FOURTH SESSION.

TUESDAY, 7th December, 1875.

At 2 p. m. the Council met pursuant to adjournment.

Present—The Warden, Messrs. J. W. Bell, W. A. Bell, Denison, Doller, Gilmour, Ham, Hott, C. W. Huffman, J. C. Huffman, Lane, Madden, Parrott, Perry, Ross, Spafford, Storr and Watson.

The Warden in the chair.

The Minutes of the last day of the June Session were read and approved.

A communication from A. Carlyle, Esq., B. A., resigning the position of Member of the Board of Examiners for this County, was received;

Also one from Templeton & Beeman, respecting the advertising of Schedules of Convictions, which was referred to Committee on Education and Printing.

A number of accounts were presented and referred.

The Council adjourned until 10 a. m. to-morrow.

SECOND DAY.

WEDNESDAY, 8th December, 1875.

At 10 a. m. the Council met.

All the members present.

The Warden in the chair.

The Minutes of yesterday were read and approved.

Moved by Mr. W. A. Bell, seconded by Mr. Perry,

That P. L. Dorland, Esq., B. A., Head Master of Newburgh High School be appointed a Member of the Board of Examiners, in place of A. Carlyle, Esq., resigned.

Moved by Mr. Storr, seconded by Mr. Madden,

That in order to economize in the expenditure of the appropriations for the County Roads, it is expedient to appoint a competent person as County Engineer, whose duty it shall be not only to have the general supervision of the County Roads, but also to examine and report to the Council, on the first day of the June Session, the state of such roads, and where, according to his judgment, it is necessary to expend such appropriations, and that a By-Law be passed for appointing such person.

In amendment, moved by Mr. C. W. Huffman, seconded by Mr. Parrott,

That the subject of appointing a County Engineer be deferred until the January Session of 1876.

The amendment was put and lost, and the original motion was carried, the yeas and nays being taken thereon as follows:

YEAS—Messrs Denison, Gilmour, Ham, Hott, J. C. Huffman, Madden, Paul, Perry, Preston, Purdy, Ross, Storr and Watson.—13.

NAYS—Messrs. J. W. Bell, W. A. Bell, Doller, C. W. Huffman, Lane, Parrott and Spafford.—7.

The following communications were read and referred to the Committee on County Property:

From J. W. Langmuir, Esq., respecting salary of Turnkey.

From D. A. Waddell, foreman of Coroner's jury.

Moved by Mr. Watson, seconded by Mr. Storr,

That whereas the Government of Ontario were memorialized by this Council, in February, 1872, in reference to the sum due

to this County, amounting to \$6,000, so long neglected, be it

Resolved, That a Committee be appointed to prepare and transmit a memorial to the Government, while Parliament is in session, urging our just claim through our local representatives, and that such Committee be composed of Messrs. Perry, J. W. Bell and the mover and seconder.

Mr. Watson brought up the report of the Special Committee respecting Paupers in the goal, which was read and adopted.

Moved by Mr. Spafford, seconded by Mr. Storr,

That the County Clerk be requested to lay before this Council all correspondence between himself and the Attorney-General, respecting the printing of Schedules of Convictions and advertising the sittings of Courts.

Carried.

The Council adjourned till 2 p. m.

At 2 p. m. the Council resumed.

Mr. Perry brought up the Report of Special Committee respecting planting Trees along the County Road, which was read and adopted.

Moved by Mr. Madden, seconded by Mr. Gilmour,

That Messrs. Perry, Storr, J. W. Bell, and Watson, be a Committee to prepare and submit to this Council a By-Law, defining the duties of a County Engineer, and for appointing such officer.

YEAS.—Messrs. Denison, Gilmour, Hott, J. C. Huffman, Lane, Madden, Paul, Perry, Preston, Storr and Watson—11.

NAYS—Messrs. J. W. Bell, W. A. Bell, Doller, Hain, C. W. Huffman, Parrott, Ross and Spafford—8.

Moved by Mr. Storr, seconded by Mr. C. W. Huffman,

That Messrs. Spafford, Perry and J. C. Huffman be a Committee to prepare a Memorial to the Government of Ontario, asking that when a County Council lets out by public tender the

County Printing, including Schedules of Convictions, they be permitted to accept the lowest tender. Carried.

