CONSTITUTION.

Adopted Oct. 23, 1850.

- I. This Society shall be called the Micmae Missionary Society.
- II. The object of this Society shall be the evangelization and civilizatio of the Indians of Nova Scotia, New Brunswick and Prince Edwar Island.
- III. Every person paying annually five shillings into the funds of th Society shall be a member.
- IV. The Office-Bearers of this Society shall consist of a President, tw Vice-Presidents, a Secretary, a Treasurer, and a Committee of at leastwelve persons.
- V. This Society shall aim at enlisting generally the sympathies of th religious community, by employing as its agents pious individuals of any the Evangelical Protestant denominations, whose main design shall be th prapagation of the great truths of the Gospel.
- VI. This Society will encourage and support its Missionary or Mission aries in producing a translation of the Holy Scriptures or of portions there in the Micmac language, but will appropriate no portion of the fundentrusted to their management for the publication of any translation, untit has obtained the sanction of the General Committee.
- VII. There shall be an annual meeting of the Society on the last wee of September, when a Report of the Committee shall be presented, and the Officers chosen for the ensuing year.

EIGHTH ANNUAL MEEETING

OF THE

MICMAC MISSIONARY SOCIETY.

Held at Temperance Hall, Halifax, Nov. 3, 1857,

THE PRESIDENT,—REV. DR. TWINING, IN THE CHAIR:

The meeting opened by singing, and prayer by the Rev. Mr. Hunter. The Secretary, Rev. David Freeman, read the Report.

Moved by Rev. Mr. Churchill, seconded by Rev. S. T. Rand:

Unanimously Resolved, "That the Report now read be adopted and published under the direction of the Committee."

Moved by Rev. Mr. Crisp, seconded by Rev. Mr. Boyd:

Unanimously Resolved, "That this meeting devoutly acknowledges the favour of the Great Head of the Church, thus far vouchsafed to the Society, and invites the friends of the mission for the future to abound more in earnest prayer, and to cherish firmer faith and hope in God."

Moved by Wm. Howe, Esq., seconded by John Burton, Esq.:

Unanimously Resolved, "That the following gentlemen be office-bearers for the ensuing year. Rev. Dr. Twining, President; James F. Avery, Esq., M. D., and J. W. The Benediction was then pronounced by the President.

REPORT.

In meeting our friends at the close of another term of Missionary effort, we think we can refer to the past year as marking an era in the history of the Micmac Mission. Never before could we say to the public of Nova Scotia that one Micmac had become a member of a Protestant Church, and manifested a desire to labour for the salvation of his countrymen. attending the Normal School at Truro, in order to be qualified for more We could never before state that three of the Gospels extensive usefulness. have been published, and the Books of Genesis and Psalms ready for the press, and the printing of the former nearly finished. At no previous anniversary could we say that several Indian children have been regularly We cannot forbear attending school, and making creditable progress. looking back at the past, and drawing encouragement from the progress made. We may surely thank God and take courage. Ten years ago the prospect was dark enough. It was desirable to establish a Colporteur Mission among the Indians; but the means of doing so were not at hand. Colporteurs and Bibles could be sent at once to the ignorant, and careless, and superstitious, who could speak and read English, Irish, French or Gaelic, but it was useless to attempt the enlightenment of the Micmaes, except through the medium of their own tongue. The questions which then presented themselves were: Can that be learned and the Scriptures translated with any degree of correctness, within a reasonable time? and, Was there any hope that native teachers could be prepared to aid, or take the lead, in making known to their brethren the great verities of the "common salvation"? These were the questions to be answered, and no wonder that they were long and seriously pondered. Years might pass, and the last remnant of the race might vanish away before we would be ready to begin the proper

work-before the preparatory process would be finished; and could it be our duty, under the circumstances, to engage in the work? "I fear." said a judicious friend to our Missionary, "that your energies will be wasted and your life gone, and nothing accomplished. You can't learn the language." But would it not be something to have attempted the language, even though we failed—something to have done at least a measure of our duty, even at a late hour, though few, though none of the race should be benefitted by our efforts? It was much for the Prophet to be able to say: "Though Israel be not gathered, yet shall I be glorious in the eyes of the Lord;" and for St. Paul: "I am pure from the blood of all men, for I have not shunned to declare the whole counsel of God." Many among us, if not all, can say that we never were sanguine of great success in the work of evangelizing the Indians, until some of themselves should engage heartily in the work. Should we meet with no disappointment, that desirable object may now be I attained. Should our faith and patience, however, be still farther tried, we will still wait and labour on. "They also serve that wait."

