No Pestriction as to Residence.

THE ROYAL LAMILY.

HER MOST EXCELLENT MAJESTY (ALEXANDRINA) VICTORIA,— By the Grace of God, of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, Queen, Defender of the Faith. Her Majesty, 'the only daughter and heir of the late Prince Edward, Duke of Kent, fourth son of King George III., and of Victoria-Maria-Louisa (Princess Dowager of Leinengen), Duchess of Kent, and sister of the King of the Belgians. Her Majesty was born at Kensington Palace, on the 24th of May, 1819; baptised on the 24th of June, 1819; ascended the throne on the demise of her uncle, King William IV., 20th June, 1837; and was crowned at Westminster, on the 28th June, 1838. Her Majesty was married at St. James's Palace, on the 10th of February, 1840, to his late Royal Highness Francis-Albert-Augustus-Charles-Emmanuel, Duke of Saxe, Prince of Cobourg and Gotha, who died 14th December, 1861.

LETTER RATES.

Letters posted in Canada addressed to any place within the Province pass, if prepaid, for 5 cents per $\frac{1}{2}$ oz., but if posted unpaid such letters are charged 7 cents per $\frac{1}{2}$ oz.

On letters to Nova Scotia, New Brunswick, and Prince Edward's Island, the rate is 5 cents per $\frac{1}{2}$ oz., with optional prepayment.

The rate on letters to the United Kingdom is, by Canadian Packet,

Not exceeding $\frac{1}{2}$ oz..... $12\frac{1}{2}$ cents. " and not exceeding 1 oz. 25 " Exceeding " 50...

And so on, increasing two rates of postage for each additional ounce,

And by Cunard Packet, 17 cents per $\frac{1}{2}$ oz., &c. Letters for the United Kingdom must be prepaid. or they will be charged a fine of 6d. sterling on delivery.

Letters for British Colonies and Possessions beyond sea, and Foreign Countries, via England, must be prepaid.

MAILS FOR CANADA FROM ENGLAND.

Two ocean Steamers, carrying mails for Canada, leave Liverpool in each week, viz : a Canadian Packet on every Thursday, via Derry, on Friday, sailing to Quebec in summer, and Portland in winter, by which the postage rate is 6d. stg. per $\frac{1}{2}$ oz.; and a Cunard Packet every Saturday, via Cork, on Sunday, bringing Mails for Canada, alternately to Boston and New York, by which the postage rate to Canada is 8d. stg. per $\frac{1}{2}$ oz.

The British Post Office forwards letters to Canada by the first packet sailing after the letter is posted, unless the letters bear a special direction --- "By Canadian Packet," or by "British Packet"--- and in that case they are kept over for the packet designated. "By Canadian Mail" is not a distinctive superscription; for any Mail for Canada is a "Canadian Mail," by whatever packet forwarded.

REGISTRATION OF LETTERS.

Persons posting letters containing value, should be careful to require them to be registered, and to obtain from the postmaster a certificate of receipt of registration.

The charge for registration, in addition to the postage, is as follows, viz :

On letters for France and other Foreign Countries, via France, an amount equal to the postage rate.

Both the postage charge and registration fee must in all cases be prepaid.

Registration is not an absolute guarantee against the miscarriage or loss of a letter; but a registered letter can be traced when an unregistered letter cannot, and the posting and delivery or non-delivery can be proven. A registered letter is thus secured against many of the casualties which, from incorrect address, forgetfulness of the receiver, or other error, may affect an unregistered letter.

MISCELLANEOUS CHARGES.

The charge on parcels by the parcel post, which is limited to place within the Province, is 25 cents per lb. (with 3 cents additional if registered).

One cent per oz., payable in advance by postage stamp, is the rate on printed circulars (printed circulars, if sent in envelopes, whether *sealed* or *unsealed*, are liable to letter postage), prices current, hand-bills, and other printed matter of a like character, and on books, bound or unbound, when posted at a Canadian post office, addressed to any place in Canada, British North America generally, or the United States.

The postage upon prices current addressed to the United Kingdom is two cents each, which must be prepaid by postage stamps, or they will be sent to the dead letter office to be returned to the senders.

BOOK POST WITH ENGLAND.

The charge on books, &c., by book post to England, is 7 cents on packets not exceeding 4 oz. in weight; $12\frac{1}{2}$ cents on $\frac{1}{2}$ lb. packets; and $12\frac{1}{2}$ cents additional for every additional $\frac{1}{2}$ lb. These charges must be prepaid. Photographs, provided they are not upon glass or in cases containing glass, may be forwarded to England at the book rate of postage.

NEWSPAPERS AND PERIODICALS.

Newspapers published in Canada may be sent by post from the office of publication, addressed to any place in Canada at the following rates, if

paid quarterly in advance, by either the publisher at the post office where the papers are posted, or by the subscriber at the delivering post office.

For a paper published 6 times a week, 40 cents per quarter.

When the above rates are not paid in advance by either publisher or subscriber, such papers are charged one cent each on delivery.

TRANSIENT NEWSPAPERS.

Transient Newspapers—that is to say, Canadian Newspapers posted otherwise than from the office of publication, and American or British papers posted or re-posted in Canada, must be prepaid one cent each, by postage stamps, or they cannot be forwarded—except only British newspapers distributed to regular subscribers by Canadian booksellers or news agents—such papers pass free as they would do if received in the Canadian packet mails.

NEWSPAPERS BY MAIL FROM ENGLAND OR UNITED STATES.

Newspapers received from England by the Canadian Packet Mails are delivered free.

Newspapers from England by the Cunard Packet Mails are charged 2 cents each on delivery. (This is the American transit charge.)

United States newspapers, brought by mail into Canada, are charged one cent each on delivery.

