ECLIPSES.

There will be in 1839 only two Eclipses, which is the smallest number that can happen in one year, both of the Sun, and both invisible to the inhabitants of Lower Canada, viz :—March 15th, a total Eclipse of the Sun will commence on the Pacific Ocean, in long. $96^{\circ} 37'$ W., lat. $32^{\circ} 24'$ S., and cross the Southern Continent of America, the Atlantic, and Interior Africa, ending near Egypt—visible as a partial Eclipse in most countries of Europe. Sept. 7th, an annular Eclipse of the Sun will commence near the Japan Islands, and cross the Pacific Ocean, ending near South America, in lat. $20^{\circ} 50'$ S.

Adelaide, consort of William IV, late King of England; sister of the Duke of Saxe-Meiningen, b. Aug. 13, 1792.

Letters are forwarded to Newfoundland, upon payment of the Postage to Halifax only.

Letters for the above foreign places, (from France to Bermuda inclusive) can only be received at the offices of Quebec, Montreal, Kingston, Toronto City and Queenston. In rating these letters, the following rule is to be observed: for example, a person at Kingston wishes to send a letter to France—he must pay 2s. 5d., which is the Postage from Kingston to Halifax, and 3s. 9d., the Postage from Halifax to France, and the Post-Master will rate, viz:

Paid to Halifax, 2s. 5d.

Paid to France, 3s. 9d.

{ Observe that this 3s. 9d. is to be sent in Cash to the Postmaster at Quebec, who will remit it to Halifax.

Letters for any part of the Continent of British North America, or for Prince Edward Island, can be sent with or without payment of the postage at the time of posting.

Letters for Europe can, during the season of navigation, be sent through the Quebec office upon paying the postage to Quebec only. If they are to be sent via Halifax per the Falmouth packet, the postage must be paid to Halifax. If via New-York, both the Provincial and United States Postage must be paid.

Packets of one ounce weight are charged as four single letters. If a single sheet exceed one ounce, it is charged according to its weight.

Packets or covers, containing patterns or samples only, not exceeding one ounce, are charged double postage.

English stamped Newspapers and Colonial Papers, if open, are conveyed free to and from England by the Halifax packets.

OBSERVATIONS.—*First.* The nearer the time of the moon's change, first quarter, full and last quarter, are to *midnight*, the fairer will the weather be during the seven days following; the space for this calculation occupies from 10 at night till 2 next morning.—*Secondly,* the nearer to *mid-day*, or *noon*, these phases of the moon happen, the more foul or wet the weather may be expected during the next 7 days.—*Thirdly,* the space for this calculation occupies from 10 in the morning to 2 in the afternoon. These observations refer principally to the summer, though they affect spring and autumn nearly in the same ratio. The moon's change, first quarter, full and last quarter, happening during six of the afternoon hours, i. e. from 4 to 10, may be followed by fair weather; but this is mostly dependent on the wind, as is noted in the table.

the prophecy came not in old time by the will of man; but holy men of God spake as they were moved by the Holy Ghost." (2 Pet. i. 20, 21.)

While some, even sincere persons, appear contented to limit their attention to a few select chapters and passages of the Bible, the consistent Christian feels his obligation to regard every part of the Word of God. He cannot be unmindful of the more richly evangelical and devotional sections of both the Old and New Testaments: like holy Job, "he esteems them more than his necessary food:" (Job xxiii. 12:) and his devout meditations are more frequently exercised upon those parts which are peculiarly spiritual and precious, adapted to edify, and nourish, and sanctify his soul; yet as ability and opportunity allow, he labours to embrace the whole compass of the revealed will of God.

The whole area of our North American Provinces alone is more than twice as great as that of all France, which is 130,370,840 acres; but while France has a population of 35,000,000 of people, these Provinces have only a united population of 2,000,000 by the largest computation that can be made. Of this vast area there are not more than 30,000,000 of acres granted, and of these not more than 5,000,000 cultivated.

ON THE NAMES OF THE DAYS OF THE WEEK.

SUNDAY,—The first day of the week, so called from its being set apart by our Saxon ancestors for worshipping the idol of the Sun. The Saxons call it *Sunnandæg*; the Danes, *Sontay*; the Teutonics, *Sonday*; the Germans, *Sountag*; the Dutch, *Sondag*; the Romans, *Dies Dominica vel Mominicus*; the French, *Dimaache*.

MONDAY,—The second day of the week, was, in like manner, formerly devoted to the worship of the Moon. *Monandæg*, Saxon; *Montay*, German; *Maendagh*, Belgic; *Lundi*, French; *Dies lunæ vel feria secunda*, Latin.