Although the most of the friends of the Mission are already aware of the fact, yet it seems proper here to record specially, that in the month of April last, Mr Rand's assistant, Benjamin Christmas, was received into the Baptist Church at Hantsport, on a public profession of his faith, and was baptized by the Rev. W. Burton, pastor of the church, from whose instructions he professed to have derived great benefit. The Committee think that a few remarks are called for in connection with this interesting event, to place it in its true light and to prevent misapprehension. They have reason to believe that their convert took this step deliberately and from conviction. So far as they can learn, he has for some time been carefully feeling his way, step by step, out of the grossest darkness, and spiritual bondage, into the light and liberty of the Gospel. Mr. Rand has laboured to convince him and we believe has fully succeeded in lodging deeply in his soul the conviction, that the Bible is the only infallible and the all-sufficient Rule of faith and practice,; and that it is his duty, as it is the duty and privilege of all, to take heed to it as to a light shining in a dark place, to search it daily to see if these things are so.

The Committee have ever felt that it was a matter of minor consequence with what body of Evangelical Christians he should unite, so that he were only born again and growing up into Christ in all things. These precious results secured, and the Committee would feel entirely satisfied by his accession to either of those Christian and Protestant bodies represented at their meetings. They are fully persuaded that Mr. Rand's chief efforts were directed to bring him under a Christian influence, and that his influence in favour of his own denomination extended no further than presenting to him

statements and explanations illustrative of the views entertained by that body. He also introduced him to ministers of other denominations and desired him to learn from them what they had to say upon those points in which we differ; as, however honestly he might desire it, it would scarcely come within the range of possibility, that he should present the views of others with which he did not sympathize, in their most favourable light, or their arguments in the most forcible manner. With this advice he complied, at least partially, and, after some time, applied for admission, and was received as stated above. If he only grows in grace, and in the knowledge of our Lord and Saviour Jesus Christ and brings forth fruit to the glory of God, all who love the Lord Jesus Christ in sincerity will rejoice. May the Lord keep him from falling, and preserve him to his kingdom in glory.

Mr. Rand has been engaged during the year in collecting funds, in teaching, in revising and correcting the Books of Genesis and the Psalms, in visiting the Indians at their encampments, conversing with them there, and at his own house, and in lecturing and preaching at different places in furtherance of the objects of the mission.

Our last annual meeting, the largest by far we ever had, was followed by an immediate appeal to the community of Halifax for aid. On no previous occasion was so much collected in so short a time. Mr. Rand received one hundred pounds, made up too, of small sums, for the most part, which were cheerfully contributed, within about a fortnight. The last instalment of our land was paid, the title secured, and the deed recorded. The land is increasing in value yearly, and ready to be occupied as soon as we are prepared to occupy it.

The winter was devoted chiefly to the work of preparing the two books of Scriptures referred to for the press. The translation was carefully revised and copied out. "I need searcely remind the Committee," says Mr. Rand in referring to this subject, "that both the one kind of work and the other necessarily occupy a good deal of time. In the transcribing, nothing can be left to the compositor. Every letter must be fully and distinctly formed. The Book of Genesis was first finished and despatched to England. On the 25th of April I finished transcribing the other book and sent that also on. A proof of nearly the whole of Genesis has thus been received. The first twenty-five chapters were sent back by the last mail, and I have about ten chapters or so, received since, nearly ready to be sent off by the next mail. The delay in getting it out, the Printer informs me, has arisen from the siekness and death of his best compositor."

