1842—LUNARIA, Biennis—(Honesty, St. Peter's Penny, Money Plant) [2½ ft.] A curious plant chiefly cultivated because it is very ornamental in winter bouquets. It is a biennial but may be treated as an annual if seed is sown early. Rather pyramidal in form, sturdy and bearing white cruciform flowers which are followed by large oval seed pods. The outer hulls of the seed pods later drop off to reveal the translucent silvery membranes which give the plant its charm. ½ oz. 50c., Pkt. 10c.

Specialties for Better Food Gardens for 1932

The special vegetables offered below are not necessarily novelties. As a matter of fact, some of them have served Canadian gardeners for years. We take great pleasure in developing the special strains we offer for there are just as wide differences between strains of one and the same vegetables as there are between blooded live stock and the ordinary farm type. We are continually striving to serve the gardeners throughout Canada.

True Italian Sprouting Broccoli

72—TRUE ITALIAN SPROUTING BROCCOLI—A distinct variety, extensively cultivated by Italian gardeners. When the central head is cut, numerous sprouts develop from the leaf axis, each sprout terminating in small green heads, which are bunched for market. Pkt. **15¢**, Oz. **75¢**.

Long Island Improved Brussels Sprouts

73—BRUSSELS SPROUTS, Long Island Improved—The stalks are large, thick and close jointed, and the sprouts are set thickly. The sprouts formed at the base of the stock are tightly folded, and quite solid. This is an early and very satisfactory variety. Pkt. 10¢, Oz. 40¢.

Golden Acre Cabbage

74—GOLDEN ACRE CABBAGE, Extra Early Round Head—Head perfectly round. Matures in only 80 days from date of sowing and is one of the earliest Cabbages in existence. Head measures nine inches in diameter. Average weight five pounds. Pkt. 15¢, Oz. 60¢.

Chinese or Celery Cabbage

86—CHINESE OR CELERY CABBAGE—Resembles a Cos Lettuce in shape. This vegetable may be used as salad; it is mild flavored and can be eaten raw; boiled and minced with butter and seasoned is very delectable. Pkt. **10¢**, Oz. **50¢**.

2350—LAKE OF THUN PANSY—The bluest of all blue Pansies, the color being an exquisite tone of rich ultramarine blue relieved by a darker blue blotch on each petal. Size of Towers, vigor of plants all of the highest grade. Splendid for cutting or bedding. Pkt. 35c.

New Double Hollyhock (Imperator)

2401—COCKATOO PETUNIA—Dwarf—The plants attain a neight of 8 inches, are round and compact, covered with small cound blossoms and are splendid for beds and borders. The llowers are a velvety deep violet purple with irregular sized white spots and stars which give to the plant and bed an extraordinarily gay and vivid appearance. Pkt. **25c.**

Nicotiana (Scented Tobacco)

2260—CRIMSON BEDDER—Novelty—Nicotiana Affinis. Useful as a fine decorative plant for groups and borders, has not been found suitable for general bedding purposes because of its height. This novelty is a distinct break in this direction, being of dwarf and pyramidal habit, about 15 inches in height. The flowers are of a rich deep crimson color and very freely produced, making a most striking effect when seen in the mass. Pkt. **50c**.

New Dwarf Compact Verbena (Fireball)

2842—NEW DWARF COMPACT VERBENA—Fireball — A dwarf compact Verbena about six inches high literally covered with bright scarlet blooms, excellent for the rock garden, borders, beds or as pot plants. Pkt. **25c.**

Viola or Tufted Pansy (Apricot)