The Coucil adjourned until 10 a. m. to-morrow.

THIRD DAY.

THURSDAY, 9th December, 1875.

At 10 a. m. the Council met.

All the members present.

The Warden in the chair.

The Minutes of yesterday were read and approved.

Moved by Mr. Perry, seconded by Mr. Madden,

That whereas, by a decision of Judge Wilkison, it appears that By-Law No. 14, of this Corporation, is invalid, since the passing of the Municipal Act of 1873, the powers previously held by County Councils on the subject being thereby withdrawn, and delegated to local municipalities, and it is thought by many that the said Act also makes invalid certain By-Laws previously enacted by the various local municipalities: Therefore it is deemed advisable that the Clerk be instructed to obtain a legal opinion in regard to the matter.

Carried.

Moved by Mr. J. C. Huffman, seconded by Mr. Ross,

That as it is necessary to deepen the cistern in the Court House ground, this Council, in connection with the Town Council of Napanee, do appropriate a sum sufficient for the purpose. Carried.

Mr. J. C. Huffman reported regarding Immigrants arriving at Napanee during the past summer.

The matter was referred to the Finance Committee.

The Council adjourned until 2 p. m.

At 2 p. m. the Council resumed.

Mr. Watson brought up a report from the Committee appointed respecting School Section No. 20, in Ernesttown, which was read, adopted and ordered to be printed with the Minutes.

Mr. Storr, with leave, introduced a By-Law providing for the appointment of a County Engineer, which was read and referred to Committee of the whole, for a second reading—rule suspended.

Mr. Ham in the Chair.

The Council resumed, and the chairman reported that the By-Law had not been read a second time, but that the Committee recommended that the further consideration of the By-Law be deferred until the January session.

The report was received and adopted.

Mr. Spafford brought up the report of the Committee on Education and Printing, which was read and adopted with an amendment.

A communication from T. W. Casey, Esq., publisher of the "Express" newspaper, was received and read.

Mr. Perry introduced a By-Law relating to the planting of trees along the County Roads, which was read, and ordered for a second reading to-morrow.

Mr. Spafford brought up a report from the Committee appointed respecting School Sections Nos. 13 and 14, in Camden East, which was adopted and ordered to be printed with the Minutes.

The Council adjourned until 10 a. m. to-morrow.

FOURTH DAY.

FRIDAY, 10th December, 1875.

At 10 o'clock a. m., the Council met.

Present—All the members.

The Warden in the chair.

The Minutes of yesterday were read and approved.

Upon motion, the By-Law respecting planting Trees was referred to Committee of the whole for a second reading.

Mr. Storr in the chair.

The Council resumed, and the chairman reported progress and asked leave to sit again at the next session of the Council.

Leave granted.

The Council adjourned until 2 p. m.

At 2 p. m. the Council resumed.

Mr. Doller, chairman, brought up the report of the Committee on County Property, which was read and referred to Committee of the whole.

Mr. Spafford in the chair.

The Council resumed, and the chairman reported that the report had been passed in committee, and upon motion the report of the Committee on County Property was adopted.

Mr. Watson, chairman, brought up the report of the Special Committee, respecting aid from the Government for building goal walls, with a memorial on the subject, which were read and adopted.

Mr. Storr, chairman, brought up the report of the Committee on Dredging, which was read and adopted.

Moved by Mr. W. A. Bell, seconded by Mr. Ross,

That having heard the report and statements of the Com-

mittee appointed to guard the interests of the County in connection with dredging Napanee River, this Council is satisfied that the said Committee have faithfully discharged the duties devolving upon them, and it is hereby resolved, that they be paid the same remuneration for their services as they receive when attending the sessions of this Council.

Carried.

Mr. J. W. Bell, chairman, brought up the report of the Special Committee in regard to accounts paid for County Roads, which was read and adopted.

Moved by Mr. Spafford, seconded by Mr. C. W. Huffman,

That the Treasurer be requested to lay before this Council, to-morrow, a statement shewing the amount of income and expenditure for the present year.

The Council adjourned until 10 a. m. to-morrow.

FIFTH DAY.

SATURDAY, 11th December, 1875.

At 10 a. m. the Council met.

All the members present.

The Warden in the chair.

The Minutes of yesterday were read and adopted.