Benjamin Christmas, according to the arrangement and decision of Committee, studied, during last winter, under Mr. Rand's superintendance, rendering, at the same time, some essential service to Mr. Rand in the

prosecution of his work. They also took in a little Indian boy named Peter, who learned the Phonetic Alphabet, and made such progress that he could read down a column of words in the Micmac Spelling Book of three syllables, with scarcely a mistake, just six weeks from the time he began to learn the Alphabet, of which achievement the Missionary is evidently quite as proud as Peter himself, for in his letter to the Committee he adds, "It may be questioned if any other child in Nova Scotia ever accomplished a similar feat."

"At the end of about three months," Mr. Rand continues, "he was induced to leave us, which he did not do, however, until permission was granted. But the desertion was temporary. He returned of his own accord. We found him at Truro in May, living with a white man, preferring the house to the wigwam, English to Micmac, and desiring to go on with his learning. We accordingly took him again and sent him to the Model School at Truro.

Another Indian child, a little girl, has been attending school at Hantsport. A small sum was appropriated to provide her with clothing from the Society's funds.

An account of another instance may be subjoined, as described in a letter from Mr. Rand:—

At the close of a lecture at Barrington a few weeks ago, an Indian boy about fourteen years old was introduced to me, who has for about seven years been living in the family of a white man, Mr. Josiah P. Doane. He appeared to have forgotten, in a great measure, his native tongue. His name is James Meuse. He was picked up, a poor orphan, clothed and fed, and treated with kindness, and appears to be much attached to the family and they to him. The taming process, as pursued by Mr. D., interested me greatly. It was in unison with my own theory on the subject. A wild goose, duck, pigeon or partridge, or any animal-so the Bible teaches-can be tamed, "and are tamed of mankind"; but it by no means follows that skill and patience and perseverance will not be needed. The partially-tamed fox will break his chain and escape to the woods. You must pursue him, recapture him, and keep him longer to the tether. For some time you will be obliged to watch carefully your tamed wild geese during the migration of the species, or your birds will give you the slip and join their companions in the air as they pass over. So it was with our little homo silvaticus. He would be quite content when no Indians were about, but as sure as a troop passed or encamped in the neighborhood, Jim became uneasy. Several times he escaped and had to be recaptured. Nor was it always an easy matter to catch him. But Mr. Doane persevered. If the child screamed, ran away, and hid himself; and if the men and women came

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In the protect him with noisy gesticulation, he would kindly reason with them. In thing at length secured the prize, Jim would at once become as gentle and infiding as ever—he would affectionately take the hand that held him, and aquire kindly after his little playmates at home. In time, it became unnessary to cage the bird, or to clip his wings. For several years he has nown no disposition to ramble. Some attention has been paid to his education. He has been sent to school, and can read a little, and can write better han he reads. Mr. Doane is a pious man, a member of the Methodist beiety, and has not neglected the religious instruction of his little protege. The salvation of his soul he very properly deems of paramount importance, wentured to assure Mr. Doane that the Micmac Missionary Society would ladly assist in the boy's education, and he engaged to send him at once to thool.

It may be proper to mention also that a "Micmac Scholarship," in connection with Acadia College, is in contemplation, to be applied for the benefit of the Indians. More than half the sum required (£100,) has already been ecured, and the rest will doubtless be forthcoming. Thus is faith anticitating the elevation of the race to the highest posts of honorable usefulness. Father," said little Newel Christmas, after a call at Dr. Shaw's at Kentville, when I get to be a man I mean to be a doctor, and to have a fine house ike this, and a waggon with two horses." Bravo! little Whittington. Listen on to the ringing of those prophetic bells! What shall hinder you from becoming a doctor, a judge, or even "Lord Mayor of London"?

As to DIRECT MISSIONARY LABOR, the past year has not been without fruit. It has been carried on during the whole year. During the past winter many of the Indians, though forbidden, visited Ben at his house, bened while he read and reasoned with them, shared his hospitality, and appeared by no means disposed to abandon him because he had forsaken is former religion. In May last, Ben repaired to the Normal School in Furo, and since that time Mr. Rand has been doing what he could alone. During the summer he made a tour through the Province, visiting Aylesford, Vilmot, and taking the shores of the Bay of Fundy and the valley, on his rrand to the red man and the white man. He also went to Annapolis Gut, nd Yarmouth, and thence round by Liverpool and Chester, arriving in lantsport in September. "Having my own conveyance," he says, "I could o when I chose, and stop when I chose. If I met an Indian, I could stop nd read a chapter to him. If I passed a wigwam, I could 'tie my courser an alder bush,' and make a call independently of postal arrangements." le adds, "I found Indians not in large numbers everywhere."