PERIODICAL PUBLICATIONS.

The rate on all periodicals, other than Newspapers, passing by mail in Canada, save such as may be addressed to or received from the United Kingdom, and such as are exempted from postage by statute, will henceforth be one cent, per oz. weight of paakage containing periodical matter, whether the package contain one or more numbers.

Any fraction of 4 oz. to be charged as a full rate.

On periodicals posted from the office of publication or by news agents or booksellers, to regular subscribers within the Province, this rate may remain to be collected on delivery, and must in such cases be marked upon the packages and charged in the letter bills; but when mailed to go out of the Province, such periodical matter must be prepaid by postage stamp. British and United States periodicals my be posted in Canada by news agents and booksellers to regular subscribers in the Province under this regulation.

Transient periodical matter posted in Canada must in all cases be prepaid by postage stamp.

The above rate will be payable on delivery on all periodical matter received from the United States, except that Canadian editors may receive exchange periodicals from the United States free of Canadian postage.

Periodicals, printed and published in Canada, may be posted addressed

to any place in the United Kingdom by Canadian packet, on prepayment by postage stamp of two cents each number.

This rate will be applicable to all classes of Canadian periodicals posted as above for the United Kingdom, the exemptions to which certain classes of Canadian periodicals are entitled, extending to such numbers only as are addressed from the office of publication to places within the province.

POSTAGE RATES ON MISCELLANEOUS MATTER.

Packages of seeds, cuttings, bulbs, roots, and scions, or grafts, may be posted in Canada for delivery within the Province, or to an address within the United States, on prepayment by postage stamp of a rate of one cent per oz.; and when received from the United States addressed to any place in Canada, such packages my be delivered on payment, by the person addressed, of a like rate.

The limit of weight for such packages will be one pound. No communication, whether written or printed, must be enclosed in them; and they must be so put up as to be easy of examination, for the purpose of verifying the alleged contents. If put up in bags, the bags must be simply tied at the neck, so as to admit of inspection; and in the case of such packages mailed in Canada, the nature of the contents, such as "seeds," "roots," &c., as the case may be, must be marked on the package by the sender, as a statement of the claim to pass at the reduced rate hereby made applicable to such matter.

Book manuscript, and printers' proof-sheets (whether corrected or not), maps, prints, drawings, engravings, photographs, when not on glass or in cases containing glass, and sheet music (whether printed or written), may pass in covers open at the ends or sides, and provided that no letter, or other communication intended to serve the purpose of a letter, be enclosed therein, on pre-payment, when posted in Canada, by postage stamp of the ordinary printed matter rate of one cent per oz.; or upon payment of that rate on delivery of such matter when received in the mails from the United States.

POSTAGE OF BOOKS, PATTERNS, AND SAMPLES.

Patterns of merchandise and samples may be forwarded between Canada and the United Kingdom, by the Canadian Packet Mails, at book post rates, and subject to the following conditions:

The patterns or samples must not be of any intrinsic value; and this rule excludes all articles of a saleable nature, and whatever may have a value of its own, apart from its mere use as a pattern; nor must the quantity of any material or article sent as a pattern or sample be so great that it could have on this ground an intrinsic value.

The patterns, &c., must be sent in covers, open at the ends, so as to be easy of examination. Samples, however, of seeds, drugs, and such like, which cannot be sent in open covers, may be enclosed in bags of linen or other material, simply tied at the neck; but bags closed against inspection, although transparent, must not be used for the purpose.

There must be no writing or printing other than the address of the

person for whom the packet is intended, the manufacturer's or trade mark and number, and price of the article.

Any infringement of the above regulations will render the packet liable to be treated and charged as a letter.

The rule which forbids the transmission through the post of any article likely to injure the contents of the mail bags, will apply to patterns and samples; and any package transgressing this rule is to be sent to the Postmaster General.

The book post rate between Canada and the United Kingdom, remains unaltered at 7 cents for a packet weighing not more than 4 ounces.

No prints or printed matter will be allowed to pass by book post between the United Kingdom and Canada, unless printed on paper, parchment, or vellum.

MONEY ORDERS ON THE LOWER PROVINCES.

The money order post offices are furnished with lists of all the money order offices in Canada, Unitel Kingdom, Nova Scotia, Prince Edward Island, and Newfoundland; and the postmasters are instructed to afford every information in their power, in respect of the places upon which they draw, together with any other information relating to such issues as the intending remitters may desire.

POSTAGE STAMPS.

Postage stamps are provided for sale of the respective values of 1 cent for newspapers; 2 cents for prices current of periodicals for the United Kingdom; 5 cents for ordinary Provincial letters; 10 cents for United States rate; $12\frac{1}{2}$ cents Canadian Packet; and 17 cents for Cunard Packet.

Letter envelopes are provided impressed with medallion stamp., and equivalent to the prepayment of postage to the amount of 5 cents and 10 cents respectively.

The 5 cent envelopes will be sold to the public at the rate of \$5.50 per hundred, or 66 cents per dozen. The price of a single envelope is 7 cents.

The 10 cent envelopes will be sold at the rate of \$10.50 per hundred, or \$1.26 per dozen. Single envelopes 11 cents.

PENAL CLAUSES.

The Post Office Act contains the following penal clauses :

To inclose a letter or letters, or any writing intended to serve the purpose of a letter, in a parcel posted, for the parcel post, shall be a misdemeanour.

To inclose a letter or any writing, or to make any written marks to serve the purpose of a letter, or to inclose any other thing in a newspaper posted to pass as a newspaper, at the rate of postage applicable to newspapers (except in the case of accounts and receipts of newspaper publishers, which are permitted to pass folded within the newspapers sent by them to their subscribers) shall be a misdemeanour.

COUNTY OF PRINCE EDWARD.