TUESDAY,—The third day of the week, was dedicated by the Saxons to the worship of *Tuisco*, the most ancient and peculiar idol of the Teutonics, supposed by some to be the same as *Mars* (the god of war) of the Romans. *Tuesdæg*, Saxon; *Mardi*, French; *Dienstay*, German; *Dies Martis, vel feria tertia*, Latin.

WEDNESDAY,—The fourth day of the week, was heretofore set apart for the worship of the idol *Woden* (the *Mars* of the Germans.) *Wodnesdæg*, Saxon; *Wonsda*, Danish; *Weensdag*, Belgic; *Mitwogh*, German; *Mercredi* or *Mércredi*, French; *Dies Mercurii, vel feria quarta*, Latin.

THURSDAY,—The fifth day of the week, on which the idol *Thor* was worshipped. *Thoresdæg*, Saxon; *Bonnerstay*, Teutonic and German; *Thorsday*, Danish; *Jeudi*, French; *Dies Jovis, vel feria quinta*, Latin.

FRIDAY,—The sixth day of the week, anciently devoted to *Friga*, the *Venus* of the Saxons, so called from *frigan* (Gothic) to love. *Frigedæg*, Saxon; *Fretay*, Teutonic and German; *Vendredi*, French; *Dies Veneris, vel feria sexta*, Latin.

SATURDAY,—The seventh day of the week, was appropriated by the ancient Saxons to the worship of *Seater*, the *Saturn* of the Romans. *Seaterdæg*, Saxon; *Samedi*, French; *Sonnabend*, or *Samstay*, German; *Dies Saturni, vel feria septima*, Latin; *Sabado*, Spanish and Portuguese; *Sabato*, Italian.

SABBATH,—The seventh day of the week, was observed as a day of rest, in commemoration of God's resting after the sixth day of the creation. It is still kept by the Jews on Saturday; the meaning of the Hebrew word for Sabbath is *rest*. As Jesus Christ rose from the dead on the first day of the week, Christians have since set apart that day (Sunday) instead of Saturday, for religious worship; and it is, therefore, by many called "*The Lord's Day*." *Sabbatum*, Latin; *Sabbat*, French; *Sabbath*, German.

ON THE NAMES OF THE MONTHS.

JANUARY,—The first month in the year, so called from Janus, the most ancient of the kings of Italy who was deified after his death. Januarius (quia Jano sacratus) Latin; Januarius, Januar, or Jenner, German; Janvier, French.

FEBRUARY,—The second month of the year, so called from Februs (Latin) *i. e.* the expiatory sacrifices offered up by the Romans for the purifying of the people in this month. Februarius (dict. quod tum in extremo mense anni populus februaretur, *i. e.* lustraretur et purgaretur) Latin. Februarius, Februar, or Hornung, German; Février, French.

MARCH,—The third month of the year, dedicated by the Romans to Mars. Martius, Latin; Mars, French; Martius or Marz, German. The Romans used to compute the year beginning with March as the first Month.

APRIL,—The fourth month of the year, deriving its name from Aprilis (Latin) *q.* Apertilis, ab aperiendo.—Opening; because in this month vegetation opens and buds; Avril, French and German.

MAY,—The fifth month of the year, called by Romulus, Maius, from Majores (Latin) out of respect to the senators or elders of the city of Rome; Mai, French; May, German.

JUNE,—The sixth month of the year, derived from Junius (Latin) a junioribus, *i. e.* the younger sort of people; Juin, French; Junius, Juny, or Brachmonath, German.

JULY,—The seventh month of the year, called by the Romans Julius, in honour of Julius Caesar, whereas, before, it was called *Quintilis*, the fifth month of the Roman year. Juillet, French; Julius, July, or Heumonath, German.

AUGUST,—The eighth month of the year, called Augustus by the Romans, in honour of Augustus Caesar; it having been previously called *Sexilis*, the sixth month. Août, French; Augus, German.

SEPTEMBER,—The ninth month of the year. The Romans beginning the year with March, called this month September, (seventh month) from *Septem*, seven. Septembre, French; September, or Hebstmonath, German.

OCTOBER,—The tenth month of the year. October, (Latin) from *Octo*, eight; Octobre, French; October, or Weinmonath, (wine month,) German.

NOVEMBER,—The eleventh month of the year. November, (Latin) from *Novem*, nine; Novembre, French; November, or Wintermonath, German.

DECEMBER,—The twelfth month of the year. December, (Latin) from *Decem*, ten, beginning with March; Decembre, French; Decemer, or Christmonath, German.

Hides, Offal and Tallow of Cattle and Swine, slaughtered in bond. Manures of all kinds.

Models of Machinery, and of other inventions and improvements in the Arts.

Packages containing Dutiable Articles.

