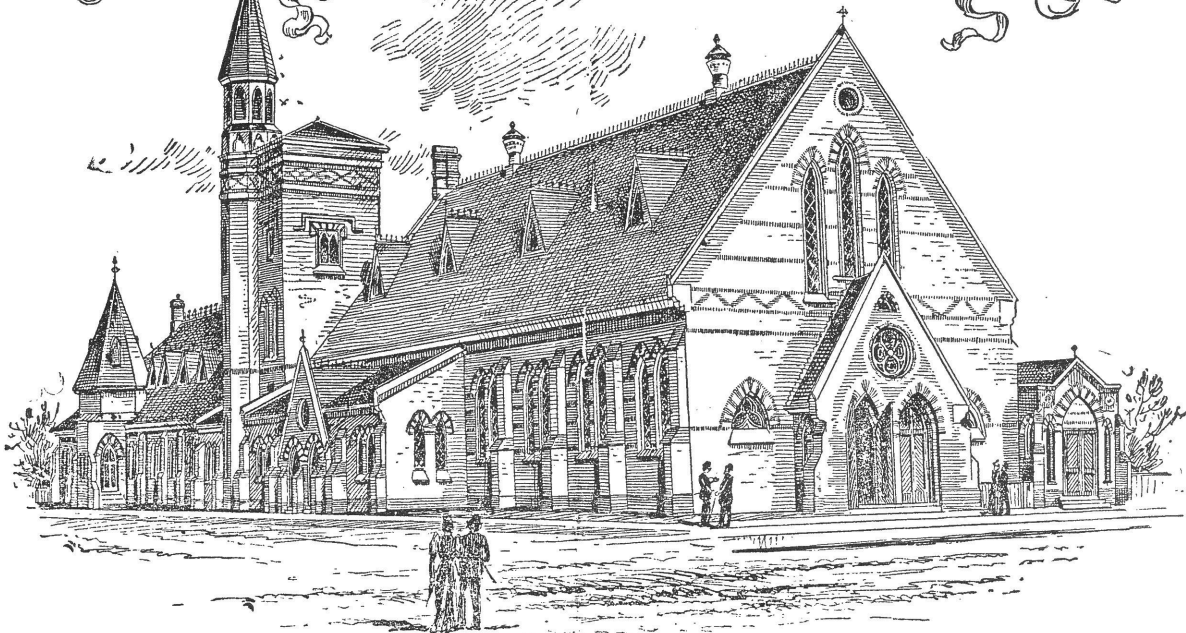

The special adult classes will be on April 27th, May 4th and 11th, at 8 p.m. sharp, in the Goulding Bible Class room.

EASTER.

The prophets of ill assured us of a rainy day, but God in His mercy made the day bright with His glorious sun shining in majesty. Never an Easter that looked so bright at All Saints as this. The new reredos and the lovely flowers so beautifully arranged, and the stately palms, made everyone feel the beauty of the Lord's house.

The services were attended by large congregations, particularly at the 11 o'clock service, when seating accommodation was quite exhausted and large numbers occupied the vestries and the chancel. The rector, Rev. A. H. Baldwin, preached at the morning and evening services from the 118th Psalm: "This is the day the Lord hath made," and from First Corinthians, 15th chapter, "How then are the dead raised?" and held the attention of the congregations by his eloquent and

persuasive words. Rev. Mr. Barr addressed the children in the afternoon at the annual flower service. Holy communion was administered during the day to 672 persons out of a congregation of not more than 800. The congregation were also favored with the assistance of Rev. H. C. Dixon at the 7, 8 and 11 o'clock services. The offertory for the day amounted to \$1,044, and the music under the able direction of Mr. W. E. Fairclough, was exceptionally bright and impressive. Master Jack Challis sang "I Know That My Redeemer Liveth" at both morning and evening services, and deeply impressed his hearers.

THE GRENADIERS' CHURCH PARADE.

The regular annual church parade of the 10th Royal Grenadiers was held April 5th from the Armouries to All Saints' Church, where the regiment's chaplain, Rev. Arthur H. Baldwin, delivered a short and interesting address. The men and officers of the corps presented a striking and soldier-like appearance, and many admiring comments were heard as the "thin red line of 'eroes" swung through the street on their way to and from the place of worship.

Lieut.-Col. Stimson was in command, and his staff consisted of the following officers:—Major Meyers, Capt. and Adjutant Shanly, Capt. and Quartermaster Montgomery, Surgeon-Major King and Chaplain Baldwin. The turnout included 22 officers, 49 non-coms. and 380 men, a total strength of 451.

Chaplain Baldwin in his address chose a subject appropriate both to the occasion and to the day—Palm Sunday. He spoke of the triumphal entry into Jerusalem of the greatest commander and leader of men the world had ever seen, a commander to whom no other man on earth could be compared. He urged his hearers to accept that commander as their own, and to follow him until all should meet to see him crowned King of Kings and Lord of Lords. "Let us all be good soldiers of Christ," said Chaplain Baldwin, in conclusion, "and we will be better soldiers of the Royal Grenadiers."—*The Mail*.

THE ARTHUR BALDWIN HALL

We congratulate Mr. Fred Brigden and Mr. G. F. Shaw and their co-workers on the excellent way in which they have managed the affairs of the Arthur Baldwin Hall. They have spent a great deal of time and trouble in endeavoring to carry out their plans and they have been eminently successful. There has been a greater interest taken in the work among boys by the congregation; and members of All Saints' cannot fail to have noticed the effect of the work in the increased attendance of young men and boys at the services.