Sometimes the missionary was received very cordially, at other times in a ifferent manner. These receptions can be best given in the language of

the Missionary:—"I was told that the chief at Annapolis, who was lately installed with great parade and ceremony and High Mass in the cathedral at Halifax, getting the Bisbop's blessing. &c., had given out that in case I came into his dominions he would try the effect of powder and ball upon me.' I, however, met him several times, and though he did not treat me with any special courtesy, I neither saw nor heard anything of the threatened shooting. This was at Annapolis Gut. Day after day I went down to the encampment, and invariably found an opportunity to read and converse with some."

"At one of the coves in Granville Mountain, among others I saw two men who had been at Hantsport during the winter, and whom I had several times met before. My reception was quite cordial, and I felt quite at home. I spent an hour or two reading the Bible to them on Saturday evening. They thanked me, and invited me to come the next day. I did so, and found about twenty old and young assembled. They immediately prepared a seat for me, and listened attentively as long as I chose to read and converse. They enquired if I was not sometimes reproached for visiting the Indians. I told them I was, and that my Master suffered reproaches for mingling with poor and wicked men; but that holy angels would not think it unworthy of them, could they be allowed to do so, to come down and preach the Word of God to the poor Indian."

"In another cove I met an Indian, who, seven years before, at the same place, refused to allow me to pray, and stood aloof while I read from the manuscript copy of Luke. This time I had Luke printed, and he could himself read it. At his request I gave him a copy. Observing my own name written on the cover inside, I was about to draw my pen through I it, when, stopping me, he exclaimed, "Tuldetch! Tuldetch!" (Let it be, Let it be.) His wife told me next day that her husband thought a great deal of that book you gave him yesterday. An older brother, Josiah by name, was also there. He too could read. Both these men, heads of families, have I learned to read since we began to publish works in Micmac."

"'What good will the Scriptures do them?' I hear it sometimes asked." I reply, 'I don't know; but if they desire to hear or to read them, who am I, or who is any man, that he should withhold them?' Their priests are well aware of the influence which the Bible is likely to exert. They deliver their admonitions accordingly. 'How long you intend to stop?' asked a shrewd fellow at Annapolis Gut. 'I don't know,' I replied; 'are you getting tired of me?' 'We been that all along,' he answered coolly. 'Well,' I said, 'I suppose if you took a notion to walk about among the white people and converse with those who choose to talk with you, so long as you meddled with no one, nor hindered people in their work, it would be your business,

not their's, how long you staid.' 'But you have no business among the Indians,' he answered. I argued that I had, and that my object was to do them good. 'But,' said he, 'we are afraid of you; ever since you been make them books, we been 'fraid. We are 'fraid our children may be read 'em bye and bye, and then sartin they change their religion. We hear you and your Indian friend among the Indians in New Brunswick last year, and now we hear great many them Indians not good Catholics.' 'I am glad to hear that,' I replied; and we kept up the conversation some time in the hearing of a good many others. I told them what my feelings were respecting their salvation, and, like Rowland Hill on a particular occasion, how I would have read, and prayed, and preached, if they only would have allowed me."

