His Excellency MATTHEW LORD AYLMEY, Knight Commander of the Most Honorable Military Order of the Bath, Lieutenant General and Commander of His Majesty's Forces in the Provinces of Lower Canada and Upper Canada, Nova Scotia, New Brunswick, and their several dependencies, and Administrator of the Government of the said Province of Lower Canada.

[Matthew Whitworth Aylmer, Lord Aylmer, Baron of Balrath in the Peerage of Ireland, and Baronet of Ireland, K. C. B. a Lieutenant General in the Army, late Adjutant General in Ireland, was born 24th May, 1775, succeeded his father, Henry, the late Lord, 22d October, 1785; took the name and arms of Whitworth in addition to Aylmer, by Royal Sign Manual, 1825; married 4th August, 1801, Louisa, second daughter of Sir John Call, of Whiteford, in Cornwall, Bart. The heir presumptive to the title is Frederick William, his Lordship's brother, a Captain in the Royal Navy, and born 12th October, 1777. The title of Baron Aylmer was created in 1718—the Baronetcy exists since 1662. The family motto is “steady.”]

Coin, Bullion, Diamonds, Horses, Mules, Asses, Neat Cattle, and all other live stock, Tallow, Raw Hides, Rice, Corn, Grain unground, Biscuit or Bread, Meal or Flour, Fresh Meat, Fresh Fish, Carriages of travellers, Wheat Flour, Beef, Pork, Hams, Bacon, Wood and Lumber, Hay and Straw, Fruit and Vegetables, fresh—Salt, Cotton Wool, Goods, the produce of places within the limits of the East India Company's Charter, imported from those places, or from the United Kingdom, or from some places in the British dominions—Herrings taken and cured by the inhabitants of the Isle of Man, and imported from thence—Lumber, the produce of, and imported from any British possession on the west coast of Africa—any sort of Craft, Food and Victuals, except Spirits, and any sort of Clothing and Implements and Materials, fit and necessary for the British Fisheries in America, imported into the place at or from whence such Fishery is carried

on, Drugs, Gums or Resins, Dyewood and Hardwood, Cabinet-makers' Wood, Tortoise-shell, Hemp, Flax and Tow.

And if Imported direct from the warehouse in the United Kingdom,

Seeds, Wheat Flour, Fruits, Pickles, Woods of all sorts, Oakum, Pitch, Tar, Turpentine, Ochres, Brimstone, Sulphur, Vegetable Oils, Burrstones, Dog Stones, Hops, Cork, Sago, Tapioca, Sponge, Sausages, Cheese, Cider, Wax, Spices, Tallow.

All goods imported from the United Kingdom, after having there paid the duties of consumption, and being exported from thence without drawback.

TABLE OF PROHIBITIONS AND RESTRICTIONS.

Gunpowder, Arms, Ammunitions or Utensils of War, prohibited to be imported, except from the United Kingdom, or from some other British possession.

Tea, prohibited to be imported, except from the United Kingdom, or from some other British possession in America, unless by the East India Company, or with their license, during the continuance of their exclusive right of trade.

Fish, dried or salted, Oil, Blubber, Fins, or Skins, the produce of creatures living in the sea, prohibited to be imported except from the United Kingdom, or from some other British possession, or unless taken by British ships fitted out from the United Kingdom, or from some British possession, and brought in from the fishery, and except herrings from the Isle of Man taken and cured by the inhabitants thereof.

Coffee, Sugar, Molasses, Rum, being of foreign production, or the production of any place within the limits of the East India Company's Charter, prohibited to be imported into any of the British possessions on the continent of South America or in the West Indies (the Bahama and Bermuda Islands not included,) except to be warehoused for exportation only; and may also be prohibited to be imported into the Bahama and Bermuda Islands by His Majesty's Order in Council.

Base or Counterfeit Coin, Books, such as are prohibited to be imported into the United Kingdom—prohibited to be imported.

And if any goods shall be imported or brought into any of the British possessions in America, contrary to any of the prohibitions or restrictions mentioned in such table in respect of such goods, the same shall be forfeited; and if the ship or vessel in which such goods shall be imported be of less burden than seventy tons, such ship or vessel shall also be forfeited.

MEMORANDUM ON THE LAWS AND ORDERS IN COUNCIL.*Regulating the Trade of the British Possessions abroad, in relation to the Import and Export Trade from the Canadas.*

All British ships must be registered, but British built boats or vessels under fifteen tons, employed in navigation in the rivers and coasts of the British possessions abroad, not proceeding over sea, except within the limits of the respective Colonial Governments within which the managing owners of such vessels respectively reside, need not be registered, but they must be wholly owned and navigated by British subjects. British built boats or vessels under thirty tons, and not having a whole or a fixed deck, employed in fishing on the banks and shores of Newfoundland and parts adjacent, or on the shores of the Provinces of Canada, Nova Scotia, or New Brunswick, adjacent to the Gulf of St. Lawrence, or on the north shore of Cape Canso, or of the islands within the same, or in trading coastwise within the said limits, are admitted to be British built boats and vessels, although not registered, as long as they are solely so employed.

Coals are exported from the United Kingdom to the British possessions under bond which is cancelled on the production of a certificate of their having been landed according to their clearance, or accounted for to the satisfaction of the Commissioners of the Customs.