Mr. Perry, chairman, brought the second report of the Committee on Roads and Bridges, which was read and adopted.

Moved by Mr. Doller, seconded by Mr. Denison,

That the account of John Cline, for wood, amounting to \$14, be paid. Carried.

Moved by Mr. Perry, seconded by Mr. Ross,

That William George be paid \$5.00 for attendance on Council. Carried.

Mr. Watson, chairman, brought up the report of the Finance Committee, which was read and adopted.

Moved by Mr. J. W. Bell, seconded by Mr. Denison,

That Wm. F. Asselstine be paid the sum of ten dollars, for repairing culverts, Sheffield Road in Camden, and the amount be deducted from the next appropriation for that road.

Carried.

Moved by Mr. W. A. Bell, seconded by Mr. Ham,

That the Warden be paid the sum of ten dollars for contingent expenses. Carried.

Moved by Mr. Watson, seconded by Mr. Perry,

That this Council learns with extreme regret that the family of our esteemed friend, Mr. Purdy, have been thrown into the deepest affliction by the loss of a favorite son, in the disaster to the steamship "Pacific," and we desire to express our feelings of sympathy and condolence in their bereavement.

Carried unanimously.

Moved by Mr. Denison, seconded by Mr. Watson,

That the thanks of this Council are due and are hereby cordially tendered to the Warden for his impartial conduct in the chair.—Carried unanimously.

The Council adjourned.

On the subject of Planting Trees on the Sides of County Roads, running North and South.

That a premium of one dollar for each tree be offered to each Municipality, or each individual owning property on each side of said road—for planting evergreen trees, two rods apart, on all such roads, for all such trees as may be found growing and thrifty for three years after planting; and that any Municipality or individual availing themselves of such offer be requested to report to the Clerk of this County, the date when such trees were planted, and the Clerk shall keep a record of the same in order to ascertain when such trees were planted.

They beg leave to bring in a By-Law, at this session, on the subject.

Report on Dredging.

Your Committee beg leave to report :

That immediately after the June session, in accordance with your instructions, entered into contract with Cornelius Daly, Esq., to dredge the Napanee River, at \$7.50 per hour, but within two weeks, Mr. Kingsford, Chief Engineer, informed us we had no right to enter into any such contract ; that the contract must be with the Government and not with the corporations, and that we could in no way interfere with the work, also that we had employed certain persons in connection therewith that must be dismissed. At this your committee demurred, thinking we had a perfect right to have some person to guard the interests of the County on the dredge. But in consequence of this Mr. Kingsford at once dismissed Mr. Daly, so far as the Government was concerned, stating that the Government had nothing to do with the contract.

Your committee being thus ignored, thought they could be of no more service and would have withdrawn at once, but after explanations were made by your committee, Mr. Kingsford informed us his only desire was to do us a good job, which with the amount granted, he believed could be done, and desired your committee to continue their assistance, and scrutinize the work and report to him at any time when discovering anything wrong with the work.

Your committee therefore continued their services, and did everything in their power to guard and protect the interests of the County.

And your committee are of the opinion that we got a very good job done, though not all that could be desired. The Engineer says we require a basin, in the harbour, and a wider

channel in one place, which will require a small additional grant, and that he will recommend the same to the Government.

The work already performed by the contractor is 1628½ hours amounting to \$12,211.86 expended as shown by a certified statement from the department.

On Roads and Bridges.

Your Committee on Roads and Bridges beg leave to bring in their first report for this session :

During the recess a bridge over the Salmon River, between the County of Hastings and Lennox and Addington, became unsafe for travel, and it was imperative that a new one should be built. The Warden and the Committee on County Property, with the authorities from the County of Hastings, proceeded to erect a new one, which cost the sum of \$468.82, and that our County became responsible for one-half of said sum.

Your committee recommend that W. N. Doller, the chairman on County Property, be paid the sum \$30, for services performed at the building of said bridge, and the sum of \$4.00 be paid

to the Warden for like services, and Mr. Storr \$9.00 for like services.

In the matter of an outlay on a bridge between Napanee and Newburgh, your committee would recommend that \$12.06 be paid to H. B. Rathbun, who furnished plank to that amount, and that there be paid to Edward Vine the sum of \$13.95, for performing the work on said bridge, and said two sums be taken from the grant of the year 1876, for that part of the County Road owned in Richmond.