WHEN the thirteen American Colonies forcibly severed themselves (with the assistance of England's ancient rival and enemy) from the protection of the mother country, a large number of the colonists would not allow the illjudged legislation of a political party, who for a time hel the reins of power at home, or the still more wicked, insane and ungenerous conduct of their unthinking fellow-subjects in America, to deprive them of their proud birthright as British subjects, and of the benefit to themselves and posterity of that excellent constitution and those just laws, which in their minds were associated with and hallowed by every sentiment that tends to the elevation and advancement of humanity. Preferring to live under the old flag in a strange and comparatively unexplored country, than to remain in their old homes, where the great mass of the people had thrown off allegiance to the British Crown, they came to Canada, bringing with them those high principles of loyalty and honor which their descendants yet retain, many of whom still live on the same property in Prince Edward County which was bestowed by a grateful Sovereign in appreciation of their unwavering loyalty.

The County is one of the forty-two which, combined, constitute Canada West. It contains six Townships, namely, Ameliasburg at its extreme western part, which connects it at the carrying place with the Township of Murray, County of Northu. erland; Hillier, lying south of Ameliasburg on the Lake side; Sophiasburg, which includes Big Island, lying on the Bay side; Hallowell, which is south of Sophiasburg, east of Hillier, and running from the Bay to the Lake; Marysburgh, east of Hallowell, composing the extreme eastern portion of the county; Athol, south of Hallowell and Marysburgh, the smallest and most southern Township in the County. According to the census returns of 1861, Prince Edward contained 20,869 inhabitants. It now contains probably 24,000.

It is fifty-five miles in length by about fifteen in breadth; bounded on the north and east by the beautiful Bay of Quinte, on the south and west by Lake Ontario, which contributes to the wealth of the county by means of its valuable supply of fish, quantities of which are annually caught (particularly on the farfamed Wellington beach) and disposed of at renumerative prices in the Kingston, Montreal, and American Markets.

The County has fine harbour accommodations; the largest are Consecon, Picton, Wellington, and Prince Edward or South Bay. The last is truly a harbour of refuge: in it all Lake craft can ride at anchor in perfect security from the effects of the most violent storms. Point Traverse, or, as it is sometimes called, Long Point, breaks Ontario's rage, and vessels once rounding it are then perfectly safe.

The County exports immense numbers of horses, cattle, and sheep, which command the highest prices, and are eagerly sought for on account of their superior condition and breed.

The County and Township municipalities are entirely free from debt. This is owing, in a great measure, to the geographical position of the County, which is almost an island, being only connected with the main land by a neck at its north-western extremity, of about three-quarters of a mile in width. On account of its peculiar position the railway maniacs could not get sufficient local support to establish a road in opposition to the lake trade. The roads are in great part natural turnpikes, requiring little or no outlay. There are consequently no tolls collected.

As an agricultural County, Prince Edward stands high, which, with its extraordinary facilities for transportation and other important advantages, presents to the capitalist desirous of establishing manufactories, the most favorable inducements.

As regards oil, there are three lots in the County whose occupants are sanguine of becoming oil princes at some future day.

The high tone of morality which characterizes the By-laws of the County, and the strict manner in which they are enforced, may fairly stand as an index to the good habits and principles of the inhabitants generally. Other counties would do well to follow their example in this respect.

The inhabitants of the County, though they have literally covered it with good, substantial, and well-conducted schools, are still determined not to stop there, but are engaged in the laudable competition of outvieing each other with liberal individual contributions, as a subsidy to induce the Church of England to establish a college in Picton, to be called the Ontario College, conducted under the auspices of the Established Church, but free from sectarianism, and open to all denominations. A large number of the citizens of Montreal have agreed to make up any deficit that may exist after the county subscriptions have reached a certain figure. All will unite in wishing this laudable enterprise every success.

On account of the County standing as it does out in the lake, considerably beyond the rest of the shore, and being insufficiently provided with light-houses, vessels, more or less, are wrecked here every fall. This last has been a peculiarly unfortunate one, as I regret to say that not only has a large amount of property been damaged, but valuable lives have been lost. Cannot a life-boat association be formed, organized on the principle of those in Great Britain.

A medical practitioner of high standing in his profession (Dr. H. B. Evans), has noticed, and is desirous of turning to advantage, a praiseworthy characteristic which is peculiarly marked in the domestic life of the people of this County, viz., their habit of adopting as members of the family, children, and boys and girls whose parents have been removed by death, leaving them destitute of the means of support. The position of these children is thus raised above that of the menial. They are, by means of a good English education, placed in a position to become useful and respected members of society. The Doctor has published in a circular, a letter addressed by him to Thomas D'Arcy McGee, Minister of Agriculture and Emigration, and sent a copy to the different County Councils, requesting them to give the subject their consideration, and if it meets with their approval, to pass a resolution to that effect, and send a copy of the same to him for future action. The scheme is simple, practical, and self-sustaining, and will, if acted upon in a proper manner, and not abused, supply the agricultural community with a steady and reliable, because interested class of co-operatives, the want of which is felt more and more every year in developing the great productive resources of the country.

BY-LAWS OF THE COUNTY OF PRINCE EDWARD.

BY-LAW No. 1.--IMPOSING PENALTIES.

I. That any Officer duly appointed by the Municipal Corporation of the County of Prince Edward, and who has accepted such appointment, and taken and subscribed the necessary Oath of Office, who shall neglect or refuse to perform the duties of his Office, as prescribed by Statute or any By-Law in force in the said County; or who shall neglect or refuse to execute, when required, any order or Resolution of the said Corporation pertaining to his said Office, shall forfeit and pay a sum not exceeding Fifty Dollars for every such neglect or refusal—and in default of payment to be imprisoned in the Common Gaol of the said County, for a period (at hard labor) not exceeding Twenty-one Days.—22 Vic., Cap. 54, Sec. 243.