By the law of navigation, foreign ships are permitted to import into any of the British possessions abroad, from the countries to which they belong, goods, the produce of those countries, and to export goods from such possessions to be carried to any foreign country whatever. The privileges thereby granted to foreign ships are limited to the ships of those countries which, having colonial possessions, grant the like privileges of trading with those possessions to British ships, or which, not having colonial possessions, place the commerce and navigation of this country, and its possessions abroad, upon the footing of the most favoured nation, unless His Majesty, by order in Council, in any case deem it expedient to grant the whole or any of such privileges to the ships of any foreign country, although the above conditions in all respects be not fulfilled by such foreign country : but no foreign country is deemed to have fulfilled the conditions, or to be entitled to the privileges, unless His Majesty, by some order or orders of his Privy Council, has declared that such foreign country has fulfilled the conditions and is entitled to the privileges.

And these conditions are by orders of His Majesty in Council, dated July 16, 1827, and April 7, 1830, (which enumerates and confirms certain previous orders in Council, and which are continued in full force and recognized by the late act,) declared to be that

French ships may import from the dominions of His Most Chris-

tian Majesty, the following goods, such goods being the produce of those dominions, that is to say, Wheat, Flour, Biscuit, Bread, Meal, Pease, Beans, Rye, Calavances, Oats, Barley, Indian Corn, Rice, Shingles, Red Oak Staves or Headings, White Oak Staves or Headings, Wood, Lumber, Wood Hoops, Live Stock, Hay and Straw, Coin and Bullion, Diamonds, Salt, Fruit and Vegetables fresh, Cotton, Wool, and all articles subject on importation to an *ad valorem*, on which articles the amount of such duty should not at the time of importation exceed £7 10s. for every £100 of the value of the same, (but the importation of Wine and Brandy in French ships is not permitted,) and may export goods to any Foreign country whatever.

Ships of the Dominions of

His Majesty the King of Prussia,
 His Majesty the Emperor of all the Russias,
 His Majesty the Emperor of Austria,
 His Majesty as King of Hanover,
 His Majesty the King of Sweden and Norway,
 His Serene Highness the Duke of Oldenburg,
 The Republics of Lubeck, Bremen and Hamburg,
 The United States of America,
 The State of Columbia,
 The United Provinces of Rio-de-la-Plata,

The United States of Mexico, may respectively import from such of the Dominions to which they respectively belong, goods the produce of such Dominions respectively, except those mentioned in the "Table of Prohibitions," and may export goods to be carried to any foreign country whatever.

The manifest of every vessel entering a port of the United Kingdom must state the name and tonnage of the ship, the master's name, the place to which the ship belongs, the places where the goods were taken on board, with the marks and numbers, and the sorts of goods and different kinds of each sort of goods therein to the best of the master's knowledge; and of the particulars of such goods as are stowed loose, with the names of the shippers and consignees as far as they are known to him; to which must be added a general account or recapitulation of the total number of packages of each sort, and of the total quantity of goods stowed loose. This manifest must *be produced to the Collector or Comptroller of the Port of Clearance, signed by such officer and the date of its production to him signified thereon.*

All Tobacco imported into the United Kingdom must be stated on a separate manifest, distinct from the general manifest of the ship, with the particular weight of each hogshead, cask, chest or case, with the tare of the same. Tobacco and Snuff can only be imported into the United Kingdom in a vessel of the burthen of 120 tons and upwards, and must be in hogsheads, chests or cases of at least 450lbs,—not packed in bags or packages within any such hogsheads, &c. nor separated nor divided in any manner. The weight of such Tobacco or Snuff in such case, &c. with the

tare to be marked thereon. The importation of Tobacco, &c. is further limited to certain ports in the United Kingdom. The importation of Snuff Work, Tobacco Stalks stripped from the leaf, whether manufactured or not, and Tobacco Stalk Flour is prohibited.

Hides, Skins, Horns and Hoofs may be prohibited importation into the United Kingdom by His Majesty by an order in Council, in order to prevent any contagious distemper.

Surplus stores are subject to usual duty and prohibitions as merchandise, but if not excessive in quantity, the Collector may permit them to be entered for private use of the master of the vessel or warehoused for the future use of the ship, although they may not be legally imported as merchandize.

No goods can be entered as of, or from any of the British possessions in America, unless a certificate is produced from the Collector of the Port of Clearance, of the date of clearance, and an account of such goods.

No Sugar, Coffee, Cocoa or Spirits can be entered as of the produce of some British possession in America, unless there is produced a certificate stating that due proof had been made to the Collector of the Port of Clearance, and such certificate to state the place of production, the number and denomination of the packages, and also the name and master of the ship in which they are laden.

All Coffee, Sugar, Molasses and Rum (although of the British plantations) exported from any British possession in America, into which like goods of foreign production can be legally imported, upon subsequent importation from thence into any British possession in America, into which such goods, being of foreign production, cannot be legally imported into the United Kingdom, are deemed to be of foreign production, and liable on such importation to the duties or forfeitures as articles of the like description, being of foreign production, would be liable to, unless the same shall have been warehoused and exported from the warehouse direct to such other British possession or to the United Kingdom.