"It is said that we have made one convert. Very well, we are glad of that. But I ask, may we claim all as converts whom Rome, if she had the power. would treat as heretics? Then we have made many, for there we must claim all who doubt the infallibility of "the Church," and dare to differ in opinion and in practice from the teachings of the priest. We have reason to know there are many such. Scores of them will listen to the Scriptures in spite of the priests. They tell us that a good many have ceased to go to confession, as they can "see no sense in that." Ten years ago they did not know there was such a book as the Bible. They supposed their prayer book was the Holy Scriptures, and that it was the work of Christ and His Apostles. They looked upon Protestants as heathen and infidels, and did not know that our religion contained any reference to Jesus Christ. They know better now. And they not only listen to the Bible, but occasionally a case of attention to the word of a deeply affecting nature occurs. I may mention one. I had lately been by request reading the Scriptures to a small group. After a time I noticed that a woman seated near me appeared to be paying great attention, and yet she was whispering all the while. My first impression was that she was going over her "Pater Nosters," or her "Ave Marias" in order to ward off the evil effects of the reading. I was mistaken. eagerly repeating every sentence and every word after me, evidently intent on understanding and retaining as much as possible. I was reading the farewell address of our Saviour, and the following chapters in the Gospel of John. As long as I continued to read, so long did she continue to listen and repeat; and it will not be deemed surprising that the time flew more rapidly than I was aware of, and that other engagements were forgotten, while this poor child of sorrow and suffering-for she was fast failing with consumption -was thus eagerly listening to the words of Him who was saying to her, "In the world ye shall have tribulation, but in me ye shall have peace." "Ye believe in God, believe also in me."

And I remember once at Wolfville being told that there was a sick mar back in the woods, and I paid him a visit. After a few friendly enquiries, is asked if I should read the Bible to him? He assented, and I read from the Gospel of John, beginning at the fifth chapter and reading on through to the seventh and eighth. He paid good attention, and the wife soon laid her work aside and listened, and their son, a young man about twenty years on age, who was amusing himself with a bow and arrow, laid them down, and took a seat near us. At their invitation I saw them again next day, when a similar scene occurred. I would occasionally make a remark as I read those discourses of Him "who spoke as never man spoke," in order to call their attention to some word in passing, to explain or apply it; and such was the attention and solemnity of the scene that as I wended my way over the cradle hills and fences back to the highway, I could not but bless God that He had bestowed this grace upon me to proclaim to these poor creatures "the, unsearchable riches of Christ." And it did seem to me at the time that should nothing further result from our mission, it would amply repay us to know that one Indian family under such circumstances, had heard what, otherwise they must dave died without hearing—even those words which. are spirit and which are life.

And, mentioning incidents which have stirred my own soul and comforted. my heart, reminds me of what occurred one day lately at Annapolis Gut I cannot say that I was much alarmed by the threat to shoot me, if I per. sisted in coming, but I trust I did feel my need of Divine protection from dangers of all kinds, and that unless the Lord Jesus by His Holy Spirit were with me, all my efforts to do them any good would be in vain. One day as well I went down from Mr. Littany's, near Digby, I struck off from the main road in order to make a short cut through the woods to the shore. I found and capital place to pray. I kneeled down under the spreading trees and lifte up my heart to heaven. I was startled by a rustling among the bushes, and looking up I saw a lamb, evidently a pet, with a clog attached to its neck, running up to me. It came and stood by my side, while I proceeded with my devotions. Its presence seemed rather to aid me than otherwise. It reminded me of Him "who was led as a lamb to the slaughter;" "and the Lamb of God who taketh away the sins of the world;" the source of salvation, of faith, of joy and peace. I rose from my knees and followed the rugged winding path down the hill, the lamb following or running ahead. On reflection I became alarmed for the safety of the lamb. Suppose, said I to myself, it should be attacked by the Indian dogs, who will protect it? And 1 another question came up. Suppose I should be attacked by the Indian themselves, as I have been more than once, who will be there to protect me A sweet passage of Scripture came as an answer. "Behold I send you forth as lambs in the midst of wolves;" and "Lo I am with you always." I lost my fears for the lamb, and had none for myself.

We emerged from the woods. The wigwams, the Indians and the dogs, were just below us. There were also seated there a number of white people. The moment the lamb made its appearance, a female form darted from the group, and seizing the helpless creature in her arms, exclaimed, "O here is my pet lamb." It was safe. Its owner and protector was there; and all the dogs in the universe could not harm it. Yes, said I to myself, and if I really belong to His fold who laid down his life for his sheep, who "gathers the lambs in his arms and carries them in his bosom," I, too, am safe. In every hour of danger he is there before me; "underneath me is his everlasting arm, and the eternal God is my refuge." I had a "blessed season" that day. There appeared little difficulty in finding or making an opportunity to read and converse with the Indians. I cannot soon forget the scene.