Philosophical Apparatus, Instruments, Books, Maps, Stationery, Busts, and Casts of Marble, Bronze, Alabaster or Plaster of Paris, Paintings, Drawings, Engravings, Etchings, specimens of Sculptures, Cabinets of Coins, Medals, Gems, and all other collections of Antiquities, provided the same be specially imported in good faith for the use of any Society incorporated or established for Philosophical or Literary pursuits, or for the encouragement of Fine Arts, or for the use or by the order of any University, College, Academy, School or Seminary of Learning within this Province.

Philosophical Apparatus, &c. &c., imported for the use of any public Lecturer for the purpose of gain, and to be re-exported, shall be allowed to be entered under Bond of two good and sufficient persons for their exportation within the specified time.

Arms and Clothing which any Contractor or Contractors, Commissary or Commissaries, shall import or bring into the Province for the use of Her Majesty's Army and Navy, or for the use of the Indian Nations in this Province; Provided the duty otherwise payable would be defrayed or borne by the Treasury of the United Kingdom or of this Province.

Specimens of Natural History, Mineralogy or Botany.

Seeds of all kinds, Farming Utensils and Implements of Husbandry, and Animals for the improvement of stock, when specially imported in good faith for the encouragement of Agriculture.

Wearing Apparel in actual use, and other Personal Effects not merchandize, Implements and Tools of Trade of handycraftsmen, in the occupation or employment of persons coming into the Province for the purpose of actually settling therein.

[The Native Produce and Manufactures of all or any such of the other British North American Colonies as shall admit the Native Produce and Manufactures of Canada free of duty, shall be entitled to exemption from duties under this Act, with the exception of Spirituous Liquors.]

ALSO,

Salt, Salted or Cured Meats, Flour, Biscuits, Molasses, Cordage, Pitch, Tar, Turpentine, Leather, Leather-ware, Fishermen's Clothing and Hosiery, Fishing Craft, Utensils and Instruments imported into the District of Gaspé from the United Kingdom or the Channel Islands or neighboring Colonies, for the use of the fisheries carried on therein, subject to such regulations as the Principal Officer of Customs at the Port of Quebec shall make, and which he is hereby empowered to establish for the purpose of ascertaining that such articles are *bonâ fide* intended to be applied to the use of such Fisheries.

The following Articles are prohibited to be imported, under a penalty of Fifty Pounds, together with forfeiture of the Parcel or Package of Goods in which the same shall be found :

INDELIBLE INK.

This article is now extensively used for marking linen. The shopman's price is usually two shillings per bottle; but those who wish to use it can manufacture it much cheaper. To two drachms of nitrate of silver, one drachm purest gum arabic, half an ounce, dissolved in half pint of purest rain water, caught in a perfectly clean vessel, in the open air. To write legibly with this ink, the cloth must first be dipped in a solution of one ounce of salt of tartar, in an ounce and a half of water, and exposed to the sun until perfectly dry, before the ink is applied. Nitrate of silver may be made by putting silver into nitric acid, (aqua fortis,) by which it is dissolved.

MISCELLANEOUS INFORMATION.

ON THE ORIGIN OF MONEY.

In the rude ages of society, cattle are said to have been the common instrument of commerce; and though they must have been a most inconvenient one, yet in old times we find things were frequently valued according to the number of cattle which had been given in exchange for them. The armour of Diomedes (says Homer) cost only nine oxen, but that of Glaucus cost 100 oxen. We are told by Pliny, upon the authority of Timæus, that till the time of Servius Tullus the Romans had no coined money, but made use of unstamped bars of copper to purchase whatever they had occasion for. Seneca informs us that there was anciently stamped money of leather, *corium forma publica impressum*. And the same thing was put in practice by Frederic II. at the siege of Milan. It is well authenticated, that, in the year 1574, the Highlanders coined great quantities of pasteboard.

To prevent abuses, to facilitate exchanges, and thereby to encourage all sorts of industry and commerce, it has been found necessary, in all countries that have made any considerable advances towards improvement, to affix a public stamp upon certain quantities of such particular *metals* as were in those countries commonly made use of to purchase goods. Hence the origin of *Coined Money*.

By degrees an improvement was made even in coined money, and the mode of remittances and exchanges by *Bills* was adopted.

AGRICULTURE.

"Agriculture," says Socrates, "is an employment the most worthy the application of man, the most ancient and the most suitable to nature."

THE FEEDING OF CATTLE.

A Table, showing the relative value of some of the principal articles of fodder, as determined by experiment; compiled from Mr. Ellsworth's Report. The amounts of each of the several articles mentioned are equal in value, as fodder, to one hundred pounds of good hay.

Sixteen pounds of hay are equal to thirty-two of potatoes; and fourteen pounds of boiled potatoes will allow of the diminution of eight pounds of hay.

An ox requires 2 per cent of his live weight per day in hay: if he works, $2\frac{1}{2}$ per cent. A milch cow requires 3 per cent.; a fattening ox, 5 per cent. at first, 4 per cent. when half fat, or an average of $4\frac{1}{2}$ per cent. Sheep when full-grown, require $2\frac{1}{2}$ per cent of their weight in hay per day.