All goods which have been legally exported from the United Kingdom (except as below) may be reimported on the following conditions. They must be entered by bill of store, referring to the day of their entry outwards and of the exportation thereof, provided the property in such continue in the person by whom, or on whose account the same have been exported—and that such reimportation take place within six years from the date of exportation. If the goods be foreign and had been legally imported into the United Kingdom, the same duties are payable thereon as would, at the time of such re-importation, be payable on like goods under the same circumstances of importation, or such goods may be warehoused as the like goods may be warehoused upon first importation. A Bill of Store cannot be granted unless the name of the proprietor is stated, the identity of the goods exported and so returned fully proved, as well as that the proprietor was such both

at the time of export and reimport, and that the goods had not been sold or disposed of to any one. Such declarations to be made both at the ports of entry and clearance. The following goods, however, though legally exported, cannot be reimported for home use, but are to be regarded as foreign, whether such or not:—Corn, Grain, Meal, Flour and Malt; Hops, Tobacco, Tea, Goods for which any bounty or any drawback of excise had been received on exportation, unless by special permission of the Commissioners of the Customs, and on repayment of such bounty or such drawback, and all goods for which bill of store cannot be issued, according to the form already prescribed, except small remnants of British goods by special permission of the Commissioners of the Customs, upon proof that they are British and had not been sold.

The produce of the British possessions or fisheries, imported to Guernsey or Jersey direct from such possessions or fisheries, may be imported into the United Kingdom for home use from those islands, under such regulations as the Commissioners of the Treasury may direct.

The produce of America can only be imported into the United Kingdom in British shipping, unless in ships of the country of which the goods are the produce, and from which they are imported.

No goods can be carried from one British possession in Asia, Africa, or America to any other, nor from one part of such possession to another part thereof, unless in British ships.

No goods can be imported into any British possessions in any foreign ships, unless they be the ships of the country of which they are the produce and from which they are exported,

All imports into or exports (except the produce of the British fisheries) from Lower Canada by sea, to or from any other place other than the United Kingdom or some other of such possessions, must take place at the Port of Quebec, the only free port for Lower Canada, under penalty of forfeiture. Montreal, however, is a warehousing port for all goods brought by land or inland navigation, or imported in British ships.

All Blubber, Train, or Spermaceti Oil, Head Matter or Whale Fins, entered in the United Kingdom as the produce of the seas, and caught wholly by British subjects usually residing in some part of His Majesty's dominions, and imported from British possessions, must be accompanied by a certificate thereof from the Collector at the Port of Clearance, or if there should be no Collector, from two principal inhabitants of the place of clearance.

Goods, the produce of the Canadas, may be exported to the United Kingdom or the British possessions without restriction, but must be accompanied by a certificate of clearance.

No goods shall, upon importation into any of the British possessions in America, be deemed to be of the growth, production, or manufacture of the United Kingdom, or of any British posses-

sion in America, unless imported from the United Kingdom, or from some British possession in America.

No goods can be imported into any British possession as being imported from the United Kingdom, or from any other British possession (if any advantage attach to such distinction), unless such goods appear upon the cockets or other proper documents for the same to have been duly cleared outwards, at the port of exportation in the United Kingdom or such other British possession, nor unless the ground upon which such advantage be claimed be stated in such cocket or document.

NOTE.—There is no drawback whatever on any goods exported, except on Salt for the use of the Fisheries within the limits of the Province, and on

The regulations which affect the Commanders of vessels, or persons in charge of the same, within the ports and harbours of Quebec and Montreal, and the Branch Pilots, imposed by Provincial enactments or bye-laws of the Trinity Houses, are not here inserted, as Masters of vessels will find them at full length in pamphlets containing extracts from the laws of Lower Canada, and the bye-laws and regulations of the Trinity Houses, with a copy of which the Harbour Masters are obliged by law to furnish them, and for which the Harbour Master of Quebec is allowed to charge 7s 6d, and that of Montreal 2s 6d.

LIGHT HOUSE ON GREEN ISLAND.

The Lantern of the Light-house on Green Island in the River St. Lawrence shows a light every evening, from sun set to sun rise the next morning, from the 15th April to the 10th December, inclusive, and the following are the bearings of it, by compass, from the respective places hereunder mentioned, viz:—

LIGHT HOUSE AT POINTE DES MONTS.

The Lantern of the Light-house on Pointe des Monts (or Cape Mont-Pelé) on the north side of the River St. Lawrence, nearly opposite to Cape Chat, stands one hundred feet above the water.

The Light-house lays with the outermost part of Carribou Point, N. 52° east and S. 52° west, by compass, and can be seen over that point, and to the eastward of it.

Ships approaching the light from the eastward, as they draw towards Carribou Point, must bring it to bear W. by S. they will then be in a good fair way, and if necessary they can near the land by their lead.

After passing Carribou Point, and as they draw towards the Light-house they must come no nearer than twelve fathoms water to avoid two ledges of rocks:—one of which lays E. S. E. from the Light-house, with only twelve feet water on it; the other lays S. W. from the Light-house, and E. S. E. from the western extremity of Pointe des Monts, with sixteen feet water on it; but these rocks do not lay further from the shore than a half a mile at low water.

The Light-house lays with the western extremity of Pointe des Monts, N. 64° east and S. 64° west, and distant about one mile; and when ships are to the westward of the Pointe, the Light-house is in one with the outermost rocks off the Pointe—and in the day time it forms a bold distinct land-mark—and on this line of bearing, ships are in the best possible fair way for the general purposes of navigation, whether bound up or down.

For any particular purpose of navigation, ships may safely stand to the northward, until the light bears E. by N.; they will then be drawing near the north land; and when it bears E. $\frac{1}{2}$ N. it is time to tack; for when it bears east it will shut in with the high land and cannot be seen to the southward of east, and then they will be only one mile from the land, and if they are off Godbout River, Pointe des Monts will bear from them E. by S. two leagues distant.