A few remarks respecting Collections and we close. The amount collected shows that we have been successful in this department. It does not, however, show the cheerfulness with which the money appeared to be given. Every where, writes Mr. Rand, I heard complaints of hard times, depression of business, scarcity of money, and numerous calls. Still it required only a simple statement of the facts of the case to bring out their donations. People would collect at the shortest notice to hear about the Indians. Even where no notice had been given, it would sometimes answer as well to attend a meeting convened for a different purpose. Friends at Mahone Bay and at Fort George can remember cases of this kind, and they will see by the published list that their kindness in inviting me to tell them about our Mission, and their subsequent donations, are duly appreciated. I seldom met a refusal when a personal appeal was made, and not unfrequently I needed not to make the appeal. It would seem invidious were I to mention what frequently occurred; at Yarmouth,-for instance, how they would hail me in the street and ask me to take their money-how the dollars would come enclosed in notes to my lodgings—one such note containing a five pound bill from "Harry and Annie."—How the children would come up to me with their own little donations, or with "Please Sir, mother sends you a dollar for your Mission." May their kindness to me personally, and their sympathies with the object in which I am engaged be rewarded a hundred fold. I would like to mention Barrington and other places, but space forbids."

The list will shew that several donations have been sent from the United States as well as from Scotland. Some were sent, some were handed me, some "left" for me, with an invitation to come on and tell the American christians what we are attempting for the red men. A stirring address was delivered by Rev. Mr. Haynes, of Boston, at the close of a public meeting

at Yarmouth. "Only let him come to Boston," said he, "and tell that story about 'John Paul,' and there will be no possibility of resisting it. Why their purses would jump right out of their pockets." All thanks to those friends for their sympathy, their donations, and their invitations to visit the Union. When our work has become so much enlarged and our own means have become so far exhausted as to justify the application to them, we will be most happy to avail ourselves of their kindness. But we cannot go yet."

CONCLUDING APPEAL.

The Committee cannot close their Report without reminding the members and supporters of the Society, and others, that their support must be continued, or the work cannot proceed. While we would cherish gratitude to God the Giver of all good, to whom belong the gold and the silver, and who has in his hand the hearts of all;—and while we would cordially thank the friends who have thus far cheerfully aided us, we cannot shut our eyes to the fact that there is danger even from the general favor shown to the Mis-Individuals may be tempted to withhold their support under the impression that their contributions will not be needed, since so many others are ready to aid. Persons belonging to each of the denominations represented in the Mission may be inclined to bestow all they have to spare on their own denominational efforts, and to leave the Micmae Mission to be supported by others. And these are days of trial and depression in trade and commerce. The man who has a pound or a dollar in hand may well be supposed to have several demands for it at the same time. Can we ask him to give it, or a part of it, to this Mission? He himself must decide that question. We have another to ask. Shall we inform our Missionary that his labors must cease—cease just at this important crisis—because the means of his support have failed?—that all the pious and the philanthropic in the Provinces, cannot submit to sufficient self-denial to spare the small sum needed to support his family, while he pursues his evangelistic labors in Shall the Committee be compelled to annul their behalf of the Indians? engagement with our "brother" who has entered the Normal School with the expectation of continuing there a year? Shall we check his desire for improvement and usefulness, and send him back to the forest and the wigwam? Must little Peter be told to go back and find a home where best he may, as the means of supporting him at the Model School are not to be raised? In a word, shall our whole work cease for the want of pecuniary aid? We can anticipate but one response, No!-emphatically No!! Let the effort be made; let the usual donations and subscriptions be called for, and we will see if they cannot be found. Some may fail, others will stand

in the breach. The poor out of their deep poverty will abound, and the rich will give of their abundance. And He who cares for the young ravens will care for us all. We will put our trust in Him. He will take care that nothing given for the promotion of His cause shall be lost. "Blessed is he that considereth the poor: the Lord will deliver him in time of trouble." "He that hath pity on the poor lendeth unto the Lord, and that which he hath given will he pay him again."