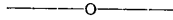

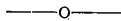
All the above nominations were severally put and negatived, except that for the appointment of Mr. D. E. Rose, which was carried.

WEDNESDAY, 26th January, 1876.

At 10 a. m. the Council met.

All the members present.

The Warden in the chair.

The Minutes of yesterday were read and adopted.

The Warden laid before the Council a communication from Hon. S. C. Wood, respecting Immigrants, which was referred to a Special Committee composed of Messrs. Storr, Doller, Lane, and J. C. Huffman.

Also, a communication from H. M. Deroche, Esq., M. P. P., notifying the Council that the Government will grant \$6000 in aid of improvement to gaol.

Dr. Palmer, of the Institution of the Deaf and Dumb, at Belleville, was introduced and addressed the Council.

That Benjamin Davy be granted a license to peddle with one horse, for one year, for the sum of eight dollars. Carried.

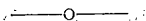

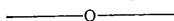

School Inspector's Report.

NAPANEE, JUNE 10th, 1876.

To the Warden and Members of the County Council of Lennox and Addington :

GENTLEMEN :—

I have the honor to submit for your information the following

statistics and remarks regarding the schools of this County for 1875 :

The total amount raised for school purposes during the year was \$39,149, of which \$26,404 went for teachers' salaries, an excess of \$6,869 over amount paid Teachers in 1871. Of the total amount raised, \$7,341 came from Legislative Grant and invested moneys, leaving \$31,808 from direct tax.

The whole number of pupils registered during the year was 6,639—3,461 boys and 3,178 girls, being an average of 56 to each teacher. The aggregate average attendance for 1st half-year was 2,716, and for second half-year 2,511, a slight improvement on preceeding year. 92 children, between ages of 7 and 12, were reported as not attending any school.

The pupils were classified as follows :—1,999 in First Book, 1,518 in Second, 2,420 in Third, 688 in Fourth and 13 in Fifth. All were in reading, spelling, writing, arithmetic and geography. 2,232 were in drawing, 1,463 vocal music, 3,066 grammar, 2,889 composition, 143 chemistry and botany, 419 English and Canadian History, 83 Natural History, and 41 in Algebra, Natural Philosophy and Geometry.

Of the 117 teachers (29 males and 88 females) employed, 3 held first-class Provincial Certificates, 10 second-class Provincial, 8 first-class Old County Board, 26 second-class Old Board, 59 third-class New Board, and 11 permits—the last mentioned being held chiefly by teachers in the back Townships.

The highest salary paid a male teacher was \$575, and the lowest \$216. The highest salary paid a female teacher was \$360, and the lowest \$144. The average salary of male teachers was \$392, and of female teachers \$212.

Of the school houses, 19 were brick, 6 stone, 75 frame, and 10 log, total 110 ; of which 42 have been built since the enactment of the school law of 1871.

Total number of Maps, 628, Globes 95 ; 87 schools are sup-

plied with object lessons, tablets, &c.; 22 school libraries, containing 1,025 volumes, were reported.

Nearly all these requisites have been furnished since my first inspection of the schools- In 43 schools prize books were distributed, thereby greatly increasing the supply of good, wholesome reading matter for the young.

I am glad to be able to call your attention to the greatly increased expenditure on account of Teachers' salaries, as this indicates a higher appreciation of the Teacher's work.

Still we have too many trustees whose parsimony impels them to hire the cheapest teachers they can find, to the great detriment of education in their sections. It too frequently happens that the sole qualification regarded in the selection of a trustee is his ability "to keep down taxes," however much this course may interfere with the best interests of his school.

Among other things which stand in the way of attaining that high degree of success which it is desirable our schools should reach, I might mention the unequal burdens of local taxation for the support of schools which arises from the great disparity in the valuation of the various school sections. We frequently find one section four or five times the assessed value of another in the same township, and of course, to sustain a school of equal expense in each, the ratepayer in the poorer section will have to pay four or five times as much on the dollar as his fellow rate-payer in the richer section.

In the absence of a Township Board, which is the grand specific for this most inequitable feature of the present school section system, a Township Council might relieve the difficulty considerably by taking advantage of the clause of the School Act which allows it to raise money from the whole Township at a uniform rate, and to distribute the amount so raised among the respective school sections in proportion to the teachers' salaries.

