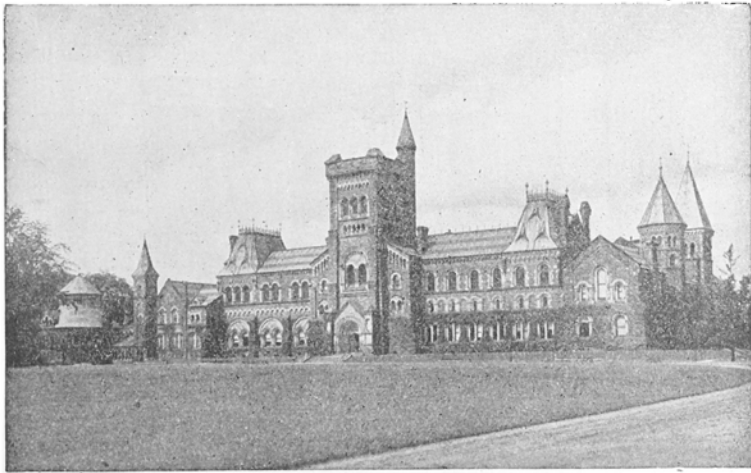

ROYAL ONTARIO MUSEUM

The Royal Ontario Museum, Bloor Street and Avenue Road, about two blocks north of Hart House, welcomes every delegate. The collections are very fine.

Special Features of the Programme

- Sunday Afternoon**—Vesper Service. This opening service is to be held in Convocation Hall, University of Toronto. The address is to be given by the Rev. H. J. Cody, D.D., LL.D., Rector of St. Paul's Church, Chairman of the Board of Governors of the University, and formerly Minister of Education for Ontario. A teachers' choir will lead the singing. Service at 4.00 o'clock.
- Monday Afternoon**—Reception to Dr. Thomas and Directors of the World Federation of Education Associations by the Canadian Teachers' Federation in the Hart House Quadrangle at 4.00 o'clock.
- Tuesday Noon**—Luncheon in the Crystal Ball Room, King Edward Hotel, tendered by the Board of Education, Toronto. **This is restricted to the official and overseas delegates.** Punctually at 12.15 o'clock.
- Tuesday Evening**—The Pageant, "The Heart of the World," a wonderful spectacle of music and colour and movement. It is a symbolic picture of the development of the world from savagery to civilization through the influence of education. It will present many national airs, national costumes and national dances, with a magnificent finale ensemble representing the world in harmony through the power of the child. It will be presented on four stages, rising above each other, and will be given in the Coliseum, which seats 10,000 people. Four choruses will take part: (a) chorus of 60 soloists, (b) chorus of 30 international groups, (c) chorus of 600 from C.N.E. chorus, (d) chorus of 350 children; T.T.C. Concert Band; altogether about 1,400 performers.

Directorate, the Canadian Bureau for the Advancement of Music and Dr. Fricker. This concert is one of the finest musical events in America and its spectacular features are thrilling. 8.15 p.m.

ISLAND PARK, across the Bay, large, natural recreation ground with accommodation for picnics, games, etc.

ALLAN GARDENS, Toronto Botanical Gardens and Palm House, situated at the corner of Carlton and Sherbourne Streets.

CENTRAL TECHNICAL SCHOOL, corner of Lippincott and Harbord Streets. The finest school in Canada, erected and equipped at a cost of \$2,500,000.

NEW UNION STATION, Front Street between Bay and York Streets, estimated cost \$10,000,000.

SUNNYSIDE AMUSEMENT AREA. Situated on the Lake Shore Boulevard, between Dowling Avenue and the Humber. Owned by the Toronto Harbour Commissioners. This is considered to be one of the best equipped and most beautifully designed amusement areas on the Continent. The new bathing pavilion provided with 7,700 lockers, shower baths, separate compartments for men, women and children, opens upon a bathing beach 1,200 feet long.

THE BATHING PAVILION at Sunnyside is a concrete structure, 400 feet by 120 feet, equipped with every modern convenience for the comfort and safety of bathers. Close to 8,000 bathers may be accommodated at one time. Water slides for adults and children are provided free of charge and, in the mornings, there are free swimming instructions for the children. Diving platforms and tower are erected in deep water opposite the centre of the Pavilion and contests, as well as canoe races, take place each week during the summer.

