## HOUSE OF INDUSTRY. FIFTY-SIXTH ANNUAL REPORT.

## 1892-93.

### REPORT OF BOARD OF MANAGEMENT.

1. The Trustees and Managers of the Toronto House of Industry beg to submit the Fifty-sixth Annual Report of the affairs of the Institution according to law.

#### INMATES.

2. The accommodation for Inmates is not sufficient for the increasing numbers seeking an asylum when too old to earn a living or discarded by relatives. Attention was called to the necessity for increased accommodation in the last Report, but for want of means the management felt itself unable to do anything during the year.

#### OUTDOOR RELIEF.

3. The demand for outdoor relief remains about stationary, the number of persons relieved during the past year being 8,457 persons, comprising 1,900 families, while the number relieved during the previous year was 8,676, comprising 1,913 families.

The amount of fuel distributed during the year was not equal to the amount distributed the previous year, but owing to the advance in the price of coal, the cost was greater. Cost of fuel 1892-3 being \$5,841.82, and in 1891-2, being \$5,741.17, but the total cost of outdoor relief the past season is \$1,018.93 less than the previous year, being \$10,209.90 for 1892-3 and \$11,228.83 for 1891-2. A reduction per capita has also been effected of about ten cents; the cost of relief per capita for 1891-2 was \$1.31, while the past year the cost was reduced to \$1.21. 4. The average number sheltered in the Casual Lodge per night during the past winter was sixty-five, while during the previous year the number was sixty-three.

Information concerning the Casual Lodge labour test.will be found in the very interesting report of the Casual Poor Committee.

5. The report of the Visitation Committee will also be found interesting, supplying information respecting the various departments of its work.

6. The Treasurer's statement shews \$3,475.84 overdrawn on the bank.

7. The City Corporation generously supplemented the usual grant with an additional sum of \$5,000 which would have been ample for the current year requirements had not a large debit balance from last year to be met.

8. The Superintendent's reports furnish the details of expenditure in the various departments, and other valuable statistics, and it will be observed from the Physician's report, the health of the inmates, and the sanitary condition of the House is as satisfactory as could be expected under the circumstances.

9. We have again to acknowledge with thanks a donation of 1,000 bushels of coke from the Consumers' Gas Company.

10. Religious services are regularly maintained in the House through the voluntary assistance of several clergymen, but the addition of a chapel for the purpose is felt to be a pressing want.

11. The Superintendent, Mr. Arthur Laughlen, and Mrs. North, the matron, continue to discharge their respective duties to the entire satisfaction of the management.

## REPORT OF THE EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE OF THE HOUSE OF INDUSTRY.

The Executive Committee beg to report that their duties have called for fifteen meetings during the year, which have been well attended. The accounts have been diligently scrutinized, and the greatest care taken to keep the expenditure as low as possible, consistent with the proper management of the House, and the relief of the external poor of the city. They desire to place on record their appreciation of the devoted labour of Mr. W. J. MacDonnell for nearly forty years a member and for so many the Secretary of the House of Industry. They congratulate the House, that their efforts for good have been again testified to, by the noble bequest of the late generous Mr. A. T. Fulton in the bequest of \$5,000. They also report their entire satisfaction with the management of the House under the able supervision of Mr. Arthur Laughlen and Mrs. North, and also the competency of Mr. Williamson in the management of casual poor.

#### REPORT OF CASUAL POOR COMMITTEE.

#### To the Board of the House of Industry :

The total number of men Casuals who were in the Lodge for the years ending 31st March, 1890, '91, '92, '93, was respectively 1,481, 1,247, 1,050, 996, and for the same years, the number who were only in one night was 530, 545, 426, 375, or by percentages 35.7, 36.4, 40.5, 32.8.

The number of Casuals who were in the Lodge from one to three nights was 395; in this respect there is a gradual improvement from year to year, the proportion of those who remain in longer than three nights constantly becoming less.

