From the Chairman

The City of Scarborough Public Library Board is appointed for a three year term, coincident with the timing of municipal elections. The year 1991 was the third year of the Board's term and a tremendous year in terms of its accomplishments which included improvements in existing services. opening and planning new facilities, celebration of significant anniversaries, and a legacy of planning for the future. The accomplishments during 1991. in which we can take particular pride, included:

- the branch library in the Agincourt Mall was closed to the public, after 24 years of service, and the new Agincourt District Library was officially opened on November 5th, supporting neighbourhood branch service in the Northern Division:
- improved accessibility to the collection catalogue with the installation of publicly accessible, on-line computer catalogues which we dubbed Maxwell:
- service to Chinese patrons was enhanced with the introduction of the first Chinese catalogue written in Chinese characters. The new catalogue not only lists books using traditional library methods, but also by Chinese characters. As a result, Chinese patrons who speak different dialects no longer have to rely on an English transliteration of a book's title, but can look up the title in Chinese!

The Board completed its work of revision, approval and publication of the third edition of the development document, A Framework for the Development of Public Library Service in the City of Scarborough and produced its first edition of Policy on Public Service Resource Allocation, a companion document to the Framework providing a decisionmaking tool for allocating precious resources.

The Library Board is proud of the way in which its management and employees deliver services to the public with the means at hand. Many thanks to the staff of the Library Board and to the elected representatives and citizen appointments who comprise the Board.

From the Chief Executive Officer

The major objectives of the Board, of providing resources and increasing the use of those resources, in the areas of self-development, information dissemination, support of the cultural life of the people of Scarborough and emphasis on reading as a pleasurable experience, have been attained during 1991. The residents of Scarborough have certainly turned to the public library system for material to complement their formal and informal learning experience, as well as fulfilling their informational needs. The people who use the libraries for their general reading requirements have, quite literally, borrowed books by the millions. There has been a considerable effort to help the twenty-five percent of the population whose mother tongue is other than English and French, to feel comfortable when using the facilities, by introducing programmes and materials that were helpful and attractive. The demand for library materials and events in many languages continues to increase in the City. Currently materials are available in over thirty languages.

To support these objectives, the public library's resources grew to 1,142,875 hardcover books; 260,322 paperback books; 144,115 audio recordings; 6,289 videocassettes; 948 framed prints; 6,224 microforms; 1,662 toys; and 73 computer software programmes. There were 1,111 different periodical titles purchased and the public library has reports and pamphlets from government, corporate and private sources numbering in the tens of thousands. There are accessible, on-line, hundreds of data bases located throughout North America and Europe.

The use of these services saw the 268,588 residents of the City of Scarborough possessing library cards make record use of the services provided by the Scarborough Public Library Board during 1991. The citizens made 3,784,300 visits to the eighteen branches and bookmobile, borrowing 4,824,085 items and requested answers to 1,059,481 questions.

To manage and control the activities and resources there are 512 staff, both full and part-time, who competently carry out the millions of tasks that are necessary in a year in delivering a library service to a population of some 515,000 citizens.

The total budget for 1991 amounted to \$19,235,400 which, at a cost of \$37.35 per citizen, is below the average cost of a hardcover reference book. The major part of the budget, 90%, comes from the Scarborough City Council, 7% as a grant from the Provincial Government and the remaining 3% is realized by levied charges and recoverables.

The responsibility for the management of the City of Scarborough's public library system is with a nine-person Board, all of whom are residents of the City. All appointments are made by Scarborough City Council and include four members of the Council. The non-elected members of the Board are recommended by the Administrative Committee of Council, the Scarborough Board of Education and the Metropolitan Separate School Board.

Agincourt District Library Officially Opens!!

The new Agincourt District Library was officially opened in Scarborough on the 5th of November 1991. More than 1,000 people visited the library on its opening day, including Provincial Minister of Culture and Communications, the Honourable Karen Haslam. Scarborough Mayor Joyce Trimmer was on hand to deliver a warm welcoming address to the community.

The Agincourt District Library has a total area of approximately 2,500 square metres (27,000 square feet) and contains approximately 100,000 volumes. Since its opening, the library has been used beyond all estimates. Circulation figures are averaging at 1,800 volumes per day, on a weekday, and 4,000 on Saturdays!

In its first month of operation, the library was visited by hundreds of school children and students from ten English as a Second Language classes.



Pin-Yin Chinese Catalogue Improves Service for Patrons

At the Ontario Library Association Conference in Hamilton last November, the Scarborough Public Library Board was awarded the prestigious Angus Mowat Award of Merit by the Ministry of Culture and Communications.

The award is given to libraries, in the Province of Ontario, that develop and implement innovations in the delivery of library service.

Scarborough Public Library won the award for the development of the Chinese Cataloguing System, a computer-based, Chinese and transliterated catalogue, that allows both Chinese-and English-speaking library patrons and staff to search for Chinese language materials in the public library's Chinese collection.

The software was created by senior cataloguing staff member, **Daphne Cheng**, and computer software consultant, **Felix Keung**, who set out to develop a system of computer-generated, transliterated characters, that were based on the Chinese *Pin-Yin* system. Use of the Pin-Yin system ensures that the transliteration is understandable to Chinese-speaking patrons no matter what particular dialect they may speak.

In accepting the award, Scarborough Public Library Board Member, Julie Boisselle, indicated that the new catalogue system,





Comparison of 1991 Budget to 1990 Budget