SUNNYSIDE SWIMMING POOL, 300 feet by 75 feet, holds 750,000 gallons of heated, filtered water.

NEW BASEBALL STADIUM, home of the Toronto Baseball Club (International League), on the new Boulevard Drive, foot of Bathurst Street, overlooking Lake Ontario. Grand stand capacity 25,000.

OSGOODE HALL. Queen Street and University Avenue. Here are located the central offices of the law courts of the Province of Ontario, and the offices of the judges of the High Court and Appellate Divisions. The building is named after the late Chief Justice Osgoode, the first chief justice of Upper Canada.

PARLIAMENT BUILDINGS, situated in Queen's Park at the head of University Avenue. The home of the Provincial Parliament of Ontario.

CITY HALL, Queen Street facing down Bay Street; height of tower 300 feet; diameter of clock face 20 feet. Tower Elevator is in operation from June 15th to September 15th. A visit to the tower affords a splendid panoramic view of the city and harbour.

ZOOLOGICAL GARDENS, Riverdale Park; contains a fine collection of native and foreign wild animals; admission free; open from 10 a.m. to 4.30 p.m. daily.

RIVERDALE PARK, in which the Zoo is located, is one of the most spacious and beautiful parks in the city. It is laid out in a vast natural amphitheatre stretching up both banks of the River Don and across extensive flats upon which have been provided lacrosse fields, baseball diamonds, tennis courts, bowling greens, and (in winter) skating rinks.

ROYAL ONTARIO MUSEUM, corner of Bloor Street and Avenue Road; open every week day from 10 to 5 and on Sunday from 2 to 5. On Monday, Wednesday and Friday

an admission fee of 15 cents is charged. Tuesday, Thursday and Saturday the Museum is free to the public. Delegates to conventions admitted free on showing badges.

HIGH PARK is situated north of Sunnyside Beach and extends northward about one mile to Bloor Street. It is Toronto's greatest natural park and was a gift of the late John G. Howard. Throughout its 335 acres of hills, valleys and plains, thickly wooded with a great variety of trees, it is a veritable treasure ground of natural beauty gems. Here and there along its winding drives may be seen duck ponds, streams, zoological gardens, playgrounds, flower gardens, and (in winter) skating rinks, toboggan slides, and ski jumps.

EXHIBITION PARK. Visitors are impressed immediately by the permanent character of the buildings, and with the marvellous beauty of Exhibition Park and environs.

PUBLIC LIBRARY. Central branch corner of College and St. George Streets. Has 100,000 books in reference department and 375,000 in circulation department. Open 10 a.m. to 9.30 p.m., excepting Sunday.

THE ONTARIO AGRICULTURAL COLLEGE, GUELPH, ONTARIO

The "Ontario Agricultural College and Experimental Farm" was established at Guelph in 1874. In June, 1924, a fitting celebration was held, commemorating the fiftieth anniversary of its foundation. At this celebration graduates and ex-students were present from all parts of America, as were also representatives of many Canadian and American Colleges and Universities. During the five days of the celebration over ten thousand people were present.

The College was established with a two-fold purpose: first, to train the young farmers of Ontario in the best practices and the science of good farming; secondly, to conduct experiments in all branches of agriculture, the results of which were to be published for the benefit of the farmers of the Province.

The Institution is situated on "College Heights," a mile and a quarter from the City of Guelph, Wellington County. This section is fairly representative of the type of general agriculture followed throughout the greater part of Ontario.

The College is the product of natural growth and development. In 1874 there was one central building containing dormitories, classrooms and laboratories. To-day twenty large buildings are in use for instruction and residence purposes. This does not include barns, stables, storage houses and dwellings. The enrolment of students in 1874 was twenty-eight. In the college year of 1921-22 the registration in all courses totalled 2,268. During the war the attendance was much smaller than formerly, but in September, 1919, registration figures in the regular courses broke all records.

The farm is over 700 acres in extent, most of which is under cultivation. An area of over eighty acres is devoted to experimental work in varieties of farm crops, and thousands of dollars have been added to the value of Ontario's annual crop through the introduction of new varieties which were bred and tested upon the College plots. The campus is one of the most beautiful institutional properties on the continent.

Students come from, and graduates of the College may be found in, nearly every country in the world.