When ships are off Saint Nicolas harbour, and the light bearing E. by N. they are in a good fair way from the north land. The S. E. spitt of Manicougan great shoal, the ship and the Light-house are all in one line of bearing.

PROVISION POSTS ON ANTICOSTI.

On the outermost extremity of the west end of Anticosti stands a Direction Board. From this board to the house of Gamache, where there is a depot of provisions, at the upper part of Grand Bay, by crossing the isthmus formed by Point Henry, the distance is six miles; but from this board round Point Henry, and up the bay to the house, it is double the distance.

Six leagues to the eastward of Grand Bay is Duck River, at the mouth of which, on the east side, stands the Direction Board.

Four leagues to the eastward of Duck River is Otter River; close to its entrance stands the Direction Board.

Four leagues to the eastward of Otter River is Seal River, on the east side of which is a Direction Board, nailed to the house used only in summer by Gamache's salmon and seal fishers; at this house there are no provisions.

Two leagues from the river is the S. W. point of the island—on both the extreme east and west ends of which stands a Direction Board, about one mile from each other, and about one mile from the easternmost stands another Direction Board, in the Bay, to the eastward of the point.

Seven leagues to the eastward of the S. W. point is Heath River, on the east side of its entrance stands the Direction Board.

Three leagues to the eastward of Heath River is Pavilion or Flag River, and two miles to the eastward of it stands the Direction Board, on a point on the east side of the bay.

Six leagues to the eastward of Flag River is Hamel's Post, at Jupiter River, where there is a depot of provisions.

Seven leagues to the eastward of Mr. Hamel, and on the south side of the east end of the island is a Direction Board, and on the north side of the east end is another Direction Board.

Four leagues from this board, on the north side of the island, is the Post of Bell, kept by Mr. Godin.

It may be remarked that all these rivers are merely creeks, there not being water in any of them for a boat at low water, except Jupiter River at Hamel's Post.

VARIATIONS OF THE COMPASS

IN THE GULF OF ST. LAWRENCE.

It appears from the observations of Capt. Bayfield, R. N. that the variations of the compass are erroneously laid down in almost all the charts actually in use. At the time the charts of Major Holland and Admiral Saunders were constructed, the variations as laid down might have been correct, but they have since materially altered, and there can be little doubt of many vessels having been thrown ashore, by errors arising from this source. For example, a vessel off Pointe des Monts shapes her course to pass to the southward of Anticosti. Consulting any of the charts now in use, the Master finds the variation marked $7\frac{1}{2}$ degrees; whilst it is in reality $23\frac{1}{2}$. He therefore steers too far to the northward by more than half a point of the compass; and if the night should be dark, and the weather bad, stands a great chance of running on the island. The same error, in the case of ships bound to Quebec, causes them to pursue a course too far to the southward; and hence many of them run on the south coast. It is conceived, therefore, that the following statements of the variation, sufficiently exact for the purposes of navigation, will prove valuable to Masters of vessels navigating the St. Lawrence.

POST OFFICE REGULATIONS.

Letters for the United States must be post paid to the Lines, and those intended to go that way for Europe must be post paid to the port from which they will depart.

Letters for Europe, intended to go by way of Quebec, must

be post paid to that place, and those meant to go by the Halifax route must be post paid to Halifax.

All letters for the Baye Chaleur, Berthier, (*en bas*,) Bic, Cocona, Gaspé, Isle Verte, Kamouraska, Rimouski, River du Loup, (*en bas*,) River Ouelle, St. Andre, St. Anne Lapocatiere, St. Jean Port Joli, St. Roc des Aulnets, St. Thomas, and Trois Pistoles, which are to the eastward of Quebec, are despatched from that office only.

Unless attention is paid to the above notices, any letters put into the offices will remain there and be lost to all concerned.

All letters for places beyond the seas, in addition to the Inland Postage to Halifax, must pay the following rate of Packet Postage for every single letter.

To West Indies, 1s. 5d. Bermuda, 1s. 6d. Portugal, 3s. 2d. Madeira, the Azores, or the Canaries, 3s. 3d. Gibraltar, 3s. 6½d. France, 3s. 9d. Netherlands, 3s. 11d. Germany, Switzerland, Turkey, Russia, Denmark, Sweden, Norway, or the Brazils, 4s. 3½d. Italy, the Ionian Isles, Malta, Corfu, or the Mediterranean, 4s. 7d. Spain, 4s. 10d.

Letters for Newfoundland may be forwarded on paying the postage to Halifax only.

The arrivals and departures of the different Mails are subject to such frequent alterations, that it is deemed unnecessary to attempt giving in this place tables of departures and arrivals. They may be obtained at the Post Offices, where notice is regularly given of every change.

By a notice issued from the General Post Office in London, it is mentioned that by an Act passed in the Session of 1827, intitled "*An Act to amend the Laws relating to the Duties of Postage in Great Britain and Ireland*," the following regulations are established.

All letters conveyed by post from Great Britain to Ireland, and from Ireland to Great Britain, are chargeable with the like rates, according to the distances such letters are conveyed, *as would be payable if they were conveyed the whole distance in Great Britain*, in addition to the separate rates of Packet Postage, and the several rates payable under the Acts for building the Menai and Conway Bridges, respectively.

Parliamentary Proceedings sent to the Colonies by Packets—Printed Votes and Proceedings in Parliament, from Great Britain and Ireland to any of His Majesty's Colonies, are to be charged with a rate of *one penny half penny per ounce*, and so in proportion, in lieu of any sum payable under the former Act, *to be paid on putting the said Votes and Proceedings into the Post Office*.

