REPORT of the Court of Directors
of the Canada Company, made to
a General Court of Proprietors, held
at the Company's House, in St. Helen's
Place, on Friday, March 23, 1832.

THE Directors have great satisfaction in laying before the Proprietors a Report shewing the growing prosperity of the Company since the accounts for 1830 were submitted to them.

Although the Court of Directors have at the

General Courts, held in June and December last, made communications to the Proprietors of such facts as were calculated to afford information on the progress of the Company, they deem it expedient to connect this Report with that made to the Proprietors in March last, and printed pursuant to their Resolution.

The Directors accordingly now lay before you,—

1st. A monthly statement of the sales of land for the year 1831, viz.—

On the last of these accounts the Directors have to observe that the instalment notes of the settlers, constituting, under the head of bills receivable, a principal asset of the Company, continue to be paid with punctuality. capital of the Company, advanced by the Proprietors, has been increased about £9000, by the payment of £1 per share, making the capital £151,000; of this, £88,000 is represented by assets in money, bills, or other convertible property, leaving £63,000 as the purchase-money of 420,000 acres of land, paid for and unsold, being at the rate of 3s. per acre. On the 31st of December, 1830, the land paid for and unsold amounted to 323,000 acres, which cost the Company 4s. 5d. an acre.

The causes of this favourable state of the affairs of the Company are to be found in the increase of sales as exhibited in the first account referred to, and in the payment of ready money by the Company for all outgoings.

The Directors have the further satisfaction of

stating that such is the regularity and zeal with which the business is conducted in Canada, that the Directors are enabled to exercise a complete control over all the affairs of the Company, particularly any undertakings involving expense, and they have it in their power to state that there are no liabilities whatever except those which have been foreseen and provided for.

A grist mill of the best description has been completed for the Company in Guelph, and is now in full operation, to the great satisfaction of the increasing population, which now reaches nearly to 1000 souls, and also of the settlers in the surrounding townships, unconnected with the Company, who send to the Guelph mill to have their corn ground.

The average price of the land sold in the last year has not advanced very considerably, but it is kept down by the highly important and interesting fact, that many of the sales have taken place in new and comparatively remote townships, being in effect a virtual improvement in price; thus stamping a value on what may have been considered the most speculative and doubtful part of the Company's undertaking.

The present state of the township of Guelph proves the justness of the opinion of the Commissioners as to its rising importance quoted in the Appendix to the former Report; and the information lately received affords such an interesting view of the progress of a new settlement in Canada, under existing circumstances relating to emigration, that the Directors are unwilling to consign the details to an appendix, deeming them worthy to be printed in the Report.

The town of Guelph, marked out in the heart of the wood in the year 1827, contains now—

900 to 1000 Inhabitants, who possess:

665 acres of wheat.

520 acres of other grain.

222 acres of potatoes.

677 cows and calves.

218 working oxen.

30 horses.

1232 pigs.

And three churches, for the three principal forms of worship, are either built or in progress.

- 1 grist-mill for 4 run of stones, in full operation.
- 1 saw-mill, with 2 saws constantly at work.
- 1 distillery in full operation.
- 1 distillery about to be put in operation.
- 1 tannery ditto.
- I brewery in full operation.
- 5 inns, two with good accommodations.
- 4 merchant shops.
- l apothecary and druggist.
- 4 blacksmiths' shops.
- 2 wheelwrights.
- 4 carpenters.
- l cooper.
- 7 masons and plasterers.
- 1 saddle and harness maker.

Upwards of 2,300 acres of land are already cleared, and the state of society there may be inferred from the fact, that it has become an object of anxiety with the Commissioners to effect the removal of a few settlers early introduced, whose habits and general conduct are not likely to promote their own advantage, or the welfare of the Community.

The town and township of Goderich may be considered as in a proportionate state of advancement; by the last returns received, they numbered upwards of 300 inhabitants, and are likely to progress rapidly as communications are now open with Goderich by land and by water. A road is completed from York to Guelph, and from Guelph to Goderich, and a post runs once a fortnight between the two latter towns, and oftener between Guelph and York. A good road has also been completed by Government from Guelph through Puslinch to the head of Lake Ontario, making the distance only twenty-four miles to embark by the steam-boats, which ply from the head of the lake in all directions, and which go as far westward as Detroit, from whence a schooner navigates Lake Huron to take up passengers or goods to Goderich.

The improvements effected by the Company, during the past year, have been chiefly the formation of roads, the erection of bridges and mills, in all which their decisions have been governed by the eligibility of the place for settlement, and the expediency of the case; nor, so long as the concern is conducted on these principles, need an unprofitable outlay of money be apprehended, since, as has been observed by the Commissioners, "the price of land depends "more on the facilities of communication and "local advantages, than on the quality of the "soil."

The Directors have considered it expedient to be liberal in dispersing information respecting Upper Canada, in the shape of maps and particulars of the Company's lands, at a time when a disposition to emigration prevails so strongly amongst the industrious classes at home; but they have studiously avoided all exaggerated statements, and, so far as they have had the means, have discouraged them in others. Notwithstanding this, the emigration in the present season, especially among people with property, will probably exceed that of the past year; and, as a facility to the emigrants, the means of con-

veyance from Quebec to York, a distance of 500 miles, are furnished gratis by the Company to persons who purchase their lands.