The University of Toronto

(The Provincial University of Ontario)

The University of Toronto has the following Faculties: Arts (including Sciences and Commerce), Medicine, Applied Science and Engineering, Household Science, Education (Ontario College of Education), Forestry, Music, School of Graduate Studies, Dentistry, with Special Departments: Social Service, University Extension.

There are four Arts Colleges: University College, Victoria College, Trinity College, St. Michael's College, and two federated Theological Colleges: Knox College, Wycliffe College.

Attention is drawn to a new feature. The School of Hygiene, housed in the new building provided by the International Health Board of the Rockefeller Foundation, embraces the Department of Hygiene and Preventive Medicine, the Department of Public Health Nursing, and the sections of Biometrics and Epidemiology and Physiological Hygiene. The Connaught Laboratories, which consist of Research, Antitoxin, and Insulin divisions, are intimately related and in close affiliation with the School of Hygiene. Teaching, research, and public service are the functions of this School and of the Connaught Laboratories.

There are four affiliated Colleges: Ontario Agricultural College, Ontario Veterinary College, Ontario College of Pharmacy, Ontario College of Art.

Other institutions controlled by the University are the Royal Ontario Museum (in conjunction with the Provincial Government) and the Toronto Conservatory of Music.

The University has very close affiliation with the Toronto General Hospital and privileges in the Sick Children's Hospital, St. Michael's Hospital, Western Hospital, and the new Psychiatric Hospital.

Hart House is a unique recreational, social and athletic centre for male students. There are residences for men and women students, and a Students' Union for women. The average annual enrolment, apart from that in affiliated colleges and in extension courses, is approximately 5,000.

HART HOUSE

PURPOSE OF THE BUILDING

Every male undergraduate is required to join Hart House, towards the upkeep of which he pays an annual fee of eight dollars. Hart House contains Common Rooms of every description, a Reading Room, Library, Music Room, Sketch Room, a small Chapel, Photographic Dark-rooms, several Gymnasias, a Swimming Pool and Running Track, a Rifle Range, a Billiard Room, a Theatre and the Great Hall. There are also Senior Common Rooms for both Graduate and Faculty members. In its widest interpretation Hart House seeks to provide for all the activities of the undergraduate's life which lie outside the actual lecture room.

ORIGINS

To the Hon. Vincent Massey is due the idea of Hart House, the erection of which was carried out under his personal supervision. It is so called in memory of the late Mr. Hart Massey of Toronto. The architects were Dr. Sproatt and Dr. Rolph of Toronto. It was begun in 1911 and completed in 1919. During the Great War hundreds of men were trained within its walls for service overseas, and the whole House was used for military purposes. Above the windows of the East Common Room is carved the crest of H.R.H. the Prince of Wales, who has visited Hart House on several occasions. On the walls of the Quadrangle are displayed the arms of the four Colleges in the University—University, Victoria, Trinity, and St. Michael's. The walls of the whole building are of local gray sandstone, the cutstone being Indiana limestone.

THE GREAT HALL

The Great Hall is recognized as one of the finest Halls possessed by any University in the world. The panels at the south end behind the High Table bear the arms of the Royal Family and of fifty-one universities of the British Empire. The panels at the north end bear the arms of seventy-four universities of the Allied Nations—France and Belgium in the centre, the United States of America on the left, Italy, Russia and Japan on the right, Serbia and Roumania lower left, and Portugal and Greece lower right.

The arms in the Great South window are those of men who have played a prominent part in the history of the University. The east windows contain small designs symbolic of the chief branches of athletics and also of the various Faculties which go to make up the University. Among the corbels are to be found carved in stone the portraits of certain persons connected with the building.

The inscription which runs completely around the Hall is taken from Milton's "Areopagitica" written in 1644 in defence of the freedom of speech and freedom of writing. The portraits in the Great Hall are of Presidents, Chancellors and other important personages connected now or in the past with the University.

THE SOLDIERS' TOWER

The Soldiers' Tower and Memorial Cloister, which were built by the same architects and are of the same material, commemorate six thousand Graduates of the University who served in the Great War, of whom six hundred were killed. The names of those who were killed are carved on the walls of the Cloister.

The Canadian National Exhibition

Toronto has an outstanding claim to distinction in the fact that the Canadian National Exhibition is the largest annual fair in the world. Founded in 1879, this Exhibition has grown in area, in range of exhibits, and in far reaching influence, to its present commanding position.