Colonial Legislative Proceedings brought into the United Kingdom by Packets.—Every Vote, Proceeding, or other Public Paper, printed by order, or under the authority of the Legislative Assemblies of any of His Majesty's Colonies, is to be charged with a rate of *one penny half penny per ounce*, and so in proportion,

to be paid on delivery thereof to the person or persons to whom the same shall be addressed.

Newspapers brought by Merchant Ships from abroad.—Every Newspaper printed within His Majesty's Colonies, brought into the United Kingdom by any Ship, other than a Packet, and delivered by the Commander at any Post Office, with the Ship's Letters, is to be charged with a rate of threepence, to be paid on delivery thereof, by the person or persons to whom the same shall be addressed.

Pamphlets, &c. conveyed to the Colonies.—Every Pamphlet, Magazine, Review, or other periodical publication, put into the Post Office at Falmouth, not exceeding six ounces in weight, to be charged one shilling, and the further sum of threepence for every additional ounce.

Pamphlets, &c. under this section cannot be received at any Post Office except Falmouth.

N. B.—If such printed Vote, Proceeding, Newspaper, Pamphlet, Magazine, &c. be not sent without a cover, or in a cover open at the sides, or if any writing be thereon, other than the superscription, or any other paper or thing be enclosed therein, the packet will be liable to the full rates of postage as a letter.

Newspapers for His Majesty's Colonies, and places beyond the Seas.—Every such Newspaper or other printed paper liable to the Stamp Duty, and for the conveyance of which any Duty of Postage is chargeable, to be put into the Post Office of the town or place in Great Britain or Ireland, in or at which such paper shall be published on any day, within seven days, next after the day on which the same paper shall be published, the day of publication to be ascertained by the date of such paper, and in case any such paper be put into any Post Office after the expiration of such seven days, such paper is to be charged as a single Letter.

N. B.—This clause alters the regulation according to which Newspapers to the Colonies, &c. were required to be put into the Post on the day of Publication.

Merchants' Accounts, &c.—All Merchants' Accounts, Bills of Exchange, Stamped Receipts, Invoices, Bills of Lading and Proceedings at Law, written on one and the same piece of paper with a Letter, to be charged as a single Letter only; and any sheet of paper on which Letters to several and distinct persons are written, shall not be chargeable with any higher rate of Postage, in Great Britain or Ireland, than if one Letter only were written upon such sheet of paper.

Letters addressed to Officers of the Army, Navy, &c.—Letters addressed to any Commissioned Officer of the Army, Navy, or Ordnance, at any place where such Officer shall have been employed on actual service, and who, before the delivery thereof, shall have removed from such place, in the execution of his duty, not to be charged with any additional postage over

and above the rate of postage that would be payable, if delivered at the place to which they were *originally directed*.

A letter between Quebec and Halifax, 1s. 8d. ; Fredericton, 1s. 4d. ; Miramichi, 2s. 4d. ; and St. Andrews, 1s. 6d.

REGULATIONS RELATIVE TO THE DISCHARGE OF CARGOES AND THE DELIVERY OF GOODS AT THE PORT OF MONTREAL,

FRAMED BY THE COMMITTEE OF TRADE, AT THE REQUEST OF A PUBLIC MEETING OF MERCHANTS AND FORWARDERS.

Regulations respecting the delivery and receipt of Goods from on board of Vessels from sea.

1. The Consignees of all vessels arriving from sea, in the port of Montreal, are required to notify in writing the various Consignees of the cargo, of the ship being entered inwards at the Custom House ; and it shall be incumbent on the said Consignees, to pass their entries at the Custom House, within at least forty-eight hours after such notice, in default of which, the Consignee or Master of the ship shall have liberty to send the goods to the public store.

2. The Consignees of sea-going vessels are recommended to place on board a clerk or other competent person, to superintend the discharge of the cargo, so as to avoid as much as possible, the frequent mistakes and losses which now occur in the delivery of goods to their respective Consignees.

3. Consignees are not bound to receive goods on holidays, (*fêtes d'obligation.*)

Regulations for Steam Vessels and their Barges in the delivery of their cargoes.

1. The Masters or Agents of steam vessels and their attending barges, having on board merchandize of any description, shall give notice in writing of their arrival in port, to the Consignee or Consignees of such merchandize, at his or their office or usual place of business, one hour before beginning to unload ; and in case of being loaded with grain, salt in bulk, or coals, six hours notice shall be given.

2. Steam vessels and their barges as aforesaid, arriving during night, or early in the morning, shall not begin to discharge their

cargoes before seven o'clock, A. M. from the opening of the navigation to the first day of October, nor before eight o'clock, A. M. from the first day of October to the close of the navigation ; and no merchandize of any description shall be landed after seven o'clock, P. M. from the opening of the navigation to the first day of October, nor after five o'clock, P. M. from the first day of October to the close of the navigation ; unless with the consent of the Consignee or Consignees.

3. Steam vessels and their barges arriving late in the morning, and partly unloaded during the day, may recommence delivering on the following morning, at six o'clock, from the opening of the navigation till the first day of October, and at seven o'clock from the first day of October to the close of the navigation ; and those which arrive in the evening, and give the prescribed notice, may commence delivering on the following morning, at the same hours as last mentioned.

4. The Proprietors or Agents of steam vessels and their barges, shall provide suitable storage for such merchandize, as may be consigned to persons not resident in Montreal, or which may not be called for by the Consignees in due time, at the risk and expense of such Consignees. They shall take particular care of small packages and parcels, as being most liable to be lost or mislaid ; and for all merchandize thus stored, they shall be entitled to the usual charges for receiving, delivering and storage.

