




Ruins of Acadia Sugar Refinery.—The steamer "Imo" was beached just across the channel to the right.




Devastated Homes in Richmond.—St. Joseph's School on left.




Belgian Relief Ship "Imo." which collided with the French munition ship "Mont Blanc,"





St. John's Presbyterian Church, Brunswick St.—Most of congregation lived in vicinity and were injured or killed. Copyrighted in Canada 1917




Emmanuel Church, Dartmouth.—There was great loss of life and property on the Dartmouth side.




Desolation in Dartmouth.-A few of the many residences destroyed.




Soldiers Searching for Victims.—Here hundreds of homes were reduced to kindling wood.




View from Fort Needham, showing general desolation of vast area over a mile from the explosion.

Gottingen Street.—Of many beautiful residences only destroyed foundations now remain.




Alexander McKaye School.—Though badly damaged, it was used as a relief depot, where food was supplied to sufferers.




Gottingen Street, looking south at corner of Bilby Street.




Hillis & Sons' Foundry—Only three men are known to have escaped death A member of the firm was killed here. Photo by MacLaughlan




Richmond Printing Company's Building.—About thirty girls and several men, employed here, were killed. Photo by MacLaughlau




North Street Station.—Entrance from street. The glass roof was blown in and many people injured and killed. Photo by Cox Bros.




North Street Station.-View from rear, showing cars loaded with debris.



Imperial Oil Company Tank Wagon.—Dead horse in foreground. Tank blown twenty feet.






Fire Engine "Patricia."-Note that half of steering wheel is missing. The driver's hand, severed at the wrist, was found at some distance.








City Market.—In business section, over two miles from explosion. Part of rcof, windows and doors blown in.




Ruins of St. Joseph's School and St. Joseph's Church.




One of the Homes Destroyed.—It is not known at this time whether the occupants escaped. In many cases whole families were wiped out.




Entrance to New Camp Hill Hospital.—Filled to the doors with hundreds of injured. Copyrighted in Canada 1917




Nova Scotia Technical College.—Converted into Central Medical Supply Depot for twenty-five hospitals and thirteen dressing stations,




First Hospital Train, with about 250 injured, leaving for Truro hospitals.






Wreckage of Cars in Freight Yard.