The purpose of the Exhibition is to reveal to Canadians and to visitors from other countries the achievements of Canada in agriculture, commerce, industry, transportation, engineering, finance, education, science, and the fine arts.

The C.N.E. is beautifully located on the shore of Lake Ontario with a mile and a quarter of beach, and with three hundred and fifty acres of grounds. There are twenty major buildings and hundreds of other buildings. The Coliseum in which the Pageant and the C.N.E. Chorus Concert are to be given seats over 10,000 in its arena, and is a vast building.

The special feature of the 1927 Exhibition is the opening of the New Diamond Jubilee of Confederation Eastern Entrance to commemorate Canada's sixtieth birthday. This great entrance is a striking addition to the major features of the C.N.E.

The President and the Directors of the C.N.E. have been most generous in their co-operation with the Canadian Committee of Arrangements in preparing for the World Federation Conference in placing the Coliseum and its equipment at our disposal. 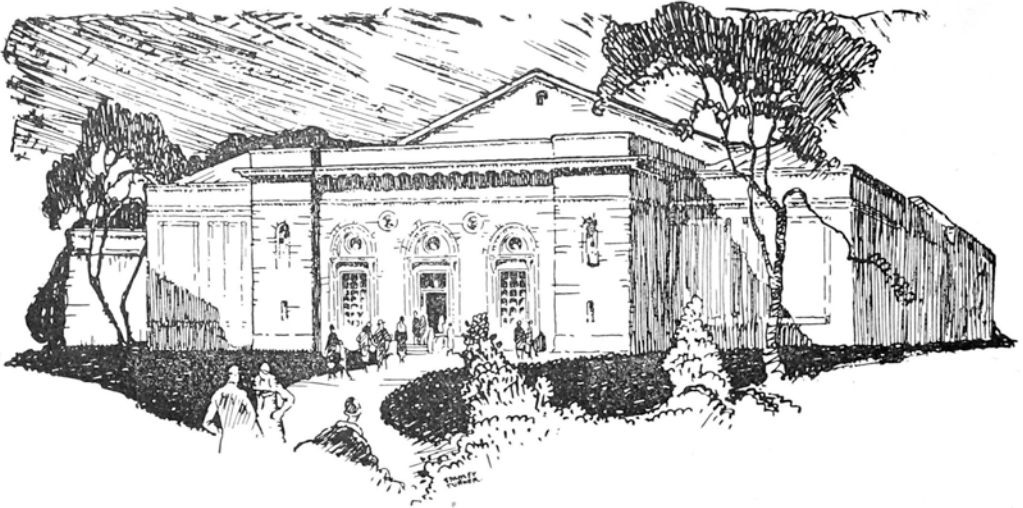

The Art Gallery of Toronto



The site for the Art Gallery of Toronto was determined by the gift of "The Grange", containing about seven acres in the central part of the city. The property included an interesting Georgian house, built in 1817, which had been in the possession of the same family until 1910, when it was bequeathed to the Art Gallery by Professor and Mrs. Goldwin Smith. Judge D'Arcy Boulton, for whom the house was originally built, lived in it until his death in 1846, his son, William Boulton, whose portrait hangs in the drawing room, succeeding him. After Mr. William Boulton's death in 1874 his widow continued to live in the Grange. Her second husband, Professor Goldwin Smith, was an Oxford Professor who had acted as tutor to King Edward VII when he attended Oxford as Prince of Wales. Although not officially connected with the University of Toronto, he was highly esteemed as a scholar and as an author. His portrait and that of his wife are in the hall of the Grange. The grounds, with their beautiful elms, are now used by arrangement with the City as a park and playground, but paintings in the old house show it as it was in the days when "The Grange" was a centre for the intellectual and social life of Toronto.

In 1918 the first portion of a comprehensive plan for a Gallery was completed and connected with the Grange house. In January 1926 a second section was added. The present gallery represents about one-sixth of the completed building. Further additions will be made from time to time as the need arises, until the building is finished, as the plan hung in the corridor leading to the Grange house will show.

The Gallery has already a large collection of paintings and prints, which in the winter months give place to temporary exhibitions. At the present time, this being Confederation Jubilee year, a representative group of Canadian paintings is being shown, in which the different schools of Canadian art may be compared.
