CAP. CLIX.

An Act for settling and securing a certain Annuity on William Lord Amherst, and the Representatives of the late Jeffery Lord Amherst, in Consideration of the eminent Services performed by him during his Command in America. [12th August 1803.]

Most Gracious Sovereign,

HEREAS Your Majesty was graciously pleased, on the Twentyfourth Day of May One thousand seven hundred and seventy,
to refer to a Committee of the Lords of your Majesty's most
Honourable Privy Council, the humble Petition of Sir Jeffery Amberst
(afterwards Jeffery Lord Amberst), setting forth, That Your Majesty having
been graciously pleased to signify an Intention of bestowing a Mark of
Your Royal Favour in America on the Petitioner, and praying Your
Majesty to grant him the Estates belonging to the Jesuits in Canada:
And whereas the Right Honourable the Lords of the said Committee
of Council, by their Report to Your Majesty of the Second Day of November One thousand seven hundred and seventy, humbly reported as
their Opinion to Your Majesty, that it might be advisable for Your Majesty to comply with the Petitioner's Request, and to direct Your Majesty's
Attorney and Solicitor General to prepare and lay before Your Majesty in
Council for your Royal Approbation, a Draught of a proper Instrument,
in Order to be passed under the Great Seal of Great Britain, for granting
to the Petitioner the Estates belonging to the Jesuits in Canada, reserving

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to Your Majesty, Your Heirs and Successors, for Public Uses, the Colleges and Chapels, with their Apartments, which belonged to the Society, in Quebec, Montreal, and Trois Riviere, the Grantee engaging to make Satisfaction to fuch of the Possessions as were in Possession at the Time of the Conquest: And whereas Your Majesty in Council was graciously pleased to approve of the said Report, and to order that Your Majesty's Attorney and Solicitor General should prepare a Draught of a proper Instrument, agreeable to what was proposed in the said Report, and to lay the fame before Your Majesty in Council, for Your Royal Approbation: And whereas the said Jeffery Lord Amherit, by his last Will and Testament in Writing, bearing Date the Twenty-fourth Day of July One thousand seven hundred and ninety-four, gave, amongst other Estates, the said Estate of the Jesuits in Canada, which had been ordered to be granted to him by Your Majesty in Council, to his Nephew William Pitt Amherst, now Lord Amherst, for his natural Life, and to the Issue of his Body lawfully begotten; and in Failure of fuch Issue, the said Testator gave the Whole of his Estates to Lieutenant Colonel Amberst of His Majesty's Tenth Regiment of Foot, and Deputy Adjutant General, and to the Heirs Male of his Body lawfully begotten; and in Failure of fuch Heirs Male, he gave the Whole of his Estates to his Niece Elizabeth Amberst, and her Heirs for ever: And whereas the said Jeffery Lord Amherst died without revoking or altering his faid Will: And whereas Your Majesty, by Your most gracious Message to Your most faithful Commons, has been pleafed to acquaint them that in Consideration of the eminent Services of the faid Jeffery Lord Amherst during his Command in America, and particularly in the Reduction of the Province of Canada, Your Majesty was induced, subsequent to the War during which those Services were rendered, to direct that a Grant should be made to his Lordship, his Heirs and Successors, of a certain Tract of Land in that Province; but that in consequence of Difficulties arifing from local Circumstances, Your Majesty's Intentions have not been carried into Effect, and that Your Majesty relied with Confidence on the Justice and Liberality of Your faithful Commons, to make such Compensation to the Representatives of the late Lord Amherst as under the Circumstances of the Case should appear to be adequate and proper: We Your Majesty's most dutiful and loyal Subjects the Commons of Great Britain and Ireland in Parliament affembled, duly confidering Your Majesty's most gracious Intention, do most humbly beseech Your Majesty that it may be enacted; and be it enacted by the King's most Excellent Majesty, by and with the Advice and Confent of the Lords Spiritual and An Annuity Temporal, and Commons, in this present Parliament assembled, and by of 3000l. per the Authority of the fame, That One Annuity, or yearly Rent or Sum Ann. granted of Three Thousand Pounds of lawful Money of Great Britain, shall be issuing and payable out of, and charged and chargeable upon, the Confolidated Fund of Great Britain (after paying, or referving sufficient to pay, all fuch Sum and Sums of Money as have been directed by any former A& or Acts of Parliament to be paid out of the fame, but with Preference to all other Payments which shall or may hereafter be charged upon, or payable out of, the faid Fund); and the fame shall from Time to Time be paid Quarterly to the Right Honourable John Lord Boringdon and John Campbell Esquire, and their Heirs and Assigns, for ever, but nevertheless upon Trust, to permit and suffer the same to be enjoyed by, and to make fuch Conveyances or Affignments thereof, for the Benefit of fuch Person

for the Purposes hereinmentioned.