II. Any person refusing to obey any of the By-Laws of this Corporation, or contravening any of their provisions, or any lawful order or Resolution of this Corporation, shall incur the same penalty as is mentioned in the preceding Sect on of this By-Law. Such penalties to be recovered and enforced on complaint of the proper Municipal Officer, or any inhabitant of the County, in a summary way, before any Magistrate of the County, by Warrant under his hand and seal, in accordance with the directions contained in the Act 17 Vic., Cap. 178; and unless otherwise specially directed the fines shall be paid over by such Magistrate into the County Treasury, for the general purposes of the County.

III. It shall not be necessary, in any subsequent By-Law of this Corporation, to enact any penal p ovisions—but reference shall be had to the mode of proceeding set forth in this By-Law, which is intended to apply to every By-Law, order and Resolution of this Corporation.

The Clerk of this Council shall receive the sum of Seventy-five Dollars each year, for his services as Clerk, which shall include all the duties appertaining to his Office that may be imposed on him by this Council or by any Statute now in force in this Province, or that may be in force.—22 Vic., Cap. 54, Sec. 173.

III. The Salary of the Treasurer shall be Two Hundred and Forty Dollars per Annum, commencing on and after the thirty-first day of December next.—22 Vic., Cup. 54, Nec. 174.

IV. The Auditors shall receive the sum of Five Dollars each, per Annum, for their services. -22 Vic., Cup. 54, Section 173.

V. The Surgeon of the Gaol shall be paid the sum of Thirty Dollars, per Annum, for his services.—22. Vic., Cap. 53, Secs. 173 and 284.

BY-LAW No. 3.-JURORS.

I. That every Grand Juror shall receive the sum of One Dollar for each day's attendance at the Sittings of any of Her Majesty's Courts of Criminal Jurisdiction in this County.—22 Vic., Cap. 31, Sec. 140. II. That every Petit Juror shall receive Ten Cents per Mile, for every Mile necessarily travelled to attend any of Her Majesty's Courts of Civil or Criminal Jurisdiction; and One Dollar per day for each day's attendance at the Sittings of any such Courts.—22 Vic., Cap. 31, Sec. 141.

III. The Sheriff of this County shall receive the sum of Fifty Cents for checking the names of the Jurors, at the opening of the Court, on each day; and One Dollar for certifying and returning such List to the Treasurer—which sums shall be paid him on the or derof the Magistrates in Session.—22 Vic., Cap. 31, Sec. 145.

BY-LAW No. 4.-INSPECTOR OF WEIGHTS AND MEASURES.

I. That one Inspector of Weights and Measures shall be appointed in this County, but whose jurisdiction shall not extend to the Town of Picton.

II. He shall attend at the Town of Picton, during the first week of April and September, for the purpose of examining such weights and measures as may be brought him; and shall give such notice as directed, and be guided in all respects by the provisions of Chapter 58 of the Consolidated Statutes of Upper Canada.

BY-LAW No. 5.-PUBLIC MORALS.

I. That the penalties mentioned in By-Law No. One may be enforced in the mamer therein set forth, against every person who shall—

1st—Hunt, fish, play at any games, or perform any labor, except carrying passengers, Her Majesty's Mails, or works of necessity and of charity, on the Sabbath day.—22 Vic., Cup. 54, Sec. 282.

2nd—Or who shall sell or give intoxicating drink to a child, apprentice, or servant, without the consent of a parent, master or legal protector.

3rd—Or who shall post indecent placards, writings or pictures, or write indecent words, or make indecent pictures or drawings on walls or fences, in streets or public places.

4th-Or who shall be guilty of any drunkenness, profane swearing, obscene, blasphemous, or grossly insulting language, and other immorality and indecency in streets, highways and public places.

5th-Or who shall keep a tippling house, or house of ill fame.

6th-Or who shall keep a gambling house.

7th-Or who shall be found beging, or drunk, or disorderly, in any street, highway or public place, within the County.

8th— Or who shall indecently expose the person, publicly, or wash or bathe the person, in any public water, near a public Highway.

9th—Or who shall race horses on any highway, common, or any ice, within the jurisdiction of this County.

BY-LAW No. 6.-AUCTIONEERS, HAWKERS AND PEDLARS.

I. That the penalties enacted in By-Law No. One, in the manner therein directed, may be enforced against any person who shall—

1st—Sell, or offer for sale, as an Auctioneer, any goods, wares, and merchandize, other than the estate of a deceased person, or which may be sold under an execution issued out of any of Her Majesty's Courts, or Distress Warrant, or the Warrant of a Board of School Trustees, without having first obtained a license from the proper Officer, as hereinafter mentioned (22 Vic., Cap. 54, Sec. 284, Sub Sec. 2.) or

2nd—Who shall offer for sale, or sell, any goods, wares or merchandize, by travelling from house to house, either on foot or with a horse or horses, or other beast of burthen, or with any boat, vessel, or oraft, such person not having become a permanent resident of the County, or householder therein, without having first obtained a License from the proper Officer.—(Sub Sec. 3.)

11. The Clerk of this Corporation shall issue a License to every person applying for the same, to enable him to act as an Auctioneer, on the receipt of twelve dollars; which License shall not be transferable, and which shall remain in force for one year from the date, except as hereinafter provided.

III. The Clerk shall also issue a License to every person applying for the same, on the receipt of Six Dollars, authorizing such person to carry goods from house to house, and offer them for sale, by travelling on foot; for every horse or beast bearing or drawing a burthen, an additional sum of Six Dollars; for every decked vessel, on board of which goods are exposed for sale, Twenty Dollars—and for every boat or craft used as above, Ten Dollars.