5. Dry goods and other merchandize, subject to be damaged by water, shall not be discharged during rain, or at any time laid down in the mud.

6. The Masters and Purser of steam vessels and their barges shall be particularly careful of all letters and parcels addressed to Consignees of goods on board, and cause them to be delivered on arrival ; and their delivery shall be accompanied by an intimation of the hour at which the landing of the cargo is to commence.

7. The Consignees of goods on board of steam vessels and their barges, shall not be obliged to receive their goods on holidays, otherwise called *fêtes d'obligation*.

8. In case of any dispute as to the quantity or number of articles shipped on board of steam vessels or their barges, a person may be put on board by the Shippers, who shall be allowed one dollar for each day, and the party in error shall pay the same, together with his passage money, including board.

9. No damage shall be recovered on perishable articles contained in crates or slight packages, unless the description of the goods be set forth in the bill of lading.

10. No parcels of specie, notes, or bullion, shall be at the risk of the Proprietors or Agents, unless the freight be paid for them when put in charge.

Regulations relative to Durham Boats, Batteaux, and other small craft, arriving by internal navigation at this port, with merchandize from the interior.

1. The freight of goods brought from the interior to the port of

Montreal, is payable at the current rates, when no agreement exists to the contrary, on delivery of property in good order.

2. Package goods are to be delivered in good order, or to be put into that state at the expense of the Carrier.

3. Goods brought from the interior to the port of Montreal, are deliverable on the wharves in fine weather only, between the hours of six, A. M. and seven, P. M. from the opening of the navigation to the thirty-first day of August inclusive, and between the hours of seven, A. M. and six, P. M. from the first day of September to the close of the navigation. And it is incumbent on the Carrier to notify the Consignee of the arrival of the goods, and to cause to be left at his usual place of business, letters of advice accompanying the property or particulars thereof. In the case of wheat in bulk or in bags, a sample thereof to be left with the notice of its arrival.

4. The Consignee is bound to attend in person or by his agent, to receive his goods at the beach ; and if he neglect to do so for three hours after notice of their arrival in port, *provided the notice be given at or before three o'clock in the afternoon*, it will be optional with the Carrier to land and store the goods, subject to the expense actually incurred, or to retain them at the rates of demurrage hereinafter provided for ; in either case the property will be liable to the Carrier for the charges so incurred ; but no delivery of the goods sooner than three hours after notice given to the Consignee of the actual arrival thereof in port, or without the limits of the port, unless authorised by the Consignees, shall exonerate the Carrier ; neither shall the Consignee be required to receive goods arriving in port after three o'clock of the afternoon, until the following morning at nine o'clock, and ten o'clock for grain in bulk, and the expense of storage and cartage, in the case of goods landed by the Carrier, shall not exceed the tariff rates.

5. The rates of demurrage referred to in the preceding article shall not exceed seven shillings and sixpence per hour, between the hours of six, A. M. and seven, A. M. and twenty shillings for the whole time between seven, P. M. and six, A. M. in the case of a Durham-boat, nor three shillings and ninepence per hour between the hours of six, A. M. and seven, P. M. or ten shillings for the whole period between the hours of seven, P. M. and six, A. M. in the case of a Batteau or Barge ; provided that no boat arriving after twelve o'clock shall be entitled to demurrage for the first night, but only for the business hours after the expiration of the usual notice.

6. In all cases it is incumbent on the Carrier to deliver property from the port on the beach or wharves, and in the instance of wheat, he is bound to weigh or measure the same, according as the same may have been originally shipped by weight or measure, for the purpose of verifying the account.

7. Consignees are not bound to receive goods on holidays, (*fêtes d'obligation.*)

1st, The said Rates are for the whole distance from Lachine to Montreal (9 miles), and so in proportion for each mile of the distance that Goods, &c. may be transported on the Canal, but all Boats, Scows, Vessels or Rafts, loading or unloading, below Lock No. 4, whether in ascending or descending, shall pay the same as if they passed through all the Locks. A fraction of a mile shall be deemed a whole mile. A fraction of a ton in the measurement of a boat or vessel, shall be taken according to the number of quarters of a ton therein. A fraction of a quarter of a ton shall be deemed a whole quarter. Timber, Boards, Plank and Scantling in Rafts, to be calculated by the quantity of feet; no quantity under 25 feet shall pay less than for 25. Boats and Scows laden solely with Firewood or other Timber having passed down the Canal and paid the rates, are exempted from toll in ascending, if unladen and empty. Boats, &c. having descended by the River are subject in ascending the Canal to pay one-third more than the above rates of toll. Square-rigged or other Vessels from sea, Schooners, Sloops, Steamers, Barges, Boats, Scows or Vessels of any kind, and Rafts and Cribs, not using the Canal, are prohibited from entering that part of the Canal below Lock No. 7, or using the Canal Wharf below the said Lock, in order to leave the same free for the use of such Vessels, &c. as navigate upon the Canal.

2d, Conductors must be provided with a manifest or list of the packages or pieces comprising the cargo of each Boat, Vessel or Scow under their charge, distinguishing the species thereof; and also the measurement, if the toll thereon be so payable. The toll

on Merchandise being fixed by the ton, the weight must be marked on each package, whereof the rate is not specifically provided for in the Tariff.