THE REREDOS

The Willing Workers are to be congratulated on the beautiful reredos. There is a grandeur and beauty about it which has pleased every artistic eye. We regret that it was impossible to finish it by Easter; but it will be an additional joy when the carving is finished and the new communion table is in position. We believe the effect will be grand.

The taking away of the moribund curtain and placing a proper reredos has given a greatness and dignity to the chancel which it did not previously possess. It has also improved the east window by its framing. It has also proved to be an enormous help to the music—so much was lost in the red curtain which is now resonant by the quarter-cut oak. Some day, perhaps, the Willing Workers will get rid of the Brussels carpet and complete the chancel.

Every member of the congregation congratulates the Willing Workers and offers the heartiest thanks for their loving and beautiful work in the House of God.

THE WOMEN'S AUXILIARY.

God in His inscrutable wisdom has called from us our beloved President of the Diocesan Board, Mrs. Williamson, whose loss we all deeply lament. Her self-sacrificing life, devotion to the work, and lovable characteristics will be long remembered. At a meeting lately the following resolution was sent to Mrs. Osler and her family, proposed by Mrs. Morrison, seconded by Mrs. Winters: "Resolved, That the members of the All Saints' Branch of the Women's Auxiliary beg to tender to Mrs. Osler and her family their deep and heartfelt sympathy in the severe bereavement they have sustained in the death of Mrs. Williamson, their much beloved Diocesan President. Her sisters of the Auxiliary deeply deplore her loss, and they cannot but feel that she has been called away too soon, in the midst of the work where her influence and example were of such inestimable value. They can only bow in humble submission to God's will, and praise Him for the blessing of her life and work."

THE SUNDAY SCHOOL.

In tending our report, we do so with a sincere feeling of thankfulness. Advances have been made all along the

line. The attendance has improved, greater attention has been paid by the scholars to the lessons and the teachers have taken a more lively interest in their work.

During the year several of the senior scholars have gone into the Bible classes; to take their place we have drawn on the infant classes and have also formed several new classes, fortunately we were able to obtain teachers for them, but as many of the classes are much overcrowded, some having as many as 12 to 14 scholars, we would eagerly welcome extra help as it is manifestly impossible for the teacher to handle so many with any effect.

The annual catechism examination was well contested, the majority of the candidates obtaining very high percentages, which speaks well for the excellent manner in which they have been taught. Miss J. Osler again earned our deep gratitude by the preparation of the papers, and to Miss Nevitt we are thankful for the examining of the papers. Rev. A. H. Baldwin very kindly presented gold and silver medals for which we cannot too warmly thank him.

The Inter-diocesan examination called out some of our brightest scholars, who were rewarded by obtaining one gold medal and several valuable collections of books.

Through the kindness of Dr. Risk an orchestra has recently been formed in connection with the schools, and has already proved of inestimable benefit.

We are much indebted to the secretaries, treasurer and librarians for their faithful and willing service; also to the teachers for the thorough manner in which they have taught the children, and to Rev. A. F. Barr for the able assistance which he has rendered on many occasions.

The Gleaners' Band just completed a most successful winter's work. Their number increased to such an extent that more helpers were needed to carry on the work. Miss Wilmot, the Misses I. and E. THE ARTHUR BALDWIN HALL

In presenting this, the first report of the Arthur Baldwin Hall, we wish to thank all those who have in any way supported the movement. The whole congregation has shown a keen interest in the work and it is a credit to All Saints' that this comparatively new sphere of Church activity should have been taken up in such a liberal and generous spirit.

The reward will surely come in an increased interest in our church and its services on the part of the young men of the parish and in solving for us that question of Men in the Church which is to-day causing such serious discussion in our synods.

While the sympathy has been widespread throughout the congregation we wish to mention especially our Rector's aid. His financial support has been considerable but over and above that we feel that his support in the pulpit and in other ways has contributed more than anything else to its success.

We must also thank the wardens and the members of the finance committee who, besides their monetary support have given the time of busy men to assist in perfecting the plans and to the discussion of details regarding the working of the institution. To their efforts are largely due the splendid adaptability of the building to its purpose and the economy displayed in carrying out the work.

The building was opened on Jan. 5/03 and since that date has been open every evening and on Saturday afternoons. Four gymnasium classes have been held weekly under charge of Mr. H. Taylor, who has been most successful in maintaining discipline and in interesting the boys in systematic physical exercise.

It is hoped that a large number of the men of the congregation will enrol as sustaining members. The fee is \$5, and if a sufficient number of this class of membership can be secured, it will not be difficult to make the institution self-supporting.

The Bowling Alley has proved a strong attraction as well as a source of revenue, 482 boys having used it since its instalment.

There is room for a second alley, which will be put in as soon as funds are available.

The reading and game room, which has also been well patronized, is gradually being fitted up, and we hope by next season to have an exceptionally attractive place for this important branch of the work.

Our out-of-door interests go on as usual, and though this is not the place to register our victories and defeats, we can at least point with pride to the fact that our boys are earning a reputation for gentlemanly conduct on the field of sport.

We have been fortunate in again securing Sunlight Park as a playground for All Saints' boys. Those who are aware of the conditions prevailing in our public playground in the east end will recognize the advantage of having our own

field, where the boys may have their games under supervision without coming in contact with profanity and evil associates.

Five Bible Classes are held for senior boys each Sunday. There is a total membership of about one hundred, although the attendance is not as regular as could be wished or as we hope to have it, especially on fine days in spring and summer.

In conclusion we ask for the prayers of the congregation that the work for the boys and young men of All Saints may bear much fruit for Christ and this Church.