IV. The Licenses shall be signed by the Warden, and countersigned by the Clerk. They shall be in force for one year, or a specified portion of a year, not less than six months from the date. In which case the amount to be paid shall bear the same proportion to the whole amount as the part of the year for which a License is obtained does to the whole year.

V. All moneys coming into the hands of the Clerk, for Licenses, shall be by him paid over, forthwith, to the County Treasurer.

VI. All blank Licenses, signed by the Warden, shall be numbered by him, and corresponding numbers entered in a book to be kept by him, and when moneys for Licenses shall be paid over by the Clerk, to the County Treasurer, the numbers of the Licenses shall also be designated and appear on the Treasurer's Books.

BY-LAW No. 7.-BY-LAW TO OPEN ROAD.

Whereas the allowance for Road between the First Concession produced in the Township of Sophiasburgh, and a part of the Second Concession produced in the Township of Hallowell, from the limits between Lots number sixty and sixty-one, to the limits between sixtyfour and sixty-five, in the said Second Concession produced, has been for a long time travelled, but has never been opened to the full width as originally laid out, and whereas it is necessary to open it to its full width—

Therefore, the Municipal Corporation of the County of Prince Edward enacts:

I. That the Road from the limit between Lots number sixty-one and sixty-two, in the Second Concession produced, of the Township of Sophiasburgh, to the line between Lots number sixty-four and sixty-five, formerly in Sophiasburgh, now in the Township of Hallowell, be made sixty-six feet wide from the front of the said Second Concession produced.

II. Be it further enacted, That it shall be the duty of the County Engineer to ascertain the front line of the said Second Concession produced, between the limits indicated, if the said line be not now ascertained, and lay off the Road sixty-six feet in width from the said front line of the Second Concession produced, and plant posts between the allowance for Road and the First Concession produced of Sophiasburgh aforesaid.

III. Be it further enacted, That written notice be given by the Engineer to all parties found in possession of said Road allowance, or any part of it, requiring them to remove their fences from off the allowance for Road.

IV. Any person or persons neglecting or refusing to obey the requirements of this By-Law shall be prosecuted as provided in By-Law No. 1.

BY-LAW No. 8-WELLINGTON INCORPORATION.

Whereas, by the Census Returns of the Village of Wellington, in the Townships of Hillier and Hallowell, in this County, it ppears that there are over Seven Hundred and Fifty inhabitants within the limits of said Village; and whereas, One Hundred of the Freeholders and Householders within such limits have petitioned this Council to pass a By-Law incorporating said Village; and whereas, it is only just and proper to comply with the request contained in the petition—

Therefore, the Municipal Corporation of the County of Prince Edward enacts:

I. That so much of the Townships of Hillier and Hallowell as is contained within the following boundaries, shall be designated the Village of Wellington; and shall, from and after the time when this By-Law takes effect, be incorporated under the above name, according to the intent and meaning of the Statute 22 Vic., Chap. 54, Section 10—

Commencing at the Lake Shore of Lake Ontario, on the West side of Lot No. 7, in the First Concession of the Township of Hillier; thence along the West boundary line of said Lot to the rear; thence along the rear of said Lot, and along the rear of Lots numbers 6, 5, ', and 3; thence along the rear of those parts of Lots No. 2 and 1 as at present owned or occupied by Daniel Reynolds, J. T. Dorland, and Joseph Cummins, to the Township line between Hillier and Hallowell; thence along the rear of those parts of Lots Nos. 1 and 2, in the Township of Hallowell, as occupied by Patrick MacKessy, Joseph Cummins, and Francis W. Mandeville, to the East boundary of said Lot No. 2 in the Township of Hallowell; thence along said East boundary line of Lot No. 2 to the waters of the West Lake; thence along the water-line of said West Lake and of Lake Ontario, to the place of beginning.

II. The first Election to be held at the Town Hall in said Village, and John T. Dorland shall be Returning Officer.

III. This By-Law shall take effect on and after the Twentieth of December next.

TOWN OF PICTON, CO. PRINCE EDWARD.

(First settlement on Delhi side of Bay in Tavern kept by -...)

From the records in possession of the Town Clerk, we find on the 21st January, 1850, at a meeting of the Board of Police of the Town of Picton, held at the C.H., the following councillors for said Town were present, and handed in their oath of qualification, and also their oath of office.

For Hallowell Ward--Wm. Hale, James McDonald, and Calvin Pier, Esqs.

" Brock do. — David Barker Stevenson, Jas. Porter, and Walter Ross, Esqs.

" Tecumseth do: -John Proctor, Philip Low, and John Miller, Esqs,

Moved by Mr. Hale, seconded by Mr. Ross, and carried unanimously. that Mr. Low be appointed Mayor of this Council. Lempriere Murray was appointed Clerk. At a meeting held next day, Cecil Mortimer was appointed Auditor by Mayor in Council, James Cook was also appointed Auditor on behalf of Council, Jno. G. Reynolds, chief constable of Town. Three subs were appointed, one for each ward. David Barker Stevenson was appointed Town P ve to represent the Town in Council. Lampriere Murray was appointed Treasurer of Town. James Shannon, Weigh Master. J. G. Reynolds, Collector of Rates. After the appointment of local committees, the Council adjourned.

The Council met on Thursday, the 26th day of December, by special appointment, when, on motion of Mr. Stevenson, the Council passed the following resolution : That the death of Mr. Councillor Hale deprives this Board of an esteemed member, and suggests the duty of recording the high sense it entertains of his characteristic sincerity and benevolent disposition as a man, and viewing his valuable services for several years as a member for Hallowell Ward, his loss will be long felt by the Town, and that therefore it be resolved : That this Ward have the melancholy satisfaction of recording this tribute to his memory.