3d, If the Collector sees good reason to doubt the correctness of the manifest or list, the cargo may be unloaded and examined; if found incorrect, the expense shall be paid by the owner or conductor of the Boat, Vessel or Scow; if correct to be reloaded at the expense of the Canal.

4th, Boats, &c. shall be detained until the tolls are paid, and the same power of detention is given, if any damage is done by persons navigating Boats, &c. or being passengers therein.

5th, Horses employed in towing must not be driven at any pace but a walk. Boats, Vessels and Scows meeting others in the Canal, those coming down shall keep the side next the tow-path, and those going up give way so as to allow of the others passing over the tow-ropes.

6th, Cribs, Boats, Scows or Vessels of any kind meeting under any Bridge shall pass in succession, the first that reaches the Bridge passing first, and they shall pass through the Locks in the same order and agreeably to the directions of the Lock-keeper.

7th, Cribs or Timber, when overtaken by Boats, Scows or other vessels, must give way thereto, and sheer off to the side opposite to the towing path, so that such Boats, Scows, or other vessels may pass; and there shall be with all Cribs, Timber, Boats, Scows or other vessels, a sufficient number of men for the due management thereof.

8th, No timber of any kind whatever shall be allowed to be drawn up the banks of the Canal, or to lie over the sides thereof.

9th, No Cribs of Timber, Boats, Scows or other vessels shall be admitted into the Canal unless they are in good order, and they must proceed immediately to their place of destination without stopping.

10th, The entrances of the Canal at Lachine and Montreal must not be obstructed under any pretence whatever; and all Boats, Scows or other vessels therein, must be ranged in conformity to the directions of the Commissioners, or the Superintendent or Overseer, whom they may appoint.

11th, Boats, Scows or other vessels, or Cribs of Timber, waiting either above or below the locks at the Windmills (Nos. 5, 6 and 7), must remain on the south-east side of the Canal, so as to leave the other side free for the convenience of loading and unloading.

12th, No Cribs of Timber or Boats, Scows or vessels of any kind shall remain in the Canal, except during the time of loading and unloading, or passing up and down; if detained, however, by unavoidable circumstances, they shall not remain along the wharves without the special permission of the Commissioners or their Superintendent, and they must be placed in conformity to their or his directions.

13th, No Cribs, Boats, Scows or other vessels, not in immediate

employ, shall be allowed to remain in the Canal, or in any basin of the Canal, without the special permission of the Commissioners.

14th, No Boats, Scows or vessels of any kind, shall be allowed to be drawn up the banks or slips of the Canal, without the special permission of the Commissioners being first obtained.

15th, No Cribs, Boats, Scows or vessels of any kind, shall be left in the Canal, either afloat, sunk or otherwise; and in the fall of the year, at the close of the navigation, none shall remain in the Canal, without the special permission of the Commissioners.

16th, Persons employing Boats, Scows or vessels of any kind, are prohibited, in cleaning them, from throwing chips, dirt, rubbish or filth, into the Canal, and from allowing any timber or firewood to remain in the Canal, either sunk or afloat.

17th, No Merchandize or effects, or wood of any kind, and particularly Cordwood, shall remain on the banks or wharves of the Canal, longer than forty-eight hours; and at the wharf below the river lock, near the Windmills, no Cordwood shall, on any account, be landed between the said lock, and a distance of about forty feet below the second crane.

18th, No Cribs, Boats, Scows or vessels of any kind, which have passed through the Canal, shall remain near the wharf, below the river lock, longer than a sufficient time to unload, and to take in their loading at the same place.

19th, The regular hours for the working of the locks, shall be as follows:—From the first of May to the first of September, from four o'clock, A. M. to eight o'clock, P. M.; and at the seasons preceding or succeeding those dates respectively, from day-light until dusk of evening.

The downward towage to be only two-thirds of the upward rates.

Any vessel taking the boat at any intermediate distance between Quebec and the Church at Batican, will pay the full towage, as if towed from Quebec. If taken in tow between Batican Church and the wharf at Three Rivers, to pay three-fourths of the full towage. If taken in tow between the wharf at Three Rivers and

Sorel, to pay two-thirds of the full towage. FOREIGN MONIES, WEIGHTS AND MEASURES.

General Index of Foreign Monies, Weights and Measures, with Comparisons and Explanations by Dr. Kelly.

It should be observed, that all the comparisons and explanations of foreign measures are here computed according to the new British Imperial Standard, which is about three per cent. larger than the Winchester Measure, or more nearly thirty-one gallons, bushels, &c. of the new, answer to thirty-two of the old. Hence to reduce Imperial Measure, add the thirty-first part to the number of gallons, &c. The contrary calculation must, of course, be observed with regard to prices. But the several proportions can be only stated with perfect accuracy in a regular treatise on Metrology, and as this index is merely intended to give general illustrations, all minute fractions are omitted.

Alberts Dollar, a money used in Lisbau and Riga, worth about 4s. 6d. sterling.

Alqueire, a corn measure in Portugal, answering to three imperial gallons.

Arroba, a Spanish weight, answers to 25 $\frac{1}{4}$ lbs. avoirdupois.

Barrel, or *Tunna*, a corn measure in Sweden, answering to 4 $\frac{1}{2}$ imperial bushels. Barrel is also a weight for flour in America, and weighs 196 lbs. avoirdupois.

Boisseau, a corn measure in Bordeaux, containing 2 $\frac{1}{2}$ imperial bushels.

Cent or *Centime*, the 100th part of a coin. It is of various values according to the unit.