The number of nights that the remainder—401—was in the Lodge ranged from three nights to 124 nights, or comparing the record for the same four years we have 198, 166, 125, 124 respectively, as the number of nights during which any one individual was in the Lodge.

The number who were in the Lodge for at least 100 nights for the same years and in the same order was 14, 24, 12, 15; the change in this feature is but slight.

The average number sheltered each night in the Lodge during the months of December, January, February and March was 65; taking the years and the order as before the numbers are respectively 75, 82, 60, 65, or by percentages on total number in Lodge for the years, 5, 6.5, 5.7, 6.6, wherein the Board will see but small variation during the four past years.

In addition to the 1,050 men Casuals, there were sheltered in the Lodge last year, 78 women.

During the season 759 cords of wood were cut and split by the men Casuals in the wood yard; for the four past seasons the number of cords cut and split was 404, 729, 804, 759.

The Wayfarers begin to come into the Lodge about five in the afternoon, and no one of average orderly conduct is refused admission up to 10 or 12 o'clock at night.

Each wayfarer must take a warm bath upon coming in, after which he is provided with a good clean night shirt and a comfortable bed in which he sleeps till about 6.30 next morning. Breakfast is at 7 o'clock, and work begins in the yard at 8 o'clock.

To cut, split and pile a quarter of a cord of wood, requires from each man from two to three and one-quarter hours. The wayfarers who wish can have a good bowl of soup and a liberal allowance of bread with it at noon each day after the assigned work is finished.

The Board will observe that the decrease in the number of Casuals diminishes less rapidly, year by year, this indicates, that your Committee is gradually approaching the minimum limit of this class of the community for this city.

Discrimination is needed; still the city should bear its proportionate share of making provision for the wayfaring part of the population.

It is undesirable that the same treatment should await the man who is reduced to want through no fault of his own, and the man whose proverty is the direct outcome of his own lazy or extravagant habits. The one is a fello-weitizen to be encouraged and helped; the other to be carefully watched and coerced into industrious habits. We have both these classes in the Casual Ward, and with them a third class—aged men who cannot get work, or could not do work sufficient to keep them, if they had it. This means that the Home for the inmates must be improved and enlarged. The advisability of doing this has been before the Board for four or five years; necessity now presses for immediate action.

The labour test has been continued for the four winter months of December, January, February and March. This is the fourth winter during which your Committee has tried it. The effect has been that in four seasons the number of those seeking the shelter of the Lodge has decreased by one-half, but the quantity of wood, cut and split, has about doubled.

Your Committee hereby expresses its cordial thanks to the Elias Rogers Coal and Wood Company for the valuable and efficient aid it has given your Committee in supplying an ample quantity of wood for the application of the labour test in connection with the Casual Ward; and also its appreciation of the valuable services of the officers of the House who have had the immediate charge of those who sought the shelter of the Lodge during the past year.

The expense for maintenance of Wayfarer's Lodge for past year was \$1,807.41.

## REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON OUTDOOR RELIEF AND VISITATION.

The number of families relieved from April last has been 1,900. Men, 1,318; women, 1837, and 4,228 children, averaging four per family. Total, 7,382. Casuals, 1,074, 8,457; which makes a reduction of over 219 as compared with last year.

Bread Depôts. There were two in the west part of the city, one in the north and one in the east of the city.

Number of loaves distributed 43,533, costing \$3,713.62; a reduction over last year of \$841.

Groceries, lbs. 7,266. A reduction as compared with last year of \$320.

One Conference of Visitors was held with good results.

We cannot close without a word for our Visitors. Most thorough service has been rendered by these gentlemen. Much time has been devoted to the various families. Whilst some good men have resigned, their places have been filled with most careful and earnest men. Nothing but praise is due to these visitors for the devotion they have shewn to the poor and the care they have taken to give only to the deserving and thus save the funds of the House. There are forty-six districts in all.
