Gill had the job to plaster his nob



He went to the brook,





But, when she came there, the cupboard was bare,


And so the poor Doggie got none.

She went to the Baker's to buy him some bread; But, when she came back, the poor Doggie was dead.


She went to the Joiner's to buy him a coffin;

## OLD MOTHER HUBBARD.—Continued.


She took a clean dish to get him some tripe;

LITTLE Jack Horner sat in a corner,



He put in his thumb, and pull'd out a plum, And said, "What a good boy am I!"