Charge, a corn measure at Marseilles, Nice, &c. answering to 4 $\frac{1}{2}$ imperial bushels.

Chetwort, a corn measure in Russia, which contains 5 $\frac{3}{4}$ imperial bushels.

Coppec, a Russian money, the 100th part of the rouble.

Dollar, a Spanish coin, and intrinsically worth 4s. 3 $\frac{1}{4}$ d. but it is generally valued at 4s. 6d. The paper dollar of exchange in Spain is worth 36d. sterling, and Leghorn 43d.

Ducat, a gold coin in Holland of extensive use in the corn trade, is worth about 9s. 4d. sterling. There are various other ducats in different countries, in gold, silver and paper.

Fanega, a corn measure in Spain, containing about 1 bushel 4 $\frac{1}{2}$ gallons imperial measure; there are, however, different sized fanegas; thus there are the large, the regular, and the small fanega, which are to each other as 11, 10 and 9, nearly.

Ferrado, a corn measure at Corunna, about 3 $\frac{1}{4}$ imperial gallons.

Florin, coin of money of account in various countries.—In Holland it is also called the guilder, and is worth 21d. sterling. It is divided in Holland into 20 stivers of 16 pennings each; but in other countries into 60 kreutzers. Fls. Gr. means at Dantzic, florins and groshem. The Netherland guilder is divided into 100 cents, and is equal to the florin in exchange.

Franc, a silver coin of money of account in France and other places. It is generally valued at 10d. sterling, which is something above its intrinsic value.

Grosche, a money of account in various parts of Germany, and of different values; 24 generally make the rix dollar.

Grote, half the Dutch stiver, and at Hamburgh half the sol or shilling.

Guilder, also called *Guldon*, a money of Holland, See *Florin*. The gold guilder is much used in the corn trade, and is reckoned worth 28 stivers, or about 30d. sterling.

Guilder, Current, a money of the Netherlands, seven of which will equal six guilders of exchange.

Halster, a corn measure in the Netherlands, answering to about $6\frac{1}{2}$ gallons imperial measure.

Hectolitre, the principal corn measure of France, answering to $2\frac{3}{4}$ imperial bushels.

Killo, a corn measure in Turkey, containing $7\frac{1}{2}$ imperial gallons.

Kilogramme, the principal weight in France, answering to 2lb. 3oz. 4dr. avoirdupois.

Kroutzer, Creutzer, a small coin and money of account in Germany and other northern nations. In Austria it is at present worth about 7d. sterling.

Last, a large measure for corn in Holland, Germany, &c. varies from 10 to 12 imperial quarters.

Livre, an imaginary money in France, and several other countries. It is generally considered of the same value as the franc. In Italy it is called the lira, and is mostly divided into 100 centimes.

Lof, a corn measure in Libau and Riga, containing about $1\frac{3}{4}$ bushels imperial measure.

Molter, a corn measure in many parts of Germany; at Frankfort answers to 4 imperial bushels.

Maravedi, a small money of account in Spain, 34 of which make the real or rial.

Metze, a corn measure in Friuli and Trieste, answering to $1\frac{1}{4}$ imperial bushels nearly.

Milrea, a money of account and exchange in Portugal, worth about 5s. 7d. sterling.

Mina, a corn measure in Genoa, equal to about 3 bushels, 3 gallons imperial.

Mudde, a corn measure in Holland, answering formerly to $3\frac{1}{2}$ English bushels; but in the system of the Netherlands the mudde is reckoned the same as the hectolitre.

Paolo, a money of Italy, worth about 5d. sterling.

Peseta, a Spanish silver coin, one-fifth of the hard dollar.

Pezza, the dollar of exchange at Leghorn, worth about 4s. sterling.

Quinral Metrique, a French weight of 100 kilogrammes, answering to $220\frac{1}{2}$ lbs. avoirdupois, or 2 cwt. less $3\frac{1}{2}$ lbs.

Quintal, a Spanish weight of 4 arobas, or 100 Castilian pounds, answering to about $101\frac{1}{2}$ lbs. avoirdupois. It is also a corn measure at Bourdeaux, containing about 2 imperial bushels.

Real, a Spanish money of different values. The real vellon is the most common and is worth about $2\frac{1}{2}$ d. sterling; 20 such reals make the hard dollar.

Rix Dollar, or *Thaler*, a coin of money of account in most northern nations. It is of different value and variously divided.

Rouble, a money of Russia, which has varied considerably in value, viz. from 3s. 2d. down to 9d. sterling; 10d. is its present price.

Rubbio, a corn measure in Ancona, answering to nearly an imperial quarter.

Sacco, a corn measure of Leghorn, containing about 2 imperial bushels.

Scudo, an Italian coin, worth about 4s. 4d. sterling.

Sotler, a corn measure in France, answering to about $1\frac{1}{2}$ imperial bushels.

Sheffel, a corn measure at Dantzic, answering to about $1\frac{1}{2}$ imperial bushels. It varies, however, in several parts of Germany.

Skilling, a division of the rix dollar. In Sweden it is the eighth part, and it is divided into twelve rundsteekens.

Soma, a corn measure in the Venetian States, answering to $2\frac{3}{4}$ imperial bushels.

Stajo, a corn measure in Italy, of various dimensions. In Friuli and Trieste, it answers to about $2\frac{1}{2}$ imperial bushels.

Stiver, a money of Holland, worth nearly 1d. sterling. It is 1-20th of the florin or guilder, and is divided into 18 pfennings, 12 deniers.