We have still to complain of the evil of irregular attendance, which greatly hinders the progress of many of our schools, and mars the best efforts of teachers.

On behalf of the *poor schools* of our backwoods, I beg to thank you most cordially for the liberal grant made them at your December sitting. This, with the kind assistance rendered by the Education Department, will enable the poor settlers to keep open their schools, notwithstanding the "hard times" caused by the present serious depression in the lumber business, upon which (in most cases) they are dependent for a livelihood.

Since last I had the honor of addressing you a change in the administration of school affairs has been effected. Dr. Ryerson having spent thirty years in developing a school system which is at the present time the admiration of the most advanced educationists, has retired and given place to a Minister of Education in the person of the Hon. Adam Crooks, a gentleman of fine scholarship and high administrative ability.

In conclusion, I beg to say that considering the many hindrances to improvement, there is every reason to feel encouraged with the educational progress made last year.

BY-LAW No. 63.

Passed 18th March, 1876.

A By-Law prohibiting the sale of Intoxicating Liquors and the issuing of License therefor, in the County of Lennox and Addington, passed the 18th day of March, in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and seventy-six.

That the Sale of Intoxicating Liquors and the issuing of License therefor, is, by the present By-Law, prohibited, within the County of Lennox and Addington, under the authority and for enforcement of the Temperance Act of 1864.

BY-LAW No. 64.

To Assess for County and School Purposes for the Year 1876.

Passed 17th June, 1876.

Whereas it is necessary to provide, by general assessment on the ratable property of the County of Lennox and Addington, for the payment of the general and incidental expenses, including the support of the High Schools of the County, and also for the payment of qualified School Teachers and the County Inspector of Public Schools, and whereas the assessed value of the ratable property, within the County, for the year 1875,

amounts to \$4,365,000. upon which it will be necessary and expedient to levy and collect the sum of five mills in the dollar, or the general purposes aforesaid, and also to levy and collect the sum of \$3,427.00 for the support of Public Schools, for the current year.

Therefore the Council of the Corporation of the County of Lennox and Addington enacts as follows:

That the sum of \$21,825.00 shall be raised, levied and collected on all the rateable, real and personal property, within the County of Lennox and Addington, for the general and incidental expenses aforesaid, and the sum of \$3,427.00 for the support of Public Schools, all of which shall be paid into the County Treasurer, on or before the fourteenth day of December next, ensuing the passing of this By-Law, by the respective Township, Town and Village Municipalities, as named in the schedule herein set forth, without any deduction for fees or per centage, for paying as aforesaid.

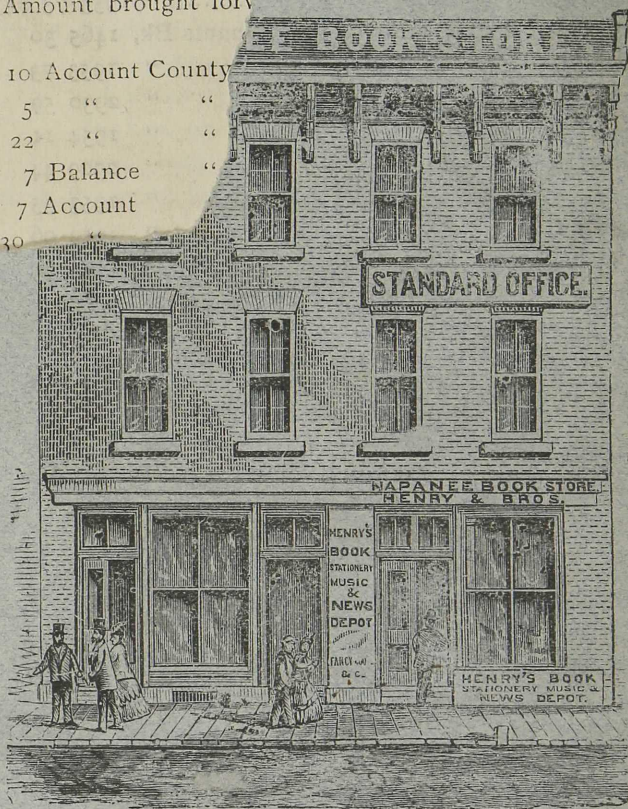
