


ELMBROOK PARK Etobicoke's Newest Library

Thursday, September 29, 1988, Elmbrook Park Library opened to capacity crowds. At the Official Opening, Mayor Bruce Sinclair extended greetings from the City of Etobicoke, local elementary school students cut the ribbon declaring the library open and six hundred pieces of cake were served. The 3,600 square foot building houses over 25,000 books, records, tapes, magazines and newspapers for both adults and children in a variety of languages.

In November, the Ministry of Culture and Communications agreed with this statement and presented the libraries' chief executive officer Nancy Hall with the Minister's Award of Excellence. This prestigious award recognizing the most innovative development in public library service was presented for the Richview (Central) Library We Mean Business campaign.

We Mean Business was designed to increase awareness of the valuable materials and resources available for the business community at Etobicoke's Central Library. Resources such as the Computer Reference Service, a variety of trade indexes, phone books from major Canadian and U.S. cities were promoted at Etobicoke Business Association meetings, information exchanges and in a direct mail campaign.

Protecting Your Books

When library materials disappear it's frustrating for both patrons and staff. To help eliminate the inconvenience and expense of purchasing replacement material, Richview (Central) Library installed a new electronic security system in December. Public response to this new system has been positive.

Activities in a Multicultural World

Community comments praised two highly successful programs sponsored by Albion Library in honour of Black History Month - February. A Jamaican born musician and performer, joined by a local children's African drumming and dance group, thrilled the audience on opening night. The second evening, achievements and contributions made by black Canadians were the focus of a spirited open forum. Both events drew large enthusiastic crowds.

Over the summer months a ten minute slide/tape introduction to library services was prepared by two Etobicoke students hired through a federal government SEED grant. This audio visual show with a simplified English script may be used by community agencies and with English as a Second Language classes. Polish and Spanish soundtracks are also available.

To celebrate Ontario Public Library Week, the libraries hosted an International Film Festival in October. Award winning feature films from seven countries were showcased. Local hosts speaking in the languages of the films welcomed audiences to the Festival.

In response to community demand, books in Arabic were added to multilanguage collections. Print information is now available in over twenty-four languages, not including the two official languages. And, video cassettes in Spanish are now part of the extremely popular audio visual collections, which already included selections in Italian, German, Hindi, Chinese, Urdu and Panjabi.