or Persons, and for such Estate and Estates, and with, under, and subject to fuch Limitations as the High! Court of Chancery shall, upon any Bill filed for that Purpose, direct, such Court being hereby required to have Regard in any Decree and Directions to be made or given to what shall appear to the faid Court to have been the real Intent and Meaning of the faid Testator, with respect to the faid Estates in Canada, as intended to be expressed concerning the same in the said recited Will, whether such Will shall or shall not be deemed in the Law to be an effectual Disposition thereof.

II. And be it further enacted, That the faid Annuity, or yearly Rent Commenceor Sum, shall commence and take Effect from the Fifth Day of fanuary ment of Anoone thousand eight hundred and three, the first Payment whereof shall be nuity and made for Three Quarters of a Year on the Tenth Day of Officer One Times of made for Three Quarters of a Year, on the Tenth Day of October One Payment. thousand eight hundred and three, and shall thereafter be paid and payable at the Four usual Days of Payment in the Year, that is to say, the Fifth Day of January, the Fifth Day of April, the Fifth Day of July, and the Tenth Day of October, by even and equal Portions.

III. And it is hereby further enacted, That it shall and may be lawful to The Annuity and for the Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury now being, or any to be paid at Three or more of them, and the Lord High Treasurer and Under Treasurer the Exchenger, without of the Exchequer, and Commissioners of the Treasury for the Time being, Fees. and they are hereby authorized and required, by Warrant under their Hands, to direct the Auditor of the Receipt of the Exchequer now and for the Time being, to make forth and pass Debentures from Time to Time for paying the faid Annuity or yearly Rent or Sum of Three Thousand Pounds, as the fame shall from Time to Time become due and payable, without any Fees or Charges to be demanded or taken for paying the same or any Part thereof; which said Warrant, and the Debentures to be made forth and passed thereupon, shall be a sufficient Authority to the several and respective Officers of the Receipt of the Exchequer now and for the Time being for the Payment of the faid Annuity or yearly Rent or Sum, to the faid the Right Honourable John Lord Boringdon and John Campbell Esquire, or their Heirs or Assigns, in Trust as aforesaid, or to such other Person or Persons as shall be entitled to receive the said Annuity or any Part thereof, at the respective Quarterly Feast Days in this Act before appointed for Payment thereof, without any further or other Warrant to be fued for, had, or obtained, in that Behalf.

VI. And be it enacted, That the Acquittance or Acquittances, Receipt or Receipts, of the faid the Right Honourable John Lord Boringdon and John Campbell Esquire, their Heirs or Assigns, and of such other Person or Persons as shall be entitled or authorized to receive the said Annuity or yearly Rent or Sum, or any Part thereof, shall be a good and sufficient Discharge for the Payment thereof, without any further or other Warrant to be fued for or obtained in that Behalf; and that the faid Annuity, or yearly Rent or Sum, and every Part thereof, shall be free and clear from all Taxes, Impositions, and other public Charges whatsoever: And in case any of the Officers of the Receipt of His Majesty's Exchequer shall refuse or neglect to pay the faid Annuity or yearly Rent or Sum, or any Part thereof, according to the true Intent and Meaning of this Act, or to do any Act necessary to enable the said Right Honourable John Lord Boringdon and John Campbell Esquire, their Heirs and Assigns, and such other Person or Persons as shall be entitled to receive the said Annuity, or any Part thereof, to receive the same, then the said Right Honourable John Lord Boringdon and John Campbell Esquire, their Heirs and Assigns and such other Person or Persons as shall be entitled to receive the said Annuity or yearly Rent or Sum, or any Part thereof, may from Time to Time fue, profecute, and implead such Officers, or any of them, their Executors and Administrators, by Bill, Plaint, or Action of Debt, and shall or may recover Judgments, and fue out Executions thereupon, against such Officers respectively, their Heirs, Executors, or Administrators, for so much of such Sum or Sums of Money then due and owing upon the faid Annuity yearly Rent or Sum, or any Part thereof, as shall have been in the Hands of the Officer or Officers of the Receipt of the Exchequer at the Time or Times when Demands shall have been legally made of the Payment of the said Annuity yearly Rent or Sum, or any Part thereof as aforefaid, or for the Refusal or Neglect to do any Act necessary to be done by such Officer or Officers respectively.

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
