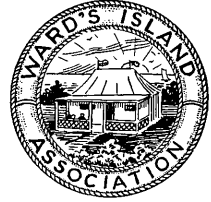

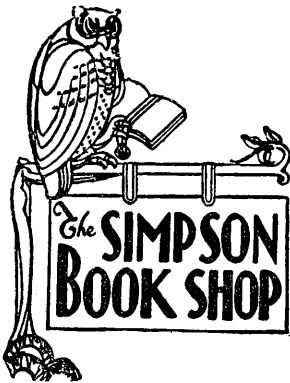

Silver Test for Pin—Swim breast stroke 25 yards; swim side stroke 25 yards; 1 rescue method on land; swim 100 yards free style in 2 minutes; low-board dive for points; tow a swimmer 25 feet.

Gold Test for Pin—Swimming 100 yards breast stroke; swim 100 yards on the back, 200 yards crawl stroke, and 2 low-board dives for points—swan and jack knife; swim 150 yards with clothes on.

The following boys have passed the bronze tests: Bob Baker, 23 points; Dave Knox, 25; L. Larking, 25; Don Cambridge, 22; Russ Callis, 22; L. Bartholomew, 21; B. Wright, 19; Jim Clayton, 19; A. Bartholomew, 15.

Silver test examinations were passed by two boys, Bob Baker and Russ Callis.

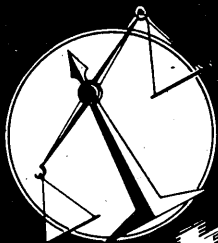