From the same record we further find, that on the seventeenth day of January, 1857, one half of the taxes paid by certain parties was returned on account of their having suffered by a fire, and not being insured. Also, that sick emigrants occupied a house, the property of Hubbs & Wilson, for which they, H. & W., received the sum of ten dollars from the Town Council.

The Council for the Town in 1851 were W. T. Yarwood, M. W. Morse, and Calvin Pier, for Hallowell Ward; Thos. Moore, D. B. Stevenson, and L. Walla, for Brock Ward; Francis G. A SYNOPSIS OF THE BY-LAWS OF THE TOWN OF PICTON.

BY-LAW No. 1.

To Provide for the Preservation of Peace, Order and good Government in the Town of Picton.

CLAUSE 1 enacts that no person shall injure, deface or damage any Town property, or make any disturbance in any place of Public Worship, or inscribe or draw indecent words or pictures on any wall, fence, or other public place, or be guilty of drunkenness, or make use of profane or insulting language, or destroy any trees which serve to ornament the streets, or be guilty of indecent exposure of person.

CLAUSE 2 prohibits public exhibitions, &c., unless licensed by the Mayor, who is thereby authorised to issue such license, charging for the same any sum not exceeding Twenty Dollars.

CLAUSE 3 places the power in the Mayor's hands of permitting lectures to be given, or prohibiting the same.

CLAUSE 9 fixes the weight of a Baker's loaf of bread sold in the town, at four pounds avoirdupois, smaller loaves to weigh in proportion : makes it the duty of the chief constable to examine the same, and of the Mayor or Clerk to punish by forfeiture parties who may be guilty of selling light loaves.

CAUSE 10 prohibits gaming, and orders all devices used for that purpose to be seized and destroyed.

CLAUSE 15 confers on the members of the council the same power as that of the chief-constable, so far as the apprehension of offenders is concurred.

BY-LAW No. 2.

Provides Allowance to and defines the duties of certain Officers of the Town.

CLAUSE 1.—That the Town Treasurer, before entering on his official duties, shall deposit with the Mayor his bond for the sum of Two Thousand Dollars, and two sufficient sureties in the sum of one thousand five hundred dollars each, conditional for the due and faithful discharge of the duties appertaining to his office.

CLAUSE 2.—That the Treasurer shall receive all the revenues of the Town. Such monies can only be withdrawn and paid out by resolution of the Council, a copy of which, certified by the Clerk, and signed by the Mayor or Chairman, shall be his authority. And the Treasurer shall keep a regular sett of books, which he shall, when requested to do so, hand over to his successor in office, together with all papers and moneys belonging thereto.

CLAUSE 3.—The Treasurer shall receive Sixty Dollars per annum as salary.

CLAUSE 4.—, That the Collector, before receiving his Roll, shall furnish the same security as the Treasurer, depositing with the Treasurer all moneys collected by him on the Collector's Roll; at no time retaining in his hands a sum in excess of Four Hundred Dollars, without making a deposit of the same. The Collector's property qualification to be the same as a Town Councillor.

CLAUSE 6.—Collector's salary to be Seventy-Five dollars per year, payable when his duties are performed.

CLAUSE 7.—The Assessor to perform his duties according to law, receiving a salary of Fifty Dollars per annum.

CLAUSE 3.—It shall be the duty of the Clerk to make out a Collector's Roll, specifying the rate of Taxes for all purposes separately, certifying to the correctness of the same, it to be delivered to the Collector on or before the First of October in each year.

CLAUSE 10.—Clerk to act in that capacity at the Police Court, depositing the balance that may remain on hand at the end of the year, with the Treasurer.

CLAUSE 11.—Clerk's salary, One Hundred Dollars per year, payable half-yearly.

CLAUSE 12.—That there be one Chief-Constable, who shall follow the directions of the Council, apprehending parties guilty of committing any act against the Town By-Laws. He is empowered to turn over such offenders to the keeper of the Common Goal, who is thereby authorized to receive and confine the same, subject to orders.

CLAUSE 13.—Chief Constable's salary to be Two Hundred Dollars per annum, together with the usual constable's fee.—Said salary payable quarterly.

CLAUSE 14.—One Inspector of Shop and Tavern Licenses shall be appointed by the Council yearly, his term of office to expire at the end of the current year, property qualification to be the same as a Councillor.

CLAUSE 15.—The said Inspector to subscribe to the necessary declarations of office and qualification, and deposit the same with the Clerk within eight days, under the penalty of being guilty of a misdemeanor.

CLAUSE 16.—That the Inspector shall publicly notify all persons intending to present their applications for certificates for Tavern and Shop License, to do so at his usual place of business, on the second Monday in February. He shall then proceed to examine the premises of all applicants, and on the third Monday in the said month grant certificates to those applicants entitled to receive them. Only British subjects shall receive certificates who are of sober life and conversation. CLAUSE 18.—Salary of Inspector to be Five Dollars per annum. Surety to the amount of Three Hundred Dollars required of him.

CLAUSE 19 appoints one Pound Keeper.

CLAUSE 20 fixes the Returning Officer's salary at Two Dollars per day, while engaged at elections.

CLAUSE 21.—The Auditors shall receive Five Dollars each for their services.

CLAUSE 22 appoints a Weigh Master.

CLAUSE 23 provides for the annual appointment of three Fence Viewers.

BY-LAW No. 4

Provides for the improvement of Streets, and orders a copy of By-Law to be furnished to non-residents who may be affected thereby.