BLACK AND WHITE PAINTS.

Tools, waggons, &c. painted black, absorb the sun's rays, become hot, and warp and crack. Painted white, they reflect, and do not absorb the rays consequently do not become hot, and they remain uninjured by warping. Hence all wooden articles should be painted of some light color.

COMPOSITION FOR SHOES.

Two parts of tar, two of beef's tallow, and one of bees-wax, make a good composition for boots and shoes. Apply it quite warm, and warm the leather that it may penetrate. As farmers are frequently exposed to wet, they should be careful to keep their feet dry and warm, for on this their health and comfort in a great measure depend. There are various compositions that are good to resist water and preserve leather, and the proportion of the above may be varied. Tar and tallow will answer alone; so will tallow and bees-wax.

KEEPING FARM ACCOUNTS.

Let any farmer try the experiment, and he will find it as interesting as it is useful, to know from year to year the actual produce of his farm. Let everything, therefore, which can, be measured and weighed; and let that which cannot be brought to an exact standard, be estimated as if he himself were about to sell or purchase it. Let him likewise, as near as possible, measure the ground which he plants, the quantity of seed which he uses, and the manner in which he applies. The labor of doing this is nothing compared with the satisfaction of having done it, and the benefits which must arise from it. Conjecture, in these cases, is perfectly wild and uncertain, varying often with different individuals, almost a hundred per cent. Exactness enables a man to form conclusions, which may most essentially, and in innumerable ways, avail to his advantage. It is that alone which can give any value to his experience. It is that which will make his experience the sure basis of improvement; it will put it in his power to give safe counsel to his friends, and it is the only ground on which he can accurately place confidence himself.

BEST REMEDY FOR BURNS.

Pound and sift *wood soot*, and mix it with sweet lard, and apply it, spread on linen rags. It will ease a burn quicker than anything. If the skin is off, the great thing is to keep it covered close from the air. If the burns are large and bad, give salts or cream tartar as a cathartic.

WASHING HANDS.

To promote the softness of the skin, mild emollient soaps, or those abounding in oil, should be used, by which means chaps and chilblanes will generally be avoided. The coarse, strong kinds of soap, or those containing much alkali, should for a like reason be rejected, as they tend to render the skin rough, dry, and brittle. The immersion of the hands in alkaline laves, or strongly acidulated water, has a similar effect. When the hands are very dirty, a little good soft soap may be used with warm water, which will quickly remove oily and greasy matter. The use of a little sand, or powdered pumice-stone, with the soap, will generally remove the roughness of the skin even when induced by exposure to cold.

The use of a small quantity of chloride of lime and warm water, will impart a delicate whiteness to the skin; but this should only occasionally be employed, and then it should immediately be washed off with clean water to remove its odor.

TERRIFIC HAVOC.

By Lloyd's returns it appears that the amount of loss to Great Britain by shipwrecks, in the year 1843, was 610 ships, £2,000,000 of property, and 1500 lives.

May not this havoc be ascribed to man's ignorance, temerity, and folly, by which he is ensnared and taken? not to defective naval architecture; in that is the strictest supervision; nor to delinquent navigators. Accredited commanders are brave, proficient, and skilful in their profession; but are they temperate? Alas, how little has this been suspected! and how often has intoxication been the ruling demon of the wreck!

But what, after all, is ocean havoc, when viewed in juxtaposition with intemperance havoc as a whole? Let us see.

Ocean Havoc.

Fact—£2,000,000 annual loss.

Cause—Accidental contingencies, but chiefly moral infatuation.

Primary effects in loss of life 1500 annually, about 4 daily.

Secondary effects are, widows and orphans in sorrow; sympathy, and honourable succour.

Intemperance Havoc.

Fact—£50,000,000 annual loss,

Cause—Moral infatuation, and that dependent on the pleasurable indulgence of British Christians.

Primary effects in loss of life and soul, 60,000 annually, 160 daily, 7 hourly.

Secondary effects are, diffusive misery, contagious depravity, degradation, execration, widows and orphans in *woe, abandonment and despair.*

NICE CREAM CRACKERS.

One pint cream, six eggs—beat the whites to a froth; if the cream is sour a spoonful of salaratus must be used. Mix the dough very stiff and pound it half an hour.

HOE CAKE.

Three table spoonsful of sugar, three of cream, three eggs, one teacup of buttermilk. Stir in the meal till it is a little thicker than butter, and salt and spice to your own liking,

CORN MUFFINS.

Take one quart of buttermilk, three or four eggs well beaten, a small quantity of flour, mix them together and then make it quite thick with corn meal, and a table spoonful of melted butter, to suit the taste; butter the pan in which it is baked.
