian yells; and saw dense smoke covering the water and the woodland bush; also, they heard of the Indians fleeing from battle: then they saw the Glengarry and other militia returning to town, not quite in the manner of a well-performed field-day. After that came the King's troops in sight, small in number at best, but not all retreating then. The entire Grenadier Company of the 8th Infantry, and most of another Company of that Regiment, remained at their post in the woods-dead. They did not flinch, and so fell, a goodly number of the Militia with them.

After that arose a fierce fire and smoke, followed by a dull, rumbling roar, which shook the infant city of Little York. The retreating garrison had blown up one of the powder magazines in the fort; timber, stones, splinters, earth, were thrown aloft and scattered around, killing forty of the British garrison; slaying of the Americans fifty-two, and wounding about eighty more. Of these were the commander, General Zebulon Pike, and two of his aides. Pike was carried on board the flag-ship. He died there, and was buried at Sackett's Harbor.

General Sheaffe retreated with the King's troops, crossed the Don, and marched towards Kingston, leaving Little York to its own discretion. It surrendered. Resistance would have been utter ruin. The enemy gave a guarrantee of safety to life and private property, not well observed. They destroyed much private property, as well as all government stores, and took as prize a new vessel of war, and burned

a frigate on the stocks. From the Parliament House they took the Speaker's mace and perriwig, which, by somebody's freak, was called a human scalp, and sent them as trophies of war to the city of Washington. The British military chest was missing. It had been hidden. The Americans denied having found it. Its proper custodian averred that he never saw it again. Tradition has something to say of it, but traditions may be calumnies.

Dearborn landed and took command after the surrender. A few days later he sailed with his troops across the lake, to prepare for an attack on Fort George, at the mouth of the Niagara River. On the 13th of July, in the same year (1813,) an American force returned to Toronto, but did not long remain.

The writer of this chapter reproduces a passage from one of many articles written by him since the beginning of the war in America, in 1861. His participation as a soldier in active service in the internecine wars of Spain, in the years 1835 to 1838, has long since taught him that the most monstrously wicked of all wars is that where the combatants kill and curse in the same mother tongue:—

"New complications may arise between Britain and France as well as between Britain and the United States. A recurrence of panics about a French invasion of England may at any time arise with still deeper perplexities than at any time before. The British army in Canada might not be reinforced; gunboats expected for the lakes might never come, if Napoleon pleased to play England false. rams-of-war of France might be seen in grim fraternity with the ironsided rams of America. The commerce of the two hemispheres-of all the seas and gulfs of the globe plundered, burned, or sunk by privateers on one side of the war or the other, and on all sides. Britain paralyzed in her strong right arm of manufacturing and commercial industry, the supply of the raw material of manufactures not alone interrupted from the Southern American States, but from every country of the world, chased or annihilated by hostile scourges of the Alabamas playing havoc in those days on the wrong side. The sordid traitors to their Queen and country who, in 1862 and 1863, have built them on the Mersey and the Clyde, in breach of British neutrality, standing accursed of the people in presence of the British empire immersed in the baptism of the fires of war and of famine; and of pestilence, the weird sister of war and famine.

"Such, Mr. Roebuck, of Sheffield, may be the result of your crazy counsels. Such, Mr. Laird, of Liverpool, will possibly be the early convulsion of nations in which your sordid iniquity is preparing to plunge the British empire.

"And you, the suicidal section of the newspaper press of Canada, happily a minority of the whole, mocking common sense by retaining the otherwise respectable name of 'Moderate' and 'Conservative,' and outraging all moderation in blindly, prodigally goading to im-

placable anger our nearest, our next-door neighbour, struggling, struggling as that great nation has been during the last two years in the noblest efforts that could engage the sympathy of Conservatives the preservation of their nationality, the repression of internal rebellion. What of you, in that day which I have depicted—in that conflagration which you will have contributed to kindle? You will stand, not as Cassandra stood, in frantic joy at the havoc of your torch; you will be sniffed out, extinguished in the dread convulsion of this distracted Province; your types, presses, editorial chairs, in the custody of the Provost Marshal. That is where you are insanely driving innocent, industrious, peaceable Canada."