BY-LAW No. 5,

For the Prevention of Fires,

Prohibits the erection of wooden buildings within the following limits : On Main Street, at the stone monument planted on the westerly side of lot No. 1; thence along the northerly side of said street, to Paul Street, on the south side of Main Street, at the south-west side of the lot known as Mortimer's land; thence along the southerly side of said Main Street to Chapel Street, on both sides of Bridge Street, from Main Street to within one hundred and twenty-five feet of the centre of the Creek. This by-law also prohibits additions being made to any wooden buildings already erected within said limits, unless the same be built of brick or stone, and provides for the prevention of fires generally, and provides for the punishment of parties violating this by-law by fine not to exceed Twenty Dollars per week, but to continue in force till the house or other building, and every part thereof, shall be removed ; it also enacts for the punishment of parties employed as master-builder, mechanic, or laborer, who are to be punished by a fine not exceeding Twenty Dollars, together with all costs and charges for every day he or they shall have been so employed.

BY-LAW No. 6.

CLAUSE 1.—One Chief Fire-Engineer and two Fire-Wardens in each ward of the town, to be appointed annually.

CLAUSE 2.—The Fire Engineer has full control and chief direction at all fires, the movements of other officers, and the inhabitants are subject to his orders thereat. He can, with the concurrence of any one of the Fire Wardens, order the pulling down or blowing up of any of the adjacent buildings that he may deem necessary for preventing further damage.

CLAUSE 3.—The Fire Wardens shall examine the condition of all tenements and premises within the town once every year in the month of December, with respect to their security against fires, and report thereon to the Council, to give orders to the inhabitants assembled at fires as to their conduct thereat.

CLAUSE 5.—No person shall use a lighted candle in any stable or other building where any combustible materials shall be kept, or shall carry fire through any place or street without securing such fire in a proper manner.

CLAUSE 6.—No person shall place any ashes in any wooden receptacle or otherwise, within twelve feet of any wooden building or fence connected with any such building.

CLAUSE 7.—The owner of any building in which a fire is kept shall have a good and sufficient ladder reaching to the top of the roof. A fine is imposed as penalty for non-compliance.

CLAUSE 8.—No combustible material to be burnt in any street of the town, nor within twenty feet of any building; and no person shall be present aiding or abetting in the same. CLAUSE 9.—Occupants of premises must cause all chimneys on their

CLAUSE 9.—Occupants of premises must cause all chimneys on their premises to be swept and stove-pipes cleaned (if considered necessary by the Inspector) during the months of March and November in each year.

CLAUSE 10.—Orders the appointment of a Chimney Inspector, and orders him to examine into and report on the condition of all chimneys and stove-pipes within the Corporation.

CLAUSE 11.—Enacts that the following tariff for the payment of persons employed as sweepers be established :—

No. 1.—For a chimney one ground floor in height, ten cents. For every additional flue, five cents.

No.³2.—For a chimney higher than No. 1, not exceeding in height two flocus and a garret, fifteen cents. Every additional flue, five cents.

No. 3.—For a chimney higher than No. 2, not exceeding three floors and 3 garret, twenty-five cents. Every additional flue, six cents.

No. 4.—For a chimney higher than No. 3, twenty-five cents. Every additional flue, ten cents; which charge shall be paid at the time of sweeping by-the occupant or occupants of said house.

BY-LAW No. 7.

A By-Law to establish the Scales now laid down on Main Street, as the Public Scales of the Town, and to regulate the weighing of Hay, Straw, and other articles.

CLAUSE 2.—That all hay straw, or other articles required to be weighed as soon as they are brought into the town, either sold or for sale, shall be weighed at the Public Weight-Scales by the Weight-Master in charge thereof, and any person or persons who shall neglect doing so, shall be subject to a penalty.

CLAUSE 4.—The Weigh-Master shall furnish the person or persons having charge of the load so weighed with a weigh-note, dated and signed, stating weight in pounds, with the wagon or other vehicle, the tare of the same, the nett weight of the load, the name of the person having charge, and the name of the purchaser.

CLAUSE 6.—The Weigh-Master shall keep a book in which he shall enter the name of every person for whom he shall weigh any article, the article weighed, and the weight thereof, and the date of weighing; which book shall be open at all reasonable times, for inspection. He shall make a return to the Council at the end of each month, with the fee paid in each case.

CLAUSE 9.—The Weigh-Master shall retain the one half of all fees received by him for his own use, and pay over the other half to the Treasurer of the Town.

CLAUSE 12.-The fees shall be as follows :---

For every load of hay, straw, or other article, and		
return wagon free	20 cents.	
For every divided load, each portion so divided	15 "	
For every other article	12 "	

And all such sums as above shall be paid for before the article or vehicle is taken away.

BY-LAW No. 8

Enacts that no horse, bull, cow, sheep, or cattle of any description, shall run at large in the streets of the Town from the first day of December in each year, to the first day of April in each succeeding year. That no swine, pigs, goats, domestic fowls, or poultry shall run at large at any time. It also makes provision for a pound, and authorises the sale of animals impounded, if dues are not paid and property claimed. The pound-keeper's fees are :--

BY-LAW No. 9

Is designed to restrain dogs from running at large, and imposes a tax thereon of One Dollar on each dog, and Two Dollars on each bitch, the above tax to be collected at the same time and in the same manner as other taxes of the Corporation are done.

BY-LAW No. 10

Provides that the Selectors of Jurors shall receive the following amounts, viz.:—The Clerk, one dollar and fifty cents for each hundred names, and the Mayor and Assessor one dollar for each hundred names, which sums shall be paid by the Treasurer, on the production of the certificate of the Clerk of the Peace, as the law directs.

BY-LAW No. 11.

Board of Health.

1. To be composed of three members of the Council, and three others not connected therewith, to be appointed annually by the Council.

2. At least one member of the Board to be a medical practitioner.

3. That no person shall suffer the accumulation of any dung, manure, offal, filth, refuse, stagnant water, or other matter, on his or other premises, or on any vacant lot in the town, so as to be a nuisance or injurious to the health of any person in the town.

