

Chairman's Report

A milestone in the history of the City of North York was reached when the North York Public Library system celebrated its 30th Anniversary in 1980. Historians may reply that 30 years is not significant, yet enlarging on the Board's anniversary theme "We Grew Along With You" let it be recorded that along with a population growth in North York from 60,000 in 1950, to 560,000 in 1980, the library developed into a twenty-branch system with a budget of over \$11,000,000.

The anniversary celebrations brought together Trustees, staff, Council and the public for a mammoth Festival-In-The-Park featuring library displays, a used book sale, entertainment and games. The Festival was climaxed by a presentation by Mayor Lastman of a plaque from City Council recognizing the 30th Anniversary. A further Anniversary highlight was a public lecture by the famous Canadian geneticist, Dr. David Suzuki.

Yet another evidence of growth in 1980 was the retirement from service of the familiar bookmobiles. These libraries-on-wheels had faithfully served the outer regions of the growing Township and Borough of North York, and have now been replaced by smaller more functional "Read Machines." Personalized service continues to be provided to shut-ins and the disabled by the Shut-in and Mobile Outreach Departments.

LINK, a community information service pioneered by North York, flourishes, gaining public acceptance, support and use daily.

The birth of the automated circulation system and the continued fight to provide a Central Library worthy of the City of North York are two items that occupy the attention of the Board, and will still be before us for resolution in 1981.

Two memorable events in my capacity as chairman during 1980 were the evening when 200 North Yorkers packed themselves into a tiny branch library to protest library budget cuts that affected the service in that branch, and the occasion of the Board rejecting a demand to censor reading materials in the library.

Chief Librarian's Report

The Public Library continues to fill recreational and informational needs for thousands of North York citizens of all ages. Over 4.3 million books, magazines, records, cassettes, films, art prints, and other items were borrowed in 1980. Over half a million questions were answered by librarians and other trained staff. The Canadiana department staff compiled finding aids in two significant research areas: the Newton MacTavish manuscript collection and the department's native peoples collection.



The Urban Affairs section at Central, established in 1977, has become an important source of information on municipal affairs. An important acquisition in 1980 was the papers of Barbara Greene who donated them to the Public Library upon her retirement from North York Council.

A wide range of imaginative library programs was held at branches and other locations. The traditional children's story hour at times became a pajama party at the Don Mills Library; at other times it was an informal summer afternoon event in

Flemington Court Park. Older children were drawn to the York Woods Library by a summer series on film-making, while young adults were offered sessions at Bathurst Heights Library on how to find a summer job. Adult programs were as diverse as a series on running a small business, and a weekly club for Italian seniors. In all, 9188 library events drew an attendance of 189,834, about 60% of these were children. In addition, the Public Library provided films for 53,298 public screenings which were attended by 596,822 people.
