

Chief Executive Officer's Report

The Library carried out surveys of our users during the year to help us to improve our services. During November patrons at all locations were asked to complete a questionnaire indicating whether or not they had found the material that they were looking for. This information will help us to determine which parts of our collection need to be strengthened. We also surveyed East York Council members and Borough managers regarding their information needs to determine what role the Library could play. Evaluation of the results will be completed early in 1993. Planning began in 1992 for a survey of local businesses in 1993.

We celebrated Ontario Public Library Week in October with some special programmes. An Indian Authors' Night was held on October 23rd at our S. Walter Stewart Branch and the readings were well received by an audience of 65. We were fortunate to receive a donation of 151 Hindi books from the Indian Consul General to commemorate the event. Special children's programmes included the Lilliput Theatre and a visit from Saskatchewan author, Peter Eyvintson.

A highlight of the year for staff was a workshop entitled "Through other eyes", funded by the Ministry of Culture and Communications. It used simulation techniques designed to make ourstaff more aware of the problems faced by patrons with physical disabilities and the reaction of participants was very positive.

1992 was a busy and productive year for our staff. We reached our all-time record for circulation of materials - about 940,000. Some of the increase was due to the effectiveness of our Dynix automated system and we were able to enhance its usefulness by providing dial-in access to our catalogue to patrons at home or at work, starting in December. So far, the response to this new feature has been very encouraging. We hope that the pattern of increasing use of our services by the East York community continues during 1993.

Report from the Chair

Running a library system involves more than buying books and hirring staff to help patrons find the materials they want. The facilities that house them must be kept in good shape also. And 1992 was the "year of the roofs". With roofing repairs finally completed at the Dawes Road Branch in 1991, it was decided that the other branches should be examined as well. As a result, major roof work had to be done at Thorneliffe and S. Walter Stewart Franches in 1992, and the Leaside Branch should be done in 1993.

It was with pleasure that we inaugurated the wheelchair elevator and lower-level washroom facilities at the S. Walter Stewart Branch in February, making the auditorium and children's library accessible to all. Also at this Branch, and because of continuing and worsening problems with heating and cooling, a major study was done on what is now our oldest heating and airconditioning system (Leaside's was older, but it was replaced in 1987), and extensive changes were recommended. It is essential that this be proceeded with as soon as possible.

A new walkway was installed at Leaside, and we cooperated with the Borough's Parks and Recreation Department on improving access to the children's area to the south.

In addition to yearly plans, the Library Board periodically takes a longer look into the future, and 1992 saw the beginning of this process in our "Vision 2000", an attempt to envision the kind of library system we should have in East York by the year 2000. Some data have been gathered from users and non-users to help guide this process, and we expect to seek more public input when we have some concrete proposals to put forward.

At the end of 1991, a new Board was appointed by East York Council, consisting of some members from the previous Board and some new. All worked well together, and we thank them most sincerely. Former Chair, Hazel Thornton-Lazier, continued to represent the boards in the Metro Toronto area on the Ontario Library Trustees' Association, and in November became president of that body. Our comparaultations to her for keeping East York in the forefront of the library world.

Highlights of 1992

Automation and Technical Services

The summer of '92 saw three new software releases installed on our Dynix system - one an upgrade to operating software, the other, two upgrades to Dynix software. Also in the summer, an extract was done from the database to produce a tape of our bibliographic records for inclusion in the Metro Union Catalogue, ("MultiCat" available to the public at our S. Walter Stewart Branch). A total of 93,000 records were extracted at this time.

In December, East Yorkers were introduced to "Dial-In Access". Patrons with home computers and the appropriate software can dial in to the library catalogue 24 hours a day. This home access has proved very popular - over 90 query calls were fielded in our first month of operation.

Multilingual-Multicultural Services

East York Public Library circulates books in 23 languages - from Arabic to Victnamese. The largest collection, in the Multilingual Room at the S. Walter Stewart Branch contains videotapes, recreational music, "Books on Tape" and a very well-used collection of periodicals and newspapers in selective languages. Branch collections are rotated at intervals to reflect the changing makeup of the surrounding community. Throughout the System, linguaphones, ESL, and English writing skills are muchrequested subjects. The highlight of '92 for the Multilingual and Multicultural Services Department was Indian Author Night in October when we hosted 16 Canadian authors of Indian, Pakistani and Bangladeshi origin who read their works of prose and poetry in Hindi, Urdu and Bengali.

Children's Services

For young adult patrons, we sponsored a babysitting course, author visits and a "Read Canadian" YA bookmark. Another publication for school children was our instructional bookmark - "Help! I'm doing a Project!"

"Right from the Start", a booklist for new parents, part of our library orientation kit, has been distributed to Toronto East General Hospital and the East York Health Unit. As well, Children's Services staff have participated in many community events, including the Parenting Fair, East York Day, Canada Day and special events at Todmorden Mills Heritage Museum.