The Board of Health are empowered to direct any of their officers to enter any building or premises in the day-time, on the receipt by them of a complaint signed by one or more inhabitants of the town, and to cause to be removed (if necessary) anything therein which is prejudicial to health, and if any proprietor or representative having control of such premises, after having had twenty-four hours' notice from such officer of the Board of Health to remove such nuisance, shall neglect or refuse to do so, he, she or they, shall be subject to a penalty.

BY-LAW No. 14

Enacts that any person who is convicted of a breach of any of the By-Laws of the Corporation, and neglects to pay the fine or penalty within the time specified in the conviction or order, shall be committed to the Common Gaol of the County for any period not exceeding twenty-one days, with or without hard labor; or a distress warrant against the goods and chattels of such offender may issue at the end of the time allowed for the payment of the fine or penalty, and costs of prosecution, and in case of sufficient goods or chattels not being found, be committed to the Common Gaol for any period not exceeding twenty-one days, with or without hard labor.

TAKEN FROM THE STANDING RULES OF THE TOWN COUNCIL OF THE TOWN OF PICTON.

The Council shall meet on the first Monday in each month, at the hour of seven o'clock, P. M., unless such Monday shall be a public holiday according to law, when the Council shall meet on the next day following, which shall not be such public Holiday.

The Council may adjourn for want of a quorum, if enough members are not present to constitute one, one hour after the regular time of meeting.

The Mayor shall preside, or the Reeve in his absence, and in, the absence of both, the Council shall select one of their members.

The Clerk shall take down the names of the members present, and read the minutes of the last regular meeting and of any special meeting intervening, in order that any mistakes therein may be corrected.

The ordinary routine of the Council shall be : -

1st. Presenting Petitions.

2nd. Reading Petitions.

3rd. " Communications.

4th. " Reports of Committees.

5th. Unfinished Business.

6th. Motions.

And that all Business shall be taken up in regular order.

PICTON.

MANUFACTURING INTERESTS.

Picton contains two Iron Foundries. Barker & Shannon's Foundry is situated on Elizabeth Street, and is owned by David Barker, Esquire, and carried on by Thomas Shannon. The machinery is propelled by Steam power. This foundry has been established for many years, and contains the very best kind of machinery—some designed and manufactured by the proprietors. They employ ten hands, and turn out steam engines, lathes, agricultural implements, saw and grist mill machinery of every description, stoves, &c.

Phœnix Foundry is situated on Mary Street, and is owned by Stewart Wilson, and carried on by John McGregor & Co.; the machinery is propelled by steam. They employ five hands. Agricultural implements and stoves are the chief articles manufactured.

Picton contains two extensive carriage and waggon factories. Fralick & Brother, on the corner of King and Elizabeth Streets, was established in 1855. In this factory eight hands are employed. Carriages, waggons, sleighs, cutters, &c., are turned out each year to the value of eight thousand dollars.

That of Samuel Hart, on Main Street, was established in 1840, and is now carried on by Hart & Son. They do a very extensive business; twelve hands are kept in constant employ. Carriages, waggons, sleighs, cutters, &c., to the value of twelve thousand dollars, are annually turned out.

There are also two other carriage shops, one of which is conducted by John Thomas, and the other by John Dennison, both on Main Street.

In the manufacture of furniture, chairs and bedsteads, Abram Southard does a good business; his factory is on Main Street; he employs six hands, and turns out articles to the value of four thousand dollars per annum.

R. S. & J. N. Gilbert manufacture furniture, chairs and bedsteads, and give employment to four hands. Rufus Sawyer also manufactures furniture, chairs and bedsteads, and gives employment to four hands.

In Sash, Doors, and Blinds, Planing, &c., the only factory is on Bridge Street.

Prince Edward Tannery is situated on Mary Street, and was established in 1840, and is owned by Mrs. Hubbs, and carried on by John Carrington. It employs eight hands, and turns out about eight thousand dollars worth per annum. That of John Mallett, on Ferguson Street, employs eight hands, and turns out 30,000 sheep skins, 2,000 cow hides, and 5,000 calf skins annually.

Picton contains one Brewery; it has been established for many years, and is carried on by Charles Pickering, situate on Water Street.

CONSECON VILLAGE

Lies partly in the Township of Hillier, and partly in Ameliasburgh, being divided by a creek of the same name, which empties the waters of Lake Consccon into Weller's Bay, in which harbour the largest lake vessels can safely ride at anchor during the most severe storms, being protected from the roughness of the lake by an extensive sand bank.

The Government have decided, we believe, upon enlarging the mouth and dredging the harbour, which, when done, will add to the trade of the village by inducing many vessels to take advantage of its superior accommodations, and winter there.

The village contains three stores, two blacksmith and two carriage shops, four shoemakers, two doctors, &c.

Formerly known as Sodom, is situated in the township of Sophiasburgh on the Big Marsh, and opposite the Big Island in the Bay of Quinte, was at one time a place of considerable trade, which has greatly declined the last fifteen years, owing to its proximity to the towns of Picton and Belleville. A long stone bridge near here, connects the Big Island with the

County. It has the peculiarity of being the only bridge which the County has been called upon to expend any amount of money in building.

Is at the head of Consecon Lake, in the Township of Ameliasburgh. It has an extensive flouring mill, the property of Owen Roblin, from which it derives its name. There are a few stores, a blacksmith's shop, post office, &c., here. Mail semi-weekly. Population, about 100.

REDNERSVILLE

Is situated in the Township of Ameliasburgh, on the Bay of Quinte, distant from Belleville three miles, has a post office, store, blacksmith's shop, tavern, &c. Population, about 50. Mail three times a week.




